Approval of Minutes – Meeting of April 26, 2022

### CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION – REGULAR MEETING MINUTES – April 26, 2022

#### CALL TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m. Present at the time of roll call were: Commissioner Amy Davis Jones, Commissioner William J. Kelly, Commissioner Michael Siegel, Vice Chair Michelle Hammond, and Chair Casey Law. Commissioner Rona Bortz had an excused absence. Council Liaison Present: Mayor Michael Cacciotti. Staff present: Ted Gerber, Public Works Director and Arpy Kasparian, Environmental Services & Sustainability Manager.

#### 1) GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

No public comments.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS:**

2) Provide Input on Proposed FY 22/23 Water Conservation Program

Kasparian shared the current South Pasadena Water Conservation Program including background, rebate programs, budget, and proposed changes. This item will be brought back to the May Commission meeting as an action item to collect recommendations in preparation for the upcoming fiscal year. The commissioners voiced their concerns regarding the proposed greywater systems rebate for residents. Incentive values, City incentives, as well as total cumulative incentives with Metropolitan Water District, were discussed and altered to meet the needs of South Pasadena residents in reducing their average water usage.

#### PUBLIC COMMENT

Mike G, South Pasadena resident, shared his comments in regard to water conservation rebates and programs. Also endorsed that education and promotion are equally as important as monetary incentives.

4) City Council Liaison Communications

Mayor Michael Cacciotti, representative on the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, shared the newly implemented Wallis Annenberg Wildlife Crossing. Cacciotti thanked Ted Gerber for working on intensive projects such as the electrification of South Pasadena City departments such as police, fire, and city hall.

5) <u>Commissioner Communications</u>

Commissioner Hammond requested an update regarding the snake trail and the access trail off of Roland. Commissioner Hammond also asked for clarification about the planning process for the City's Tree Management Plan. Commissioner Hammond congratulated Arpy Kasparian on the successful Earth Day celebrations. Chair Law suggested for the Commission to share knowledge and ideas with

other commissions, encouraging the NREC to work with other commissions, especially with the adoption of the Climate Action Plan and Green Action Plan. No other commissioners had comments.

#### 6) <u>Staff Liaison Communications</u>

Kasparian recapped the Earth Day events in South Pasadena and thanked each of the commissioners for their support.

Gerber shared information in regard to a special meeting occurring on April 27 discussing water supply, water conservation, and a short presentation by the Main San Gabriel Water Master, and updates from the Metropolitan Water District. On April 27, a level 3 EV charger will be installed at the fire department parking lot. The Clean Power Alliance will have a contractor evaluate the electric systems at City Hall to begin the analysis of a solar system through the Power Ready Program.

#### Recommendation

It is recommended that the Natural Resources and Environmental Commission recommends City Council approve the proposed Water Conservation Programs for the 2022-23 fiscal year including the declaration of a Stage 2: Serious Water Supply Shortage.

#### Background

Since the State of California declared a drought in January 2014, the has made a concerted effort to increase water conservation and improve water efficiency through the Water Conservation Program. When the 2014 drought state of emergency was rescinded, provisions of Executive Order B-37-16, "Making Conservation a California Way of Life," were proclaimed to remain in full force and effect. Thus, continuing the City's conservation efforts to present day. In November 2019, the South Pasadena Green Action Plan (Green Plan) was adopted with a goal to "Enhance Water Conservation Projects and Programs." The plan includes actions such as evaluating the feasibility of a greywater rebate program, promoting water conservation rebates offered by the Metropolitan Water District, and providing educational materials and expert advice on water conservation practices. The Water Conservation Program is reviewed by the Natural Resources and Environmental Commission and approved by City Council annually.

#### **Fiscal Impact**

The FY 2021-22 Budget included \$115,000 under the City's water conservation fund (Account No. 503-6010-6713-8032) which can only pay for water conservation projects. The FY 2022-23 Budget will be adopted later this year, and it is anticipated that the water conservation budget will remain the same as the previous fiscal year. The revenue for water conservation programs is collected through a water efficiency fee of \$0.14 per unit of water billed to all city water customers.

#### **Discussion/Analysis**

Annually, the City Council has adopted a water conservation program that includes rebates, education/outreach, water conservation material, and projects to promote water conservation throughout the City.

With a total budget of \$115,000 for the water conservation program, the following table shows the budgeted allocations for each program for the current fiscal year (2021-2022). The table also includes expended funds for the MWD rebates as of April 30, 2022 and the expended funds for City rebates, water-use surveys, and water conservation promotion as of April 30, 2022. Lastly, the table includes the proposed budget allocations for Fiscal Year 2022-2023.

Given the low participation in rebates, especially for commercial, Staff proposes to reduce the allocations for MWD Commercial and City Commercial rebates from \$20,000 each to \$10,000 each and add a Greywater Pilot Program in the amount of \$20,000.

The following conservation programs are proposed for Fiscal Year 2022-23:

#### City Co-Funded Metropolitan Water District Rebates

The Metropolitan Water District (MWD) offers residential and commercial rebates on indoor and outdoor devices as well as turf removal through their SoCalWater\$mart Program. In addition, the City adds supplemental funds to these rebates. Residents and business owners can apply for these rebates directly through the SoCalWater\$mart website and receive rebate checks that include both the MWD and City contributions. As discussed at the April 26, 2022 NREC meeting, co-funding amounts will be increased for several items. See Tables 1 and 2 in the attachment for a complete list of MWD rebates and changes to the City co-funding amounts for Fiscal Year 2022-23.

#### City Rebate Program

In addition to the MWD rebates, the City has its own rebate program that offers rebates on water conservation devices and landscaping that are not offered through MWD. These City rebates address our local water conservation needs and further encourage South Pasadena residents and business owners to implement water saving practices and play an active role in conserving our water sources. As discussed at the April 26, 2022 NREC meeting, rebate amounts will be increased, the rotating sprinkler nozzle rebate will be removed, and a City rebate for high efficiency dishwashers will be added. See Table 3 in the attachment for a complete list of changes to the City rebates for Fiscal Year 2022-23.

#### Greywater Pilot Program

The FY22-23 Water Conservation Program will include a budget for a Greywater Pilot Program in the amount of \$20,000. The preliminary program plans include workshops on greywater systems with an emphasis on Laundry to Landscape systems and a rebate for materials used to install a Laundry to Landscape system in the amount of \$1,000 per household.

#### Residential and Commercial Water-Use Assessments

The City has partnered with San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments (SGVCOG) to promote their eSGV Program (formerly known as the EASY Program), which offers free energy and water assessments for homeowners as well as renters. Assessments can be completed virtually or in person. Residents can expect to receive a report with a list of steps they can take to conserve energy and water. City staff are working with SGVCOG to promote this program in conjunction with the rebate program.

#### Water Conservation Promotional Materials and Activities

Examples of items that can be used to promote water conservation are buckets, low-flow aerators, tree water aids, water conservation brochures/pamphlets, newsletters, and other print media. Funds can also be used for events, programs, outreach, and community classes related to water conservation education.

#### **Declaring Stage 2: Water Supply Shortage**

On April 26, 2022, the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) Board of Directors declared a Water Shortage Emergency Condition and adopted an Emergency Water Conservation Program for areas that are dependent on State Water Project (SWP) supplies. On May 11, 2022, the Upper San Gabriel Valley Municipal Water District (Upper District) Board of Directors also adopted an Emergency Water Conservation Program encouraging all Upper District's retail water agencies (including South Pasadena) to reduce water used by 20 percent and limit outdoor irrigation to two days per week. Per the South Pasadena Municipal Code, staff will recommend to City Council to declare the City to move from Stage 1: Moderate Water Supply Shortage to a Stage 2: Serious Water Supply Shortage which would restrict outdoor watering to two days per week. Once approved, staff will provide outreach and education to residents and businesses via press release, e-newsletters, City website, City blog, etc. Violations of the new restrictions can be reported by emailing <u>waterconservation@southpasadenaca.gov</u>. Staff will first provide door hangers to notify residents and businesses of their violation and will escalate enforcement to include fines for repeated violations.
