SUBJECT: Natural Resources and Environmental Commission Plastics Task

Force Selection

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Commission review and approve the duties of the Plastics Task Force and elect up to three commissioners to serve on the Plastics Task Force.

Background

The City of South Pasadena has established itself as a leader in sustainable practices through diverse initiatives and programs including implementing the following items in plastics reduction:

- In 2014, the City banned plastic bags, two years before it became state law.
- In 2016, South Pasadena City Council voted to ban the sale and use of expanded polystyrene a petroleum byproduct that is neither readily recyclable nor biodegradable. The ban applies to restaurants, retail vendors, food packagers, food providers, and City vendors.
- In 2019, the City adopted the South Pasadena Green Action Plan (Attached) which includes the goal to "work towards making South Pasadena a Plastic-Free City." Actions under this goal include: developing a plastic-free/zero-waste guide for City events, creating educational materials on plastics alternatives, encouraging residents and businesses to use reusable foodware items, and more.
- In 2022, the City adopted the South Pasadena Climate Action Plan (CAP) which aims to reduce carbon emissions by increasing diversion from landfills. The CAP includes moves to develop policies to mandate/encourage reduction of waste to encourage reusable foodware.

AB 1276 - Single-Use Foodware Accessories and Standard Condiments

On October 5, 2021, the California Legislature enacted Assembly Bill ("AB") 1276 which prohibits a food facility, for on-premises dining or when using a third-party food delivery platform, from providing any single-use foodware accessory or standard condiment packaged for single use to a consumer unless requested by the consumer. The new law defines a "single-use foodware accessory" as utensils, chopsticks, condiments cups and packets, straws, and stirrers that are used once and then discarded. AB 1276 also prohibits single-use foodware accessories from being bundled or packaged in a way that prohibits the consumer from taking only the item

they want. AB 1276 does not apply to health care facilities, residential care facilities, and public and private school cafeterias. A food facility may ask a drive-through consumer if the consumer wants a single-use foodware accessory if the single-use foodware accessory is necessary for the consumer to consume ready-to-eat food, or to prevent spills of or safely transport ready-to-eat food. The City may by ordinance adopt and implement stricter restrictions on the use of single-use foodware accessories than those required by AB 1276.

Discussion/Analysis

As the Natural Resources and Environmental Commission discussed their goals and prioritized their initiatives for their FY 23-24 Work Plan, commissioners requested to create a Plastics Task Force and add two discussion items to the Work Plan to be led by the Task Force.

The following is a list of recommended duties and discussion items for the Plastics Task Force which align with action items listed in the City's Green Action Plan:

- 1. Develop a plastic-free/zero-waste guide for City events.
- 2. Provide workshops for parents to teach them how to prepare zero-waste lunches.
- 3. Explore the possibility of establishing an ordinance to adopt and implement stricter restrictions on the use of single-use foodware accessories than those required by AB 1276.
- 4. Explore the possibility of banning single-use plastics in food service stores.

It is recommended that the Commission approve the list of duties of the Plastics Task Force and elect up to three commissioners to serve on the Task Force.

Next Steps


- 1. The Plastics Task Force will meet outside of the scheduled commission meetings.



GOAL I Work towards Making South Pasadena a Plastic-Free City

Goal I: Work Towards Making South Pasadena a Plastic-Free City

Play 1: Reduce use and sale of single-use plastics.

- Move I.1.1: Update the City's Environmentally Preferable Purchasing (EPP) Policy to be adopted by all City Departments. A strong EPP policy eliminates over-ordering, reduces waste, and guides departments to purchasing local and ecofriendly options including recycled copy paper and compostable utensils.
- **Move I.1.2: Develop a plastic-free/zero-waste guide for City events.** A zero waste guide will provide specific steps to City staff on how to set up a plastic-free/zero waste event. It should include instructions on how to reduce plastics, obtain organics bins, post educational signage, and other steps vendors and event coordinators can take to ensure that a minimal, if not zero, amount of plastic is used.
- Move I.1.3: Explore the possibility of banning single-use plastics in food service stores. Start the conversation among business owners to raise awareness of the issues with single-use plastics. Work with City departments and Chamber of Commerce to gauge fiscal impact and outline a possible plan for implementation.

Play 2: Encourage the use of reusables by providing resources, education, and funding.

- Move I.2.1: Seek funding to install more water bottle refill stations in public areas. Water bottle refill stations are being installed in public parks. It would be beneficial to have stations installed in other public buildings including the Library, City Hall, and the Senior Center; however, installation is costly. Explore funding sources for this project.
- Move I.2.2: Create an informational pamphlet on plastic alternatives and distribute to businesses. There are several plastic alternatives on the market. An informational pamphlet that lists the alternatives and options on where to obtain them will help businesses begin their switch to plastic-free single-use items.
- Move I.2.3: Create checklists for businesses and restaurants on ways they can reduce their plastic and distribute. Checklists provide clear steps.
- Move I.2.4: Encourage businesses to participate in "Tap," the app that identifies their location as a free water-refill spot. Promote the app through communication channels. Consider offering shoutouts to participating businesses on social media.

- **Move I.2.5: Create a Recycle & Reuse Directory.** Many residents want to do their part to recycle their materials or repair their broken items instead of purchase new ones, but don't know where to do so. This directory would provide that information.
- *Move I.2.6: Provide mini-grants or loans to businesses who need a jump start to switching to alternatives. Explore funding sources to provide mini-grants to businesses that would help them with initial costs for switching to alternatives. Grants can be awarded to those most in need.
- *Move I.2.7: Explore possibilities of establishing a beverage container recycling program in South Pasadena. With the closure of rePlanet and other recycling centers, residents have no where to go inside the City to recycle their beverage containers.
- *Move I.2.8: Provide plastic reduction items to residents including reusable water bottles, utensils, containers, etc. These items will help raise awareness and provide education on actual steps people can take to reduce their plastic. It will provide them with the tools they need to reduce their plastic consumption.
- *Move I.2.9: Provide workshops for parents to teach them how to prepare zerowaste lunches. Work with SPB, SPUSD, and PTA to put together workshops for parents. This will help reduce waste in schools.

Play 3: Provide incentives and/or rewards for those actively working towards zero-waste.

- Move I.3.1: Encourage businesses to reward customers and employees who bring in their own coffee mug, water bottles, to-go container, etc. Offering a small monetary incentive for customers and employees who bring in their own beverage containers will reduce plastic use and possibly reduce amount of supplies needed for the business.
- *Move I.3.2: Explore ways to recognize businesses who are implementing zerwaste practices. Sustainable practices can be difficult to implement for businesses. Those businesses who implement them in spite of the difficulties should be recognized and/or rewarded. Recognition programs encourage greater participation among other businesses and raise awareness among patrons. Some methods include: green business certification program, green business awards, certificate of recognition from City Council, etc.

CALL TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order at 7:04 p.m. Present at the time of roll call were: Chair Michael Siegel, Vice Chair Ella Hushagen, Commissioner Rona Bortz, Commissioner Michelle Hammond, Commissioner Amy Davis Jones, Commissioner Casey Law, and Commissioner Richard Tom. City Council Liaison Councilmember Michael Cacciotti was absent. Staff present: Ted Gerber: Public Works Director, Arpy Kasparian: Environmental Services & Sustainability Manager, and Melanis Stepanian: Management Assistant.

1) General Public Comment

2) Approval of Minutes of May 23, 2023 NREC Meeting

PUBLIC COMMENT

No public comment.

MOTION BY COMMISSIONER LAW, SECOND BY COMMISSIONER JONES, MOTION CARRIED 5 FOR AND 2 ABSTAINING, TO APPROVE THE MINUTES FROM THE MAY 23, 2023 NREC MEETING.

3) Approval of NREC FY 22-23 Annual Report

Arpy Kasparian shared the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Annual Report for final approval from the Commission.

PUBLIC COMMENT

No public comment.

MOTION BY COMMISSIONER LAW, SECOND BY COMMISSIONER TOM, MOTION CARRIED 7-0, TO APPROVE THE NREC FY 22-23 ANNUAL REPORT.

4) Adoption of NREC Work Plan for FY 23-24

Environmental Services & Sustainability Manager, Arpy Kasparian, presented the NREC Work Plan for Fiscal Year 2023-2024 to request adoption on behalf of the Commission. Comments shared during the previous NREC meeting have been implemented into a draft work plan for the 2023-24 fiscal year.

Commissioners discussed adding a budget presentation and connecting with other Commissions on items related to natural resources and sustainability. Commissioners shared their interest in

expanding on single-use plastic efforts and forming a Task Force. Commissioners were also interested in conducting a budget discussion for the 2024-2025 Fiscal Year.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mark G- Resident- Very interested in the Single-use Plastics Task Force and excited. Mark G suggested the City works with the Chamber of Commerce for single-use plastic use reduction. Mark also shared that the City of Los Angeles has a program in place to reduce single-use plastics, such as utensils. Lastly, Mark asks the City be a leader in these efforts of reducing plastic use by using plastic alternatives and promoting at the Farmer's Market.

MOTION BY COMMISSIONER TOM, SECOND BY VICE CHAIR HUSHAGEN, MOTION CARRIED 7-0, TO APPROVE THE NREC FY 23-24 WORK PLAN WITH THE FOLLOWING ADDITIONS: ADD ONE ADDITIONAL BUDGET PRESENTATION AT END OF FISCAL YEAR 23-24, CREATE A SINGLE-USE PLASTICS TASK FORCE AND ADD TWO PLASTICS DISCUSSION ITEMS LED BY THE TASK FORCE.

5) Approval of Proposed FY 23-24 Water Conservation Program

Arpy Kasparian reviewed the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Water Conservation Program for final approval.

Commissioners requested clarification on the 2022-2023 Budget Summary. A Commissioner questioned how the water-waste reporting email program has been progressing through the past year. Commissioners also requested an update to the water bill to include additional educational information on the bill. Commissioners questioned the Greywater Rebate program requesting additional information. Commissioners asked for clarification on Metropolitan Water District Rebate amounts.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mark G- Resident- Requested the City conduct further outreach on water runoff education. Mark G also suggested the City connects with the Chamber of Commerce to promote commercial water rebates.

MOTION BY COMMISSIONER TOM, SECOND BY COMMISSIONER JONES, MOTION CARRIED 7-0, TO APPROVE THE FY 23-24 WATER CONSERVATION PROGRAM.

Ted Gerber, Public Works Director, shared the upcoming Arroyo Fest to encourage walkability and active transportation.

Melanis Stepanian, Management Assistant, encouraged residents and businesses to apply for Water Conservation Rebates available as funds are limited.
