SUBJECT	Slow Streets Program Update and Recommendation

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Mobility and Transportation Infrastructure Commission (MTIC) provide recommendations and advisement of the Residential Slow Streets Program for City Council related to:

- a. The existing Grand Avenue and Hermosa Street installation;
- b. The existing Oak Street installation;
- c. The future Mission Street and parklet installation;
- d. The future of the Slow Streets Program and usage of Slow Streets temporary traffic control signs.

Background

The City's Slow Streets Program is intended to provide space for residents to safely walk and ride, and to support local businesses' use of outdoor space for dining and other operation purposes. The program is accomplished by installing temporary traffic equipment along selected streets. In residential areas, the program includes the installation of temporary striping, signage, curb extensions using reflective delineators, and bicycle lanes using short-term paint/tape. In addition to the listed elements, the commercial areas include the use of temporary parklet structures, furniture, planters, and art pieces.

In August 2023, temporary traffic control equipment, material, markings, paint, tape and other elements on Oak Street, Hermosa Street, and Grand Avenue were installed. Since the installation, City staff and the City Manager's office have received feedback from numerous residents and members of the public. On August 14, 2023, the Public Works team held two community listening sessions to gather direct feedback from Grand Avenue residents regarding the recently installed bike lanes and curb extensions along the street. Most residents who attended the listening session in-person and virtually and who live on Grand Avenue did not support the bike lane installation. However, there was support by some residents and other travelers and users of the bike lane on Grand. In regard to the overall Slow Street program, generally, the comments received showed support for the program, but at the same time the City received comments from residents who did not support certain elements adjacent to their homes. On November 2, 2023, Public Works staff conducted a check in with Grand Avenue residents, three-months after the installation, to collect additional feedback about their experience with Slow Streets. Staff heard from approximately eight people via Zoom. Most residents in attendance did not support the bike lanes while a few residents expressed support for maintaining the bike lane on Grand Avenue during the demonstration period.

As of December 7, 2023, the subconsultant received approximately 741 survey responses to 21 questions provided in English, Spanish, and Mandarin. Since the last survey review on September 12, 2023, the survey responses have more than doubled. See Attachment 1 for summary of results of the residential Slow Streets. Regarding the Mission Street roadway configuration, the consultant incorporated the feedback provided by the Commission during the September 2023 meeting. The Consultant developed cross-sections for each street on Mission Street to illustrate the feasibility of incorporating the recommendations.

Discussion/Analysis

The Slow Streets program temporary traffic measures were originally scheduled to remain installed for approximately six months in duration. After receiving hundreds of survey responses, emails, and phone calls related to the program, staff would like to gather the Commission's feedback and recommendation for a Council action to maintain the equipment and material for the duration of the Slow Street Program initial timeline of six months or adjust the timeline to remove certain elements earlier.

After reviewing the Commission's comments related to the proposed Mission Street road diet, the Consultant developed cross section exhibits for Mission Street to illustrate the existing fourlane undivided roadway and reconfiguration to a three-lane roadway with one traffic lane in each direction, a center lane, and a bike lane on each side (See attachment 3 - Mission Street Cross Sections). The consultant determined that only a substandard bike lane of 4 feet wide without a buffer could be designed, which would not meet CA MUTCD standards. The Consultant team provided that this may be an impractical solution for cyclists due to the gutter pan and minimal protection, specifically along the section between Fremont Avenue and Fair Oaks Avenue. An alternative would be to remove a traffic lane between Fremont Avenue and Fair Oaks Avenue, however, this was not modeled in the ITERIS Mission Street/Meridian Avenue Reconfiguration Alternative Analysis (see Attachment 3). Instead, the model calls for preserving a right turn and left lane in both directions at Mission and Fremont Avenue which would produce the substandard 4-foot bike lane. The existing curb extensions, parklet on Mission and Mound, and on-street parking coupled with the limited right-of-way between Fremont and Fair Oaks, limits the amount of space for a bike lane. As such, the Consultant does not recommend a bike lane between Fremont Avenue and Fair Oaks; a proposed bike lane would end at Mission Avenue and Fremont Avenue.


With regard to parklet implementation, Public Works Staff is currently working with the lead consultant, subconsultant and Jones Coffee Roaster as the initial Mission Street business adopter to modify the draft pilot parklet's configuration to better meet the needs of the business. Staff is planning on installing part of the flooring and adjusting the K-rails in the coming weeks in segments to minimize economic impacts to the business. The new parklets consist of urban parklet urban floors, transition plates, k-rail segments, corner and tapered K-rail pieces, accent cap types like wood planter or wood cap options on top of the K-rail. As a visual example in the renderings, there is also furniture, shade canopies, and planters installed.


Q1 What Language would you like to take the survey in?





Q4 Which of the following modes of transportation have you used on Oak / Hermosa / Grand after the project was installed? Select all that apply.



Q5 How has the demonstration project influenced the behavior of people using these streets? Please explain and specify which corridor you are focusing on.





Q7 Would you like the City of South Pasadena to temporarily demonstrate the use of traffic safety tools on any other streets?







Q9 If you used Metro (bus, rail) for transportation to the demonstration project, how did you access Metro today?





Q10 Do you ever ride Metro? (i.e. rail, bus)



Q11 After the demonstration project, your use of transit is likely to:







Q13 Do you perceive this demonstration as improving this neighborhood/community?






