Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council authorize the City delegate to vote in support of the two resolutions being considered at the upcoming League of California Cities' (League) Annual Business Meeting being held during the League's Annual Conference in Long Beach, California.

Commission Review and Recommendation

This matter was not reviewed by a commission.

Discussion/Analysis

Each year, the League accepts resolutions from member cities and elected officials on issues that have a direct bearing on municipal affairs. The resolutions are reviewed by the appropriate League policy committees and their recommendations are presented to the General Assembly at the Annual Business meeting, on Friday, October 18, 2019. The voting delegates representing cities throughout the state in attendance at the Annual Business meeting make the final determination on the resolutions.

By approving the recommendation for the resolutions, the City delegate(s) will have the Council's general guidance for the vote to be taken on the resolutions and are authorized to vote on amendments in the manner they deem to be in the best interest of the City.

This year, two resolutions have been introduced for consideration by the League's General Assembly. The League's resolutions packet, which includes the full text of each resolution and letters of support from cities, is attached. Below is a summary of each resolution. The City Council should take a position on both resolutions in order for the voting delegate to cast the City's vote at the League's annual business meeting.

Resolution 1

RESOLUTION OF THE LEAGUE OF CALIFORNIA CITIES CALLING ON THE CALIFORNIA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION TO AMEND RULE 20A TO ADD PROJECTS IN VERY HIGH FIRE HAZARD SEVERITY ZONES TO THE LIST OF ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA AND TO INCREASE FUNDING ALLOCATIONS FOR RULE 20A PROJECTS

Support League of California Cities' Resolutions September 18, 2019 Page 2 of 3

Summary

This Resolution, in response to intensifying fire seasons and hazards associated with exposed energized utility lines, proposes that the League of California Cities (League) call upon the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to amend the Rule 20A program by expanding the criteria for undergrounding overhead utilities to include projects in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones (VHFHSZ). This Resolution also proposes that the League call upon the CPUC to increase utilities' funding allocations for Rule 20A projects.

This Resolution states that the League of California Cities should call upon the State and Federal governments to restore and ensure proper funding for the U.S. – Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) and work bi-nationally to address water quality issues resulting from transboundary flows from Mexico's Tijuana River into the United States containing untreated sewage, polluted sediment, and trash.

GUIDELINES FOR ANNUAL CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

Policy development is a vital and ongoing process within the League. The principal means for deciding policy on the important issues facing cities is through the League's seven standing policy committees and the board of directors. The process allows for timely consideration of issues in a changing environment and assures city officials the opportunity to both initiate and influence policy decisions.

Annual conference resolutions constitute an additional way to develop League policy. Resolutions should adhere to the following criteria.

Guidelines for Annual Conference Resolutions

- 1. Only issues that have a direct bearing on municipal affairs should be considered or adopted at the Annual Conference.
- 2. The issue is not of a purely local or regional concern.
- 3. The recommended policy should not simply restate existing League policy.
- 4. The resolution should be directed at achieving one of the following objectives:
 - (a) Focus public or media attention on an issue of major importance to cities.
 - (b) Establish a new direction for League policy by establishing general principles around which more detailed policies may be developed by policy committees and the board of directors.
 - (c) Consider important issues not adequately addressed by the policy committees and board of directors.
 - (d) Amend the League bylaws (requires 2/3 vote at General Assembly).

WHEREAS, the California Public Utilities Commission regulates the undergrounding conversion of overhead utilities under Electric Tariff Rule 20 and;

WHEREAS, the criteria under Rule 20A largely restricts eligible projects to those along streets with high volumes of public traffic; and

WHEREAS, the cost of undergrounding projects that do not meet Rule 20A criteria is left mostly or entirely to property owners under other parts of Rule 20; and

WHEREAS, California is experiencing fire seasons of worsening severity; and

WHEREAS, undergrounding overhead utilities that can spark brush fires is an important tool in preventing them and offers a public benefit; and

WHEREAS, brush fires are not restricted to starting near streets with high volumes of public traffic; and

WHEREAS, expanding Rule 20A criteria to include Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones would facilitate undergrounding projects that would help prevent fires; and

WHEREAS, expanding Rule 20A criteria as described above and increasing funding allocations for Rule 20A projects would lead to more undergrounding in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones; and now therefore let it be,

RESOLVED that the League of California Cities calls on the California Public Utilities Commission to amend Rule 20A to include projects in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones to the list of criteria for eligibility and to increase funding allocations for Rule 20A projects.

Background Information on Resolution No. 1

Background:

Rancho Palos Verdes is the most populated California city to have 90 percent or more of residents living in a Cal Fire-designated Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone. Over the years, the Palos Verdes Peninsula has seen numerous brush fires that were determined to be caused by electrical utility equipment.

Across the state, some of the most destructive and deadly wildfires were sparked by power equipment. But when it comes to undergrounding overhead utilities, fire safety is not taken into account when considering using ratepayer funds to pay for these projects under California's Electric Tariff Rule 20 program. The program was largely intended to address visual blight when it was implemented in 1967. Under Rule 20A, utilities must allocate ratepayer funds to undergrounding conversion projects chosen by local governments that have a public benefit and meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Eliminate an unusually heavy concentration of overhead lines;
- Involve a street or road with a high volume of public traffic;
- Benefit a civic or public recreation area or area of unusual scenic interest; and,
- Be listed as an arterial street or major collector as defined in the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) Guidelines.

As we know, brush fires are not restricted to erupting in these limited areas. California's fire season has worsened in severity in recent years, claiming dozens of lives and destroying tens of thousands of structures in 2018 alone.

Excluding fire safety from Rule 20A eligibility criteria puts the task of undergrounding power lines in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones squarely on property owners who are proactive, willing and able to foot the bill.

The proposed resolution calls on the California Public Utilities Commission to amend Rule 20A to include projects in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones to the list of criteria for eligibility. To facilitate more undergrounding projects in these high-risk zones, the proposed resolution also calls on the CPUC to increase funding allocations for Rule 20A projects.

If adopted, utilities will be incentivized to prioritize undergrounding projects that could potentially save millions of dollars and many lives.

League of California Cities Staff Analysis on Resolution No. 1

Summary:

This Resolution, in response to intensifying fire seasons and hazards associated with exposed energized utility lines, proposes that the League of California Cities (League) call upon the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to amend the Rule 20A program by expanding the criteria for undergrounding overhead utilities to include projects in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones (VHFHSZ). This Resolution also proposes that the League call upon the CPUC to increase utilities' funding allocations for Rule 20A projects.

Background

California Wildfires and Utilities

Over the last several years, the increasing severity and frequency of California's wildfires have prompted state and local governments to seek urgent prevention and mitigation actions. Record breaking wildfires in Northern and Southern California in both 2017 and 2018 have caused destruction and loss of life. This severe fire trend has local officials seeking solutions to combat what is now a year-round fire season exacerbated by years of drought, intense weather patterns, untamed vegetation and global warming.

These conditions create a dangerous catalyst for wildfires caused by utilities as extreme wind and weather events make downed power lines more of a risk. In response to recent catastrophic wildfires, Governor Newsom established a Strike Force tasked with developing a "comprehensive roadmap" to address issues related to wildfires, climate change, and utilities. The Strike Force report acknowledges that measures to harden the electrical grid are critical to wildfire risk management. A key utility hardening strategy: undergrounding lines in extreme high-fire areas.

Governor Newsom's Wildfire Strike Force program report concludes, "It's not a question of "if" wildfire will strike, but "when."

Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones

This Resolution seeks to expand the undergrounding of overhead utility lines in VHFHSZ. California Government Code Section 51178 requires the Director of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CalFIRE) to identify areas in the state as VHFHSZ based on the potential fire hazard in those areas. VHFHSZ are determined based on fuel loading, slope, fire weather, and other relevant factors. These zones are in both local responsibility areas and state responsibility areas. Maps of the statewide and county by county VHFHSZ can be found here. \(^1\)

More than 25 million acres of California wildlands are classified under very high or extreme fire threat. Approximately 25 percent of the state's population, 11 million people, live in those high-risk areas. Additionally, over 350,000 Californians live in cities that are nearly encompassed within Cal Fire's maps of VHFHSZ. Similar to the proponents of this Resolution, City of Rancho Palos Verdes, over 75 communities have 90 percent or more of residents living in a VHFHSZ.

CPUC Rule 20 Program

The CPUC's Rule 20 program lays out the guidelines and procedures for converting overhead electric and telecommunication facilities to underground electric facilities. Rule 20 funding and criteria is provided at four levels. Levels A, B, and C, reflect progressively diminishing ratepayer funding for undergrounding projects. Recently added Rule 20D is a relatively new program that is specific to San Diego Gas and Electric (SDG&E), which was created in response to the destructive 2007 wildfires. Each of these levels will be discussed below:

Rule 20A

The first California overhead conversion program, Rule 20A, was created in 1967 under then Governor Ronald Reagan. The program was created to provide a consistent and structured means of undergrounding utility lines throughout the state with costs covered broadly by utility ratepayers.

Each year, Investor Owned Utilities (IOUs) propose their Rule 20A allocation amounts to the CPUC during annual general rate case proceedings. In this process, IOUs propose revised utility customer rates based on expected service costs, new energy procurement and projects for the following year, including Rule 20 allocations. The CPUC then reviews, amends, and approves IOU rates. Currently, the cumulative budgeted amount for Rule 20A for Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E), Southern California Edison (SCE), and San Diego Gas and Electric (SDG&E) totals around \$95.7 million.

The funding set aside by IOUs for Rule 20A is allocated to local governments through a credit system, with each credit holding a value to be used solely for the costs of an undergrounding project. The credit system was created so that local governments and IOUs can complete undergrounding projects without municipal financing. Through Rule 20A, municipalities that have developed and received city council approval for an undergrounding plan receive annual credits from the IOU in their service area. At the last count by the CPUC, over 500 local governments (cities and counties) participate in the credit system.

While these credits have no inherent monetary value, they can be traded in or banked for the conversion of overhead lines. Municipalities can choose to accumulate their credits until their credit balance is sufficient to cover these conversion projects, or choose to borrow future undergrounding allocations for a period of up to five years. Once the cumulative balance of credits is sufficient to cover the cost of a conversion project, the municipality and the utility can move forward with the undergrounding. All of the planning, design, and construction is performed by the participating utility. Upon the completion of an undergrounding project, the utility is compensated through the local government's Rule 20A credits.

At the outset of the program, the amount of allocated credits were determined by a formula which factored in the number of utility meters within a municipality in comparison to the utilities' service territory. However, in recent years the formula has changed. Credit allocations for IOUs, except for PG&E, are now determined based on the allocation a city or county received in 1990 and is then adjusted for the following factors:

- 50% of the *change from the 1990* total budgeted amount is allocated for the ratio of the number of overhead meters in any city or unincorporated area to the total system overhead meters; and
- 50% of the *change from the 1990* total budgeted amount is allocated for the ratio of the number of meters (which includes older homes that have overhead services, and newer homes with completely underground services) in any city or the unincorporated area to the total system meters.

As noted, PG&E has a different funding formula for their Rule 20A credit allocations as they are not tied to the 1990 base allocation. Prior to 2011, PG&E was allocating approximately five to six percent of its revenue to the Rule 20A program. The CPUC decided in 2011 that PG&E's Rule 20A allocations should be reduced by almost half in an effort to decrease the growing accumulation of credits amongst local governments. Since 2011, PG&E's annual allocations for Rule 20A have been around \$41.3 million annually, which is between two and three percent of their total revenue.

Criteria for Rule 20A Projects

For an undergrounding project to qualify for the Rule 20A program, there are several criteria that need to be met. The project must have a public benefit and:

- 1. Eliminate an unusually heavy concentration of overhead lines
- 2. Involve a street or road with a high volume of public traffic
- 3. Benefit a civic or public recreation area or area of unusual scenic interest,
- 4. Be listed as an arterial street or major collector as defined in the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) Guidelines

Notably, fire safety is excluded from the list of criteria that favors aesthetic and other public safety projects.

Rule 20A Credit System Imbalance Threatens Program Effectiveness

Allocations are made by utilities each year for Rule 20A credits. These current budget allocations total \$95.7 million a year. Currently, the cumulative balance of credits throughout the state totals over \$1 billion dollars. The Rule 20A cumulative balances aggregated by region can be found here.²

Note: The existing credit allocation formulas do not consider a municipality's need or plans for overhead conversion projects, resulting in large credit balances in some jurisdictions.

Cities and counties are, however, able to trade or sell unallocated Rule 20A credits if they will not be used to fund local undergrounding projects. There have been several cases where one agency has sold their unused credits, often for less than the full dollar value of the credits themselves to another agency.

Rule 20B

Rule 20B projects are those that do not fit the Rule 20A criteria, but do, however, involve both sides of the street for at least 600 feet. These projects are typically done in conjunction with larger developments and are mostly paid for by the developer or applicant. Additionally, the applicant is responsible for the installation.

Rule 20C

Rule 20C projects are usually small projects that involve property owners. The majority of the cost is usually borne by the applicants. Rule 20C applies when the project does not qualify for either Rule 20A or Rule 20B.

Rule 20D--Wildfire Mitigation Undergrounding Program

Rule 20D was approved by the CPUC in January of 2014 and only applies to SDG&E. The Rule 20D program was established largely in response to the destructive wildfires that occurred in San Diego in 2007 as a wildfire mitigation undergrounding program. According to SDG&E, the objective of the Rule 20D undergrounding is exclusively for fire hardening as opposed to aesthetics. The program is limited in scope and is restricted to communities in SDG&E's Fire Threat Zone (now referred to as the <u>High Fire Threat District or HFTD</u>). As of this time, the program has yet to yield any projects and no projects are currently planned.

For an undergrounding project to qualify for the Rule 20D program, a minimum of three of the following criteria must be met. The project must be near, within, or impactful to:

- Critical electric infrastructure
- Remaining useful life of electric infrastructure
- Exposure to vegetation or tree contact
- Density and proximity of fuel
- Critical surrounding non-electric assets (including structures and sensitive environmental areas)
- Service to public agencies
- Accessibility for firefighters

Similar to Rule 20A, SDG&E must allocate funding each year through their general rate case proceedings to Rule 20D to be approved by the CPUC. This funding is separate from the allocations SDG&E makes for Rule 20A. However, the process of distributing this funding to localities is different. The amount of funding allocated to each city and county for Rule 20D is based on the ratio of the number of miles of overhead lines in SDG&E Fire Threat Zones in a city or county to the total miles of SDG&E overhead lines in the entire SDG&E fire zone. The

Rule 20D program is administered by the utility consistent with the existing reporting, engineering, accounting, and management practices for Rule 20A.

The Committee may want to consider whether Rule 20D should instead be expanded, adapted, or further utilized to support funding for overhead conversions within VHFHSZ throughout the state.

Fiscal Impact:

The costs to the State associated with this Resolution will be related to the staff and programmatic costs to the CPUC to take the necessary measures to consider and adopt changes to Rule 20A to include projects in VHFHSZ to the list of criteria for eligibility.

This Resolution calls for an unspecified increase in funding for Rule 20A projects, inferring that portions of increased funds will go towards newly eligible high fire hazard zones. While the Resolution does not request a specific amount be allocated, it can be assumed that these increased costs will be supported by utility ratepayers. According to the CPUC, the annual allocations towards Rule 20A are \$95.7 million.

The CPUC currently reports a cumulative credit surplus valued at roughly \$1 billion that in various regions, given the approval of expanded eligibility called for by this Resolution, could be used to supplement and reduce the level of new dollars needed to make a significant impact in VHFHSZ. The CPUC follows that overhead conversion projects range from \$93,000 per mile for rural construction to \$5 million per mile for urban construction.

The Resolution states that "California is experiencing fire seasons of worsening severity" which is supported by not only the tremendous loss of property and life from recent wildfires, but also in the rising costs associated with clean up, recovery, and other economic losses with high estimates in the hundreds of billions of dollars.

The Committee may wish to consider the costs associated with undergrounding utility lines in relation to the costs associated with past wildfires and wildfires to come.

Comments:

CPUC Currently Exploring Revisions to Rule 20

In May 2017, the CPUC issued an Order Instituting Rulemaking to Consider Revisions to Electric Rule 20 and Related Matters. The CPUC will primarily focus on revisions to Rule 20A but may make conforming changes to other parts of Rule 20. The League is a party in these proceedings will provide comments.

Beyond Rule 20A: Additional Options for Funding Undergrounding Projects

There are various ways in which cities can generate funding for undergrounding projects that fall outside of the scope of Rule 20A. At the local level, cities can choose to forgo the Rule 20A process and opt to use their own General Fund money for undergrounding. Other options are also discussed below:

Rule 20D Expansion

The City of Berkley in a 2018 study titled "Conceptual Study for Undergrounding Utility Wires in Berkley," found that the city could possibly qualify for Rule 20D funding if they actively pursued this opportunity in partnership with PG&E and the CPUC.

One of the study's recommendations is to advocate for release of 20D funds (now earmarked exclusively for SDG&E) to be used for more aggressive fire hardening techniques for aboveground utility poles and equipment, for undergrounding power lines, and for more aggressive utility pole and vegetation management practices in the Very High Hazard Fire Zone within Berkeley's city limits.

As an alternative to changing the criteria for Rule 20A, the Committee may wish to consider whether there is the opportunity to advocate for the expansion of Rule 20D funding more broadly, expanding its reach to all IOU territories.

Franchise Surcharge Fees

Aside from Rule 20 allocations, cities can generate funding for undergrounding through franchise fee surcharges. For example, SDG&E currently operates under a 50-year City franchise that was granted in 1970. Under the franchises approved by the San Diego City Council in December 1970, SDG&E agreed to pay a franchise fee to the City equivalent to 3% of its gross receipts from the sales of both natural gas and electricity for 30 years.

These fees were renegotiated in 2000 and in 2001 an agreement was between the City of San Diego, SDG&E, and the CPUC to extend the existing franchise fee to include revenues collected from surcharges. SDG&E requested an increase of 3.88% to its existing electric franchise fee surcharge. The bulk, 3.53% of this increase is to be used for underground conversion of overhead electric wires.

Based on SDG&E's revenue projections, the increase would result in an additional surcharge revenue amount of approximately \$36.5 million per year. SDG&E estimates that this would create a monthly increase of approximately \$3.00 to a typical residential customer's electric bill. These surcharge revenues would pay for additional undergrounding projects including those that do not meet the Rule 20A criteria. The City of Santa Barbara has also adopted a similar franchise surcharge fee.

Having this funding source allows the City of San Diego to underground significantly more miles of above ground utility lines than other municipalities. However, the surcharge is currently being challenged in court, as it is argued that the City had SDG&E impose a tax without a ballot measure.

Utility Bankruptcy and Undergrounding Funding

In considering this Resolution, it is important to understand that Rule 20A allocations have been more substantial in the past. As mentioned earlier, prior to 2011, PG&E was allocating approximately 5% to 6% of its revenue to the Rule 20A program. Therefore, it is not unreasonable to encourage an increase in Rule 20A allocations as history shows that utilities had the capacity to do so in the past.

However, in a time where IOUs such as PG&E are facing bankruptcy as the result of utility caused wildfires, there is the possibility that expanding rule 20A funding will generate more costs for the ratepayers.

Questions to Consider:

- 1) Is Rule 20A or Rule 20D the more appropriate program to advocate for such an expansion?
- 2) Are there any wildfire risks outside of VHFHSZ that could be mitigated by undergrounding projects?

Existing League Policy:

Public Safety:

The League supports additional funding for local agencies to recoup the costs associated with fire safety in the community and timely mutual aid reimbursement for disaster response services in other jurisdictions. (pg. 43)

The League supports the fire service mission of saving lives and protecting property through fire prevention, disaster preparedness, hazardous-materials mitigation, specialized rescue, etc., as well as cities' authority and discretion to provide all emergency services to their communities. (pg. 43)





Currently, Rule 20A primarily addresses visual blight, but with fire seasons worsening, it is key that fire safety also be considered when local governments pursue Rule 20A projects, and that annual funding allocations for the program be expanded.

It is worth noting that the State does have a program, Rule 20D, that factors in fire safety for funding undergrounding projects. However, this is limited to San Diego Gas & Electric Company projects in certain areas only. This needs to be expanded to include projects in all projects within designated Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones.

WHEREAS, international transboundary rivers that carry water across the border from Mexico into Southern California are a major source of sewage, trash, chemicals, heavy metals and toxins; and

WHEREAS, transboundary flows threaten the health of residents in the United States and Mexico, harm important estuarine land and water of international significance, force closure of beaches, damage farmland, adversely impact the South San Diego County and Imperial County economy; compromise border security, and directly affect U.S. military readiness; and

WHEREAS, a significant amount of untreated sewage, sediment, hazardous chemicals and trash have been entering southern California through both the Tijuana River Watershed (75 percent of which is within Mexico) and New River flowing into southern California's coastal waterways and residential and agricultural communities in Imperial County eventually draining into the Salton Sea since the 1930s; and

WHEREAS, in February 2017, an estimated 143 million gallons of raw sewage flowed into the Tijuana River and ran downstream into the Pacific Ocean and similar cross border flows have caused beach closures at Border Field State Park that include 211 days in 2015; 162 days in 2016; 168 days in 2017; 101 days in 2018; and 187 days to date for 2019 as well as closure of a number of other beaches along the Pacific coastline each of those years; and

WHEREAS, approximately 132 million gallons of raw sewage has discharged into the New River flowing into California through communities in Imperial County, with 122 million gallons of it discharged in a 6-day period in early 2017; and

WHEREAS, the presence of pollution on state and federal public lands is creating unsafe conditions for visitors; these lands are taxpayer supported and intended to be managed for recreation, resource conservation and the enjoyment by the public, and

WHEREAS, the current insufficient and degrading infrastructure in the border zone poses a significant risk to the public health and safety of residents and the environment on both

sides of the border, and places the economic stress on cities that are struggling to mitigate the negative impacts of pollution; and

WHEREAS, the 1944 treaty between the United States and Mexico regarding *Utilization* of Waters of the Colorado and Tijuana Rivers and of the Rio Grande allocates flows on transborder rivers between Mexico and the United States, and provides that the nations, through their respective sections of the International Boundary Water Commission shall give control of sanitation in cross border flows the highest priority; and

WHEREAS, in 1993, the United States and Mexico entered into the Agreement Between the Government of the United States of America and the Government of the United Mexican States Concerning the Establishment of a North American Development Bank which created the North American Development Bank (NADB) to certify and fund environmental infrastructure projects in border-area communities; and

WHEREAS, public concerns in response to widespread threats to public health and safety, damage to fish and wildlife resources and degradation to California's environment resulting from transboundary river flow pollution in the southernmost regions of the state requires urgent action by the Federal and State governments, and

WHEREAS, Congress authorized funding under the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Safe Drinking Water Act and established the State and Tribal Assistance Grants (STAG) program for the U.S.-Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) in 1996 to provide grants for high-priority water, wastewater, and storm-water infrastructure projects within 100 kilometers of the southern border; and

WHEREAS, the EPA administers the STAG and BWIP programs, and coordinates with the North American Development Bank (NADB) to allocate BWIP grant funds to projects in the border zone; and

WHEREAS, since its inception, the BWIP program has provided funding for projects in California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas that would not have been constructed without the grant program; and

WHEREAS, the BWIP program was initially funded at \$100 million per year, but, over the last 20 years, has been continuously reduced to its current level of \$10 million; and

WHEREAS, in its FY 2020 Budget Request, the Administration proposed to eliminate the BWIP program; and

WHEREAS, officials from EPA Region 9, covering California, have identified a multitude of BWIP-eligible projects along the southern border totaling over \$300 million; and

WHEREAS, without federal partnership through the BWIP program and state support to address pollution, cities that are impacted by transboundary sewage and toxic waste flows are

left with limited resources to address a critical pollution and public health issue and limited legal remedies to address the problem; and

WHEREAS, the National Association of Counties, (NACo) at their Annual Conference on July 15, 2019 and the U.S. Conference of Mayors at their Annual Conference on in July 1, 2019 both enacted resolutions calling on the federal and state governments to work together to fund and address this environmental crisis; and

WHEREAS, local governments and the public support the State's primary objectives in complying with environmental laws including the Clean Water Act, Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act, and Endangered Species Act and are supported by substantial public investments at all levels of government to maintain a healthy and sustainable environment for future residents of California, and

WHEREAS, League of California Cities policy has long supported efforts to ensure water quality and oppose contamination of water resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED at the League General Assembly, assembled at the League Annual Conference on October 18, 2019 in Long Beach, that the League calls upon the Federal and State governments to restore and ensure proper funding to the U.S- Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) and recommit to working binationally to develop and implement long-term solutions to address serious water quality and contamination issues, such as discharges of untreated sewage and polluted sediment and trashladen transboundary flows originating from Mexico, that result in significant health, environmental, and safety concerns in communities along California's southern border impacting the state.

Background Information on Resolution No. 2

Background:

Along California's southern border with Mexico, the New River in Imperial County and the Tijuana River in San Diego County are a major sources of raw sewage, trash, chemicals, heavy metals, and toxins that pollute local communities. Sewage contaminated flows in the Tijuana River have resulted in significant impacts to beach recreation that includes the closure of Border Field State Beach for more than 800 days over the last 5-years. Similarly, contaminated flows in the New River presents comparable hazards, impacts farm land, and contributes to the ongoing crisis in the Salton Sea. These transboundary flows threaten the health of residents in California and Mexico, harms the ecosystem, force closures at beaches, damage farm land, makes people sick, and adversely affects the economy of border communities. The root cause of this cross border pollution is from insufficient or failing water and wastewater infrastructure in the border zone and inadequate federal action to address the problem through existing border programs.

The severity of cross border pollution has continued to increase, due in part to the rapid growth of urban centers since the passage of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). While economic growth has contributed to greater employment, the environmental infrastructure of the region has not kept pace, which is why Congress authorized the Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) in 1996. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) administers the BWIP and coordinates with the North American Development Bank (NADB) to provide financing and technical support for projects on both sides of the U.S./Mexico border. Unfortunately, the current BWIP funding at \$10 million per year is only a fraction of the initial program budget that shares funding with the entire 2,000 mile Mexican border with California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. EPA officials from Region 9 have identified an immediate need for BWIP projects totaling over \$300 million just for California. Without federal partnerships through the BWIP and state support to address cross border pollution, cities that are impacted by transboundary sewage and toxic waste flows are left with limited resources to address a critical pollution and public health issue.

The International Boundary and Water Commission (IBWC) is another important federal stakeholder that, under the Treaty of 1944 with Mexico, must address border sanitation problems. While IBWC currently captures and treats some of the pollution generated in Mexico, it also redirects cross border flows without treatment directly into California.

Improving environmental and public health conditions for communities along the border is essential for maintaining strong border economy with Mexico. The IBWC, EPA, and NADB are the important federal partners with existing bi-national programs that are able to immediately implement solutions on cross border pollution. California is in a unique position to take the lead and work with local and federal partners to implement real solutions that will addresses the long standing and escalating water quality crisis along the border.

For those reasons, the cities of Imperial Beach and Coronado requested the San Diego County Division to propose a resolution at the 2019 League Annual Conference calling upon the federal

and state governments to address the devastating impacts of international transboundary pollution flows into the waterways of the southernmost regions of California, San Diego and Imperial Counties and the Pacific Ocean.

On August 12, 2019 at the regularly scheduled meeting of the San Diego County Division, the membership unanimously endorsed submittal of the resolution, with close to 75% membership present and voting.

The Imperial County Division does not have a schedule meeting until after the deadline to submit proposed resolutions. However, the City of Calexico, which is most directly impacted by initial pollution flow of the New River from Mexicali, sent a letter in concurrence of this resolution as well as numerous city official from cities within Imperial County and the Imperial County Board of Supervisors. The League Imperial County Division will place a vote to support this resolution on the agenda of their September 26, 2019 meeting.

League of California Cities Staff Analysis on Resolution No. 2

Summary:

This Resolution states that the League of California Cities should call upon the State and Federal governments to restore and ensure proper funding for the U.S. – Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) and work bi-nationally to address water quality issues resulting from transboundary flows from Mexico's Tijuana River into the United States containing untreated sewage, polluted sediment, and trash.

Background:

The League of California Cities' San Diego County Division is sponsoring this resolution to address their concerns over the contaminated flows from the Tijuana River into California that have resulted in the degradation of water quality and water recreational areas in Southern California.

The Tijuana River flows north through highly urbanized areas in Mexico before it enters the Tijuana River Estuary and eventually the Pacific Ocean via waterways in San Diego County in California. Urban growth in Tijuana has contributed to a rise in rates of upstream flows from water treatment facilities in Mexico. These treatment facilities have raised the amount of untreated sewage and waste in the Tijuana River due to faulty infrastructure and improper maintenance. The federal government refers to the river as an "impaired water body" because of the presence of pollutants in excess, which pose significant health risks to residents and visitors in communities on both sides of the border.

Federal Efforts to Address Pollution Crisis

To remedy the Tijuana River's low water quality, the United States and Mexico entered into a Treaty in 1944 entitled: *Utilization of Waters of the Colorado River and Tijuana Rivers and of the Rio Grande – the International Boundary and Water Commission* (IBWC). The IBWC was designed to consist of a United States section and a Mexico section. Both sections were tasked with negotiating and implementing resolutions to address water pollution in the area, which includes overseeing the development of water treatment and diversion infrastructure.

After the formation of the IBWC, the U.S. and Mexico entered into a treaty in 1993 entitled: Agreement Concerning the Establishment of a Border Environment Cooperation Commission and a North American Development Bank. This agreement established the North American Development Bank (NADB), which certifies and funds infrastructure projects located within 100 kilometers (62 miles) of the border line. The NADB supports federal programs like the Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP), which was initially funded at \$100 million, annually.

The degradation of existing water treatment infrastructure along the border coincides with the federal government's defunding of the BWIP, which has steadily decreased from \$100 million in 1996 to \$10 million today. The Federal FY 2020 Budget proposes eliminating BWIP funding

altogether. EPA's regions 6 and 9 (includes U.S. states that border Mexico) have identified a number of eligible projects that address public health and environmental conditions along the border totaling \$340 million.

The NADB has funded the development of water infrastructure in both the U.S. and Mexico. Water diversion and treatment infrastructure along the U.S – Mexico border includes, but is not limited to, the following facilities:

- The South Bay International Wastewater Treatment Plant (SBIWTP). This facility was constructed by the U.S. in 1990 and is located on the California side of the border and is operated under the jurisdiction of the IBWC. The SBIWTP serves as a diversion and treatment sewage plant to address the flow of untreated sewage from Mexico into the United States.
- *Pump Station CILA*. CILA was constructed by Mexico in 1991 and is located along the border in Mexico. This facility serves as the SBIWTP's Mexican counterpart.

Both the SBIWTP and CILA facilities have had a multitude of overflows containing untreated sewage and toxic waste that spills into the Tijuana River. The cause of overflows can be attributed to flows exceeding the maximum capacity that the infrastructure can accommodate (this is exacerbated during wet and rainy seasons) and failure to properly operate and maintain the facilities. Much of the existing infrastructure has not had updates or repairs for decades, causing overflows to become more frequent and severe. The most notable overflow occurred in February 2017, wherein 143 million gallons of polluting waste discharged into the Tijuana River; affecting the Tijuana Estuary, the Pacific Ocean, and Southern California's waterways.

State Actions

In response to the February 2017 overflow, the San Diego Water Board's Executive Officer sent a letter to the U.S. and Mexican IBWC Commissioners which included recommendations on how to improve existing infrastructure and communications methods between both nations.

In September of 2018, California Attorney General Xavier Becerra submitted a lawsuit against IBWC for Violating the Clean Water Act by allowing flows containing sewage and toxic waste to flow into California's waterways, posing a public health and ecological crisis. The cities of Imperial Beach, San Diego, Chula Vista, the Port of San Diego, and the San Diego Regional Water Quality Board have also filed suit against the IBWC. The suit is awaiting its first settlement conference on October 19, 2019. If parties are unable to reach a settlement, the case will go to trial.

Fiscal Impact:

California's economy is currently the sixth largest in the world, with tourism spending topping \$140.6 billion in 2018. In the past five years, San Diego's Border Field State Park has been closed for over 800 days because of pollution from the Tijuana River. A decline in the State's beach quality and reputation could carry macroeconomic effects that could ripple outside of the San Diego County region and affect coastal communities throughout California.

Existing League Policy

The League of California Cities has extensive language on water in its Summary of Existing Policy and Guiding Principles. Fundamentally, the League recognizes that beneficial water quality is essential to the health and welfare of California and all of its citizens. Additionally, the League advocates for local, state and federal governments to work cooperatively to ensure that water quality is maintained.

The following policy relates to the issue of water quality:

- Surface and groundwater should be protected from contamination.
- Requirements for wastewater discharge into surface water and groundwater to safeguard public health and protect beneficial uses should be supported.
- When addressing contamination in a water body, water boards should place priority emphasis on clean-up strategies targeting sources of pollution, rather than in stream or end-of-pipe treatment.
- Water development projects must be economically, environmentally and scientifically sound.
- The viability of rivers and streams for instream uses such as fishery habitat, recreation and aesthetics must be protected.
- Protection, maintenance, and restoration of fish and wildlife habitat and resources.

Comments:

- 1. Water quality issues are prevalent across California and have been a constant priority of the State's legislature and residents. In 2014, California's voters approved Proposition 1, which authorized \$7.5 billion in general obligation bonds to fund water quality improvement projects. In 2019, the Legislature reached an agreement to allocate \$130 million from the State's Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF) to address failing water infrastructure and bad water qualities for over one million of California's residents in rural communities. Water quality is not an issue unique to the County of San Diego and communities along the border.
- 2. Tijuana River cross-border pollution has caught national attention. Members of Congress have proposed recent funding solutions to address the pollution crisis, including:
 - In February of 2019, California Congressional Representatives Vargas, Peters, and Davis helped secure \$15 million for the EPA to use as part of its BWIP.
 - H.R. 3895 (Vargas, Peters, 2019), The North American Development Bank Pollution Solution Act. This bill seeks to support pollution mitigation efforts along the border by increasing the NADB's capital by \$1.5 billion.
 - *H.R.* 4039 (Levin, 2019), The Border Water Infrastructure Improvement Act. This bill proposes increasing funding to the BWIP from the existing \$10 million to \$150 million as a continuous appropriation until 2025.

Additionally, the National Association of Counties (NACo) and the U.S. Conference of Mayors enacted resolutions in support of increased funding for U.S. – Mexico border water infrastructure to address the environmental crisis in 2019.

- 3. The border pollution problem has sparked action from local, state, and federal actors. Should this resolution be adopted, League membership should be aware that future action will be adapted by what is explicitly stated in the resolution's language. In current form, the resolution's resolve clause cites the BWIP as the only program that should receive reinstated and proper funding. League staff recommends the language be modified to state:
 - "NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED at the League General Assembly, assembled at the League Annual Conference on October 18, 2019 in Long Beach, that the League calls upon the Federal and State governments to restore and ensure proper funding for environmental infrastructure on the U.S. Mexico Border, including to the U.S. Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP), and recommit to working bi-nationally to develop and implement long-term solutions to address serious water quality and contamination issues, such as discharges of untreated sewage and polluted sediment and trash-laden transboundary flows originating from Mexico, that result in significant health, environmental, and safety concerns in communities along California's southern border impacting the state."

Modifying the language would ensure enough flexibility for the League to support funding mechanisms outside of the prescribed federally-operated BWIP.

4. It remains unclear if there is an appetite in Washington to fund border-related infrastructure projects that address environmental quality. Given the high probability of another overflow containing waste and sewage from the existing infrastructure operated by the IBWC, League membership should consider the outcome if no resolution is reached to address the issue.

SUBJECT: Approval of Second Amendment to City Manager Employment

Agreement

Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council approve the Second Amendment to Employment Agreement for Stephanie DeWolfe, City Manager, to provide a 2.5% increase in compensation.

Commission Review and Recommendation

This matter was not reviewed by any Commission.

Discussion/Analysis

The proposed amendment to the City Manager compensation package is a modest 2.5% increase in salary, raising her compensation from \$199,875 to \$204,872 annually. No other changes to her Employment Agreement are proposed. It is recommended that these adjustments in compensation be made retroactive to the beginning of the current pay period (e.g. September 16, 2019) for ease of payroll calculations.

Next Steps

If approved, the Human Resources Manager will initiate an "Employee Action Form" noting the adjustment in compensation, which will be applicable to the pay period beginning September 16, 2019.

Background

In accordance with the terms of her Employment Agreement, the City Manager meets with the Council in closed session for periodic performance evaluations. Given completion of a successful first year of employment with the City of South Pasadena, an adjustment in compensation is appropriate. All City employees in South Pasadena receive 5% step increases after satisfactory completion of each year of service, until they reach their top step in the job classification. The City Manager is the only classification which does not have "steps" as a mechanism for annual increases. Accordingly, the City Council formed a subcommittee consisting of Mayor Marina Khubesrian, M.D. and Mayor Pro Tem, Bob Joe, to discuss an adjustment in compensation for the City Manager, subsequent to her performance evaluation.

Consistent with the transparency requirements of the Brown Act, adjustments in executive compensation must be approved at a regular meeting of the City Council. Additionally, the

adjustment to compensation is required to be read into the record prior to approval, pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(c)(3).

Legal Review

The City Attorney prepared the accompanying Second Amendment to Employment Agreement, consistent with direction from the City Council subcommittee.

Fiscal Impact

Approval of the Second amendment to Employment Agreement will increase the City's Manager's salary by a total of \$4,997 annually, for a total pensionable annual salary of \$204,872.

Second Amendment to Employment Agreement

SECOND AMENDMENT TO EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

This SECOND AMENDMENT to the EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT dated September 20, 2017, by and between the CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, California, a Municipal Corporation, hereinafter called the "City" and STEPHANIE DEWOLFE, hereinafter called "Employee," is made and entered into by City and Employee as of the 18th day of September, 2019.

RECITALS

- A. City desires to continue to retain the services of Employee in the position of City Manager, and Employee desires to continue employment as City Manager of the City; and
- B. The City Council desires to provide Employee with an additional 2.5% salary increase, in recognition of successful completion of the second year of service under the Agreement dated September 20, 2017.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. Paragraph 3 "Compensation," subsection A is amended to read:

"A. Effective September 16, 2019, City shall pay Employee for the performance of Employee's duties as City Manager under this Agreement an annual base salary of \$204,872 (Two Hundred and Four Thousand, Eight-Hundred and Seventy-Two Dollars).

In addition to the annual salary described above, effective February 4, 2019, City shall pay Employee an additional \$175 (One Hundred and Seventy-Five Dollars) each month, to compensate Employee for her increased out-of-pocket costs of medical insurance. This additional \$175/month is taxable income, which nets to approximately \$129 for medical insurance cost reimbursement after taxes, but is not considered pensionable compensation."

<u>Section 2.</u> All other terms and conditions of the Employment Agreement dated September 20, 2017, shall remain in full force and effect.

RECITALS

- A. City desires to continue to retain the services of Employee in the position of City Manager, and Employee desires to continue employment as City Manager of the City; and
- B. The City Council desires to provide Employee with a salary increase, in recognition of successful completion of the first year of service under the Agreement dated September 20, 2017, and also adjust compensation to mitigate the rising costs of Employee's group medical insurance plan.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. Paragraph 3 "Compensation," subsection A is amended to read:

"A. Effective February 4, 2019, City shall pay Employee for the performance of Employee's duties as City Manager under this Agreement an annual base salary of \$199,875 (One Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand and Eight-Hundred and Seventy-Five Dollars).

In addition to the annual salary described above, effective February 4, 2019, City shall pay Employee an additional \$129 (One Hundred and Twenty-Nine Dollars) each month, to compensate Employee for her increased out-of-pocket costs of medical insurance. This additional \$129/month is taxable income but is not considered pensionable compensation,"

<u>Section 2.</u> All other terms and conditions of the Employment Agreement dated September 20, 2017, shall remain in full force and effect.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into as of the 20th day of September 2017, by and between the CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, California, a Municipal Corporation, hereinafter called the "City", and Stephanie DeWolfe, hereinafter called "Employee."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Employer requires the serves of a City Manager;

WHEREAS, Employee has the necessary education, experience, skills and expertise to serve as the Employer's City Manager;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter contained, the parties agree as follows:

1. **Powers and Duties of the City Manager**. The City Council hereby employs Employee as City Manager of the City of South Pasadena to perform the functions and duties specified in the South Pasadena Municipal Code (Section 2.18-6) and the California Government Code and to perform other legally permissible and proper duties and functions as the City Council shall from time to time assign, subject to this Agreement. Such duties and functions shall include but not be limited to serving as the Executive Director of the Successor Agency to the form Redevelopment Agency, the Public Finance Authority, the Housing Authority and as Emergency Operations Director. The City Council may from time to time fix other terms and conditions of employment relating to the performance of Employee provided such terms and conditions are not inconsistent with or in conflict with the provisions of this Agreement, the City's Municipal Code, or other applicable law.

Employee agrees to devote Employee's full time and effort to the performance of this Agreement and to remain in the exclusive employ of City and not to become otherwise employed while this Agreement is in effect without the prior written approval of the City Council.

2. **Term.** Employee shall report to work on November 6, 2017 ("Commencement Date"). The Term of this Agreement shall be a period of four years, commencing November 6, 2017 and ending, unless extended, on October 31, 2021. The Employee serves at the pleasure of the City Council and nothing herein shall be taken to imply or suggest a guaranteed tenure.

3. Compensation.

- A. City shall pay Employee for the performance of Employee's duties as City Manager under this Agreement an annual base salary of \$195,000 (One Hundred Ninety-Five Thousand Dollars).
- B. Employee shall be paid at the same intervals and in the same manner as regular City employees, pursuant to an approved salary schedule, less customary and legally required payroll deductions. Employee shall be

exempt from paid overtime compensation and from Social Security taxes, other than the mandatory Medicare portion of such taxes. Salary and/or benefit adjustments may be considered by the City Council annually in conjunction with Employee's annual performance evaluation pursuant to Paragraph 8 of this Agreement.

C. Employee is considered a "classic" CalPERS member. Employee shall pay Employee's share of CalPERS pension costs. Employee shall be entitled to all benefits, rights and privileges, including but limited to CalPERS Retirement, vacation, management leave, sick leave and health insurance plan benefits, accorded to non-public safety City Department Directors, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement. If there is any conflict between this Agreement and any resolution fixing compensation and benefits for non-public safety City Department Director or other unclassified employees, this Agreement shall control.

D. Notwithstanding Paragraph 3.C. above:

- i. Employee shall accrue 160 hours of vacation annually, which shall accrue on a monthly basis. Upon request to the Council, Employee may receive an advance of up to 5 days (40 hours) of vacation to use over the 2017 Christmas season. Employee may not accrue more than two years of unused vacation;
- ii. Employee shall receive 80 hours of management leave annually, which shall be provided initially upon Employee's Commencement Date, and thereafter, on July 1st of each year. Employee is permitted to cash out 80 hours of management leave by June 30th of each year. Unused management leave shall not be carried over to the following calendar year;
- iii. Employee shall receive 24 hours of sick leave upon her Commencement Date, in addition to the accrual of 8 hours of sick leave for every month of employment. There is no accrual cap on sick leave.
- 4. Automobile. City shall provide Employee a monthly auto allowance of \$500, which Employee acknowledges shall be subject to taxation. Such auto allowance is conditioned on Employee's commitment that should she purchase or lease a new vehicle during her tenure as City Manager, that such vehicle will be a fuel efficient hybrid, plug in hybrid electric vehicle (PHEV), all electric, compressed natural gas (CNG) hydrogen fuel cell, or other low-emission/alternative fuel vehicle. Pursuant to Government Code Section 7522.34, reimbursement for use of one's private vehicle through an auto allowance is not considered pensionable compensation; accordingly, City shall not include the monthly payment of auto allowance in employee's salary for purposes of PERS reporting. Except as expressly provided herein, Employee shall be responsible for paying for all liability, property damage, and comprehensive insurance and for the purchase, operation, maintenance, repair and replacement of any personal automobile she may use in the conduct of the City's business. Notwithstanding Employee's monthly auto allowance, Employee commits to use of public transit whenever

practicable.

- 5. Hours of Work. Employee is an exempt employee and is expected to engage in those hours of work that are necessary to fulfill the obligations of the City Manager's position. Employee shall maintain a regular work schedule consistent with that approved by the City Council for other management employees of the City. It is anticipated that Employee will devote a great deal of time outside the City's normal office hours to the business of City and to that end Employee's schedule or work each day and week shall vary in accordance with the work required to be performed. The Employee will spend sufficient hours on site to perform the City Manager duties and it is also anticipated that the Employee will perform some of her City Manager duties off site, such as attendance at community meetings or events, and meetings with other government officials. Employee shall not be entitled to additional compensation for such time.
- 6. **Professional Development.** Employer agrees to budget for and to pay the professional dues, subscriptions, travel and subsistence expenses of Employee for professional participation in appropriate organizations such as but not limited to the League of California Cities, International City/County Management Association, and San Gabriel Valley City Managers' Association.
- 7. **General Expenses.** City recognizes that certain expenses of a non-personal and job-related nature may be incurred by Employee. City agrees to reimburse Employee for reasonable expenses that are authorized by the City budget, submitted to the City Council for approval and that are supported by expense receipts, statements or personal affidavits, and audit thereof in like manner as other demands against the City.

Employer will provide all equipment necessary for the completion of Employee's duties. This equipment shall include, but not be limited to, cellular phone, computers and other electronic devices deemed appropriate by the Employee. Employer acknowledges and approves incidental personal use by Employee during the term of this Agreement. In addition, Employer shall bear the full cost of any fidelity or other bonds required of the Employee under any law or ordinance. Finally, Employer shall budget an additional \$1,000 annually for membership fees and dues for Employee to serve in local clubs and/or organizations that serve the City of South Pasadena.

8. **Performance Evaluation**. During the first 30 days of employment Employee and the City Council will meet to develop an initial transition plan, which will be a basis for the Employee's initial performance evaluation. Employee shall initiate and schedule an initial performance evaluation to take place six months after Employee's services for the City begins ("initial performance evaluation"). At the initial performance evaluation, the City Council and Employee shall develop mutually agreeable performance goals and criteria which the City Council shall use in reviewing Employee's performance at the first annual performance evaluation in 2018.

The City Council shall review and evaluate the Employee's performance annually on the anniversary of this Agreement. As part of this annual performance evaluation, the City Council and Employee shall jointly define such goals and performance objectives that they determine necessary for the proper operation of the City of South Pasadena and in the attainment of the City Council's policy objectives and shall further establish a relative priority among those various

goals and objectives. At any performance evaluation, Employee will be afforded an adequate opportunity to discuss each evaluation with the City Council. Among other things, the evaluation shall include the City Council's and Employee's expectations of one another. Nothing herein shall constrain the City Council from establishing a work plan, the priorities or objectives therefor, or changing or modifying the plan. It shall be the Employee's responsibility to initiate the review for the initial performance evaluation, as well as for the annual performance evaluation each year.

- 9. **Indemnification.** City shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify Employee against any non-intentional tort, professional liability claim or demand or other legal action, whether groundless or otherwise, arising out of an alleged act or omission occurring in the performance of Employee's duties as City Manager, to the extent required by Government Code §§ 825 and 995. Said indemnification shall extend beyond termination of employment or expiration of this Agreement. Pursuant to Government Code § 825(a), the City reserves the right not to pay any judgment, compromise, or settlement until it is established that the injury arose out of an act or omission occurring within the scope of the Employee's employment as an employee of the City.
- of the duties of Employee within and on behalf of the City of South Pasadena and its citizenry, Employee shall not, during the term of this Agreement, individually, as a partner, joint venture, officer or shareholder, invest or participate in any business venture conducting business in the corporate limits of the City of South Pasadena, except for stock ownership in any company whose capital stock is publically held and regularly traded, without prior approved of the City Council. For and during the term of this Agreement, Employee further agrees, except for a personal residence or residential property acquired or held for future use as her personal residence, not to invest in any other real estate or property improvements within the corporate limits of the City of South Pasadena, without the prior consent of the City Council. Employee further agrees that she will refrain from conduct which might cause the appearance of a conflict of interest with her position and duties as City Manager.

11. Separation.

A. Resignation/Retirement.

Employee may resign and/or retire at any time and agrees to give the City at least 45 (45) days advance written notice of the effective date of the Employee's resignation and/or retirement.

B. Termination and Removal.

- 1. Employee is an at-will employee serving at the pleasure of the City Council as provided in Government Code Section 36506.
- 2. It is understood by the Parties to this Agreement that termination and/or removal of the Employee, with or without cause, is subject to the procedures set forth in Section 2.18-8 (Removal Procedure)

of the South Pasadena Municipal Code and the following provisions to the extent that they are not in conflict with the aforementioned removal procedure.

- 3. The City Council may remove Employee from the position of City Manager at any time, with or without cause, by majority vote of its members. Notice of termination shall be provided to Employee in writing. "Termination," as used in this paragraph, shall also include the request that Employee resign, a reduction in salary or other financial benefits of the City Manager, a material reduction in the powers and authority of the City Manager, or the elimination of the City Manager's position. Any such notice of termination or act constituting termination shall be given at or effectuated at a duly noticed regular meeting of the City Council.
- 4. Given the at-will nature of the position of Employee as City Manager, an important element of the employment Agreement pertains to termination. It is in both the City's interest and that of Employee that any separation of Employee is done in a businesslike manner.

C. <u>Separation Without Cause.</u>

- 1. In the event Employee is terminated by the City Council during the term of this Agreement where Employee is willing and able to perform the City Manager's duties under this Agreement, then in that event the City agrees to pay Employee a lump payment equal to six (6) months' base salary then in effect as provided in Paragraph 3A or a lump sum payment equal to the remaining term of the Agreement, whichever is shorter.
- 2. In addition, the City shall extend to Employee the right to continue health insurance as may be required by and pursuant to the terms and conditions of the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1986 (COBRA). In the event that the City pays a six (6) months' severance to Employee pursuant to Paragraph 11.C.1. above, City agrees to pay Employee's COBRA coverage for six months, or until Employee either secures full-time employment or obtains other health insurance, whichever of these three events first occurs. Employee shall notify the City within five days of securing new full-time employment or insurance.
- 3. All payments required under Paragraph 11.C.1. and 2. above are subject to and shall be interpreted to comply with the limitations set forth in Government Code Section 53260.

D. Separation for Cause.

- 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of Paragraph 11.C., Employee may be terminated for cause. As used in this section "cause" shall mean only one or more of the following:
 - i. Conviction of a felony;
 - ii. Continued abuse of non-prescription drugs or alcohol that materially affects the performance of Employee's duties as City Manager;
 - iii. Repeated and protracted unexcused absences from the City Manager's office and duties or absence due to disability if such disability precludes performance of essential job duties for more than six (6) cumulative months after attempts at reasonable accommodations pursuant to the Americans with Disabilities Act and/or California's Fair Employment & Housing Act;
 - iv. Upon the reasonable determination of the City Council that Employee has committed either (a) any illegal act involving personal gain to Employee or (b) gross negligence or (c) malfeasance.
- 12. **Reimbursement to City Required.** The following limitations apply to City's obligation to Employee pursuant to Paragraphs 9 and 11 above:
 - A. <u>Paid Leave</u>. Pursuant to Government Code Section 53243, in the event the Employee is placed on paid leave pending an investigation, Employee shall reimburse such pay to City if she is subsequently convicted of a crime of moral turpitude or that constitutes "abuse of office or position," as that term is defined by Government Code Section 53243.4;
 - B. <u>Legal Defense</u>. Pursuant to Government Code Section 53243.1, in the event the City pays for Employee's legal criminal defense, she shall fully reimburse such funds to the City if she is subsequently convicted of a crime of moral turpitude of that constitutes "abuse of office or position;"
 - C Severance. Pursuant to Government Code Section 53243.2, if this Agreement is terminated, any cash settlement related to the termination that Employee may receive from City, including any severance paid under Paragraph 11, must be fully reimbursed to City if she is subsequently convicted of a crime of moral turpitude or that constitutes "abuse of office or position."

13. General Provisions.

A. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. The parties hereby acknowledge that they have neither made nor accepted any other promise or obligation with respect to the subject matter of this

Agreement. This Agreement may be amended only by a writing signed by Employee, approved by the City Council, and executed on behalf of both parties.

- B. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs at law and executors of the Employee.
- C. This Agreement may be terminated by either party, with or without cause, subject only to the requirements of Paragraph 11 above. Notice of termination to the City shall be given in writing, either by personal service or by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, addressed to City as follows:

Any notice to Employee shall be given in a like manner, and, if mailed, shall be addressed to Employee at the address then shown in City's personnel records. For the purpose of determining compliance with any time limit stated in this Agreement, a notice shall be deemed to have duly been given on the date of delivery, if served personally on the party to whom notice is to be given, or on the second (2nd) calendar day after mailing in the manner provided in this section. Notwithstanding the forgoing, this Agreement shall automatically terminate on the death or permanent disability of Employee.

- D. A waiver of any of the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall not be construed as a general waiver by the City and the City shall be free to enforce any term or condition of this Agreement with or without notice to Employee notwithstanding any prior waiver of that term or condition.
- E. If any provision or any portion of this Agreement is held to be unconstitutional, invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of the Agreement shall be deemed severable and shall not be affected and shall remain in full force and effect.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council approve the attached Resolution adopting the City's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP).

Commission Review and Recommendation

This matter was reviewed by the Public Safety Commission and the Planning Commission. Both commissions recommend that the City Council adopt the Plan.

Community Outreach

The community had the opportunity to comment on the Plan during the Public Safety Commission Meeting on April 9, 2018; the Planning Commission Meeting on April 23, 2018; through the City website from May 7, 2018 to June 9, 2018; and the June 20, 2018 City Council Public Hearing.

In July 2018, the draft LHMP was sent to the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES). Cal OES performed a review and on June 13, 2019, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) determined that the LHMP would be eligible for approval pending City Council final adoption of the plan.

Discussion/Analysis

The LHMP is a document that outlines potential hazards within the City. Some examples of natural hazards that exist in the City are earthquakes, flooding, fires and severe weather. Each section of the Mitigation Plan provides information and resources to assist people in understanding the hazard-related issues facing residents, businesses, and the environment. A successful hazard mitigation strategy enables the implementation and sustentation of local actions that reduce vulnerability and risk from hazards, or reduce the severity of the effects of hazards on people and property. As stated in the Fiscal Impact section, approval of this Plan will make the City eligible to receive state and federal disaster reimbursement and recovery funds that are made available under local, state, and federal disaster declarations.

Next Steps

- 1. Upon final adoption of the City Council, The approved Resolution and LHMP will be sent to FEMA for final Approval.
- 2. The final approval/effective date of the LHMP will be September 18, 2019 and will stay in effect until September 18, 2024.

Background

According to FEMA, the purpose of mitigation planning is to identify policies and actions that can be implemented over the long term to reduce risk and future losses from disasters. Mitigation plans form the foundation for a community's long-term strategy to reduce disaster losses and break the cycle of disaster damage, reconstruction, and repeated damage. The planning process is as important as the plan itself. It creates a framework for risk-based decision making to reduce damages to lives, property, and the economy from future disasters.

Following the Hurricane Katrina disaster in the Gulf of Mexico in 2005, the federal government mandated that state and local governments create and adopt federally approved LHMPs. LHMPs are designed to help local governments to identify natural and man-made disasters and to take steps to mitigate the effects. Although disasters may be impossible to predict and/or avoid, steps must be taken to lessen the potential impact of these disasters to persons and property. It was determined in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina that steps to prepare and recover from the disaster were not identified, planned for, or taken.

State and local governments must prepare and adopt federally approved LHMPs in order to comply with FEMA requirements. The LHMP is eligible for final approval pending City Council approval in its current form. Federal guidelines require that LHMPs be adopted by local governing authorities and revised and updated every five years. This plan was first developed in 2005 and was last updated in 2012.

Legal Review

The City Attorney has reviewed this item.

Fiscal Impact

Approval of the LHMP will make the City eligible to receive State and federal grant funds as well as disaster reimbursement and recovery funds that are made available under local, state, and federal disaster declarations.

Public Notification of Agenda Item

The public was made aware that this item was to be considered this evening by virtue of its inclusion on the legally publicly noticed agenda, posting of the same agenda and reports on the City's website and/or notice in the *South Pasadena Review* and/or the *Pasadena Star-News*.

WHEREAS, the City of South Pasadena recognizes the threat that natural hazards pose to people and property within our community; and

WHEREAS, the Disaster Mitigation Act made available hazard mitigation grants to state and local governments; and

WHEREAS, an adopted Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP) is required as a condition of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for future funding for mitigation projects post-disaster mitigation grant programs; and

WHEREAS, the City of South Pasadena fully participated in the FEMA-prescribed mitigation planning process to prepare this LHMP; and

WHEREAS, the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) and FEMA, Region IX officials have reviewed the City of South Pasadena LHMP and approved it contingent upon this official adoption of the participating governing body; and

WHEREAS, adopting by the governing body for the City of South Pasadena, demonstrates the jurisdiction's commitment to fulfilling the mitigation goals and objectives outlined in this LHMP; and

WHEREAS, adoption of the plan authorizes responsible agencies to carry out their responsibilities under the plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the City of South Pasadena adopts the City's LHMP as an official Plan.

SECTION 2. That the City of South Pasadena adopts the City's LHMP by reference into the Safety Element of the City's General Plan in accordance with the requirements of AB 2140.

SECTION 3. That the City of South Pasadena will submit this adopted resolution the California Office of Emergency Services and FEMA Region IX officials to enable the plan's final approval in accordance with the requirements of the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 and to establish conformance with the requirements of AB 2140.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk of the City of South Pasadena shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and its approval by the City Council and shall cause the same to be listed in the records of the City.

1) Appreciate how the 2019 mitigation actions are charted out in order by hazard type and then the breakdown of responsible party, funding sources, etc. You made the review easier and for the implementation phase, the info is clear and easily accessible too.

Opportunities for Improvement:

 There is the prioritization on the 2019 Table 24 chart but it doesn't show any dollar amounts. A general idea of cost can help in the prioritization of projects and grant opportunities.

Element D: Plan Update, Evaluation, and Implementation (Plan Updates Only)

Strengths:

- 1) Identification of a lead person to take ownership of, and champion the Plan;

Not-to-Exceed Amount of \$135,000

Recommendation Action:

It is recommended that the City Council authorize the City Manager to purchase carbon media from Calgon Carbon Corporation (Calgon) for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$135,000 for the Wilson Wellhead Treatment System.

Commission Review and Recommendation:

This matter was not reviewed by a Commission.

Background:

The Wilson Wellhead Treatment project was completed in March of 2019 with the City Council approving the notice of completion on April 17, 2019. The state of the art facility of the Wilson Wellhead Treatment System project consists of a Granular Activate Carbon (GAC) wellhead treatment system with eight 20,000 lbs vessels, providing not only a permanent compliance with the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) 1,2,3,-Trichloropropane (1,2,3-TCP) regulation but also exceeding the water quality guidelines.

Discussion/Analysis:

Within the Wilson Wellhead Treatment System, the groundwater from the Wilson wells pass through the GAC wellhead treatment system vessels and the granular active carbon media inside the vessels remove 1,2,3-TCP contaminate from the water so that it is safe to drink for the customers. In order to comply with the operational guidelines of the State Water Resources Control Board Division of Drinking Water (SWRCB-DDW) and continue to effectively operate the Wilson Wellhead Treatment System, the replacement of the carbon media is essential and warranted.

Since this is the first change out of the spent carbon media, the purchase of the 80,000 lbs. of new carbon media is necessary. As part of the replacement process, Calgon Carbon Corporation

will remove the existing carbon media and replace it with new carbon media for the City. The new carbon media will allow the Wilson Wellhead Treatment System to operate more efficiently and comply with SWRCB-DDW's contamination mitigation guidelines. The spent carbon media owned by the City will be reactivated at Calgon's facility in Arizona. After the treatment, the reactivated carbon media will be stored at Calgon's facility in Santa Fe Spring, California for the City's future use. The City will use this reactivated carbon media for the next change out, and depending upon the condition of the reactivated carbon media, the City's next replacement costs may be reduced up to forty percent. Because the City purchased the carbon from Carbon Calgon Corporation and will be using the same purchased carbon which will be reactivated at Calgon's facility, this purchase is qualifies for sole source purchase exemption from the Public Contracts Code pursuant to SPMC § 2.99-37(a)(3).

Legal Review

The City Attorney has reviewed this item.

Fiscal Impact

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-20 Budget adopted by the City Council includes funding for the purchase of the carbon media in Water Production Contract Services Account No.500-6010-6711-8180.

Environmental Analysis

This item is exempt from any California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) analysis based on State CEQA Guidelines Section 15301 Existing Facilities.

STATE WATER RESOURCES CONTROL BOARD RESOLUTION NO. 2017-0042

ADOPTING THE PROPOSED REGULATIONS FOR A 1,2,3-TRICHLOROPROPANE (1,2,3-TCP) MAXIMUM CONTAMINANT LEVEL (MCL) OF 5 PARTS PER TRILLION

WHEREAS:

- 1. All public water systems are subject to regulations adopted by the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) under the California Safe Drinking Water Act (Health & Safety Code, div. 104, pt. 12, ch. 4, §116270 et seq.);
- 2. The State Water Board is responsible for adopting primary drinking water standards, which include Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs);
- 3. Health & Safety Code section 116365 requires the State Water Board to set the MCL as close to the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA)-published public health goal (PHG) as is technologically and economically feasible, placing primary emphasis on the protection of public health;
- 4. In 2009, OEHHA established a PHG for 1,2,3-Trichloropropane (1,2,3-TCP) of 0.7 parts per trillion (ppt) that is based on cancer risk;
- 5. On March 3, 2017, the State Water Board published a notice of proposed rulemaking pursuant to the requirements of the California Administrative Procedure Act (APA), initiating the mandatory 45-day public comment period, which ran from March 4 through April 21, 2017. Concurrently, the State Water Board released a Notice of Intent to adopt an Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration (IS/MND) for public comment (SCH# 2017032015) pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA);
- 6. The State Water Board held a public hearing on April 19, 2017. The purpose and intent of the public comment period and public hearing was to receive verbal and written comments from the public on the proposed regulations in accordance with the APA;
- 7. Following the conclusion of the public comment period on April 21, 2017, State Water Board staff compiled, reviewed, and prepared draft responses to every comment received during the comment period in a "Draft Initial Response to Comments" table that was made available to the public;
- 8. Following the conclusion of the public comment period on April 21, 2017, State Water Board staff has compiled, reviewed, and responded to every comment received during the comment period;
- 9. Based on the staff evaluation, none of the public comments resulted in modifications to the proposed regulations or the IS/MND, and no additional public comment period was required under the APA or CEQA;
- 10. The IS/MND reflects the State Water Board's independent judgment and analysis. After considering the document and comments received during the public review process, the State Water Board hereby determines that the proposed project, with the mitigation measures described therein, will not have a significant effect on the environment. The documents or other material, which constitute the record, are located at the State Water Board;

- 11. Minor modifications to the Initial Statement of Reasons (ISOR) and final responses to all comments that were received during the public comment period will be prepared to conform to action taken at the board meeting and contained in the Final Statement of Reasons (FSOR), and submitted to the Office of Administrative Law (OAL) as part of the regulations package;
- 12. All elements of the regulatory package are posted on the program webpage at: http://www.waterboards.ca.gov/drinking_water/certlic/drinkingwater/123TCP_SBDDW-17-001.shtml; and
- 13. Written comments received during the public comment period are available at: https://www.waterboards.ca.gov/public notices/comments/trichloropropane/.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- The State Water Board adopts the <u>IS/MND</u> for the proposed regulations, and will include as a condition in the amended permits to drinking water systems mitigation measures necessary to reduce or eliminate significant impacts on the environment. The State Water Board directs staff to file a Notice of Determination within five days from the issuance of this resolution;
- 2. The State Water Board adopts the <u>proposed regulations</u> for a 1,2,3-TCP MCL of 5 ppt, which will make modifications to Title 22, California Code of Regulations, Sections 64444, 64445, 64445.1, 64447.4, 64465, and 64481;
- 3. The State Water Board Executive Director shall sign Form 400 and State Water Board staff shall submit the adopted regulations to OAL for filing with the Secretary of State; and
- 4. If, prior to OAL filing the regulations with the Secretary of State, State Water Board staff, the State Water Board, or OAL staff determine that non-substantive corrections to the language of the regulations or supporting documentation are needed for clarity or consistency, the State Water Board Executive Director may make such changes.

Approval of the Fiscal Year 2019-20 Water Conservation Rebate

Program in the Amount of \$150,000

Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council approve the Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-20 water conservation rebates and programs in the amount of \$150,000 funded from the existing FY 2018-19 water efficiency projects budget.

Commission Review and Recommendation

This matter was reviewed by the Natural Resources and Environmental Commission (NREC) at their August 27, 2019 meeting. The Commission approved the proposed Water Conservation Rebates and Programs.

Community Outreach

The approved FY 2019-20 water rebate program information including guidelines and application forms will be included on the City's website, e-newsletter, and other social media channels. In addition, the budget includes an allocation for utility bill inserts and a newsletter, which will incorporate information on water conservation rebates, education and programs.

Executive Summary

Annually, the City Council adopts a water conservation program funded through a water efficiency fee billed to all City of South Pasadena (City) water customers. The program includes rebates, education/outreach, water conservation material, and projects to promote water conservation throughout the City. In FY 2018-19, the program paid out a total of \$16,461.84 in incentives to South Pasadena residents and businesses. These efforts helped the City reduce its water usage by 23%. The proposed water conservation program for the current fiscal year intends to build upon these efforts to continue reducing water use citywide. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, approximately 30% of the water usage in households is devoted to outdoor uses; half of which is wasted from inefficient watering methods. In consideration of these facts, the FY 2019-20 program focuses on incentivizing and promoting outdoor water conservation efforts including upgrading irrigation systems, removing turf, and converting impervious surfaces. In addition to

conserving water, these incentives will increase stormwater capture and recharge the groundwater basin.

Background

Since the State of California declared a drought in January 2014, the City has made a concerted effort to increase water conservation and improve water efficiency. During the drought, the City met the State Water Resource Control Board (SWRCB) imposed water conservation requirements. Although the Governor rescinded the drought state of emergency in April 2017, provisions of Executive Order B-37-16, "Making Conservation a California Way of Life," were proclaimed to remain in full force and effect. For the past fiscal year, the City's water use reduction was 23%. In order to continue the City's successful water conservation efforts and to provide the best programs and assistance possible to the residents and businesses, staff recommends approval of the proposed Water Conservation Programs for FY 2019-20.

Discussion/Analysis

Annually, the South Pasadena City Council has adopted a water conservation program that includes rebates, education/outreach, water conservation material, and projects to promote water conservation throughout the City. For FY 2019-20, redundancies in the program were removed to better maximize resources for promoting outdoor water conservation. The proposed water conservation program includes the following:

1. <u>City Co-Funding Metropolitan Water District Rebates</u>

The Metropolitan Water District (MWD) offers residential and commercial rebates on indoor and outdoor devices as well as turf removal through their SoCalWater\$mart Program. In addition, the City adds supplemental funds to these rebates. Residents and business owners can apply for these rebates directly through the SoCalWater\$mart website and receive rebate checks that include both the MWD and City contributions. The proposed budget includes \$20,000 for residential MWD rebates and \$20,000 for commercial MWD rebates.

For the FY 2019-20, MWD is offering the same rebates as the previous year; therefore, most of the proposed City incentives require the same funding amount as adopted in FY 2018-19. The main changes include a proposed additional City co-fund amount for the turf removal programs for both the residential and commercial sectors. This increase will further incentivize residents and business owners to remove their turf and replace it with California native plants and water efficient landscaping. For a complete list of MWD rebates and City co-funding, see Tables 1 and 2 in Attachment 1.

2. City Rebate Program

In addition to the MWD rebates, the City has its own rebate program that offers rebates on water conservation devices and landscaping that are not offered through MWD. These City rebates address our local water conservation needs and further encourage South Pasadena residents and business owners to implement water saving practices and play an active role in conserving our water sources. The proposed budget includes \$35,000 for residential City rebates and \$30,000 for commercial City rebates. For a complete list of City rebates, see Table 3 in Attachment 1.

The proposed City rebate program for FY 2019-20 has a few changes from the previous year; mainly, the elimination of the showerhead and toilet rebates and the increased focus on outdoor water conservation rebates. Indoor water conservation devices including low-flow showerheads and low-flow aerators are currently offered for free at City Hall to all South Pasadena residents and business owners. These devices will continue to be offered for free in FY 2019-20. Removing this redundancy will better maximize resources for the promotion of other incentives.

Standards for water efficient toilets are increasing and high efficiency toilets (those that flush at 1.28 gallons per flush) are becoming more standard. To encourage residents and business owners to go above and beyond the standard and to align ourselves with the standards of MWD, Staff is proposing to eliminate the rebate for high efficiency toilets and increase promotion of the MWD rebate for premium high efficiency toilets (those that flush at 1.1 gallon per flush).

The Impervious Surface Conversion Program is a City rebate program established FY 2018-19 to increase storm water capture, replenish the ground water basin, and reduce storm water runoff. The program will be promoted this FY 2019-20. Customers who receive a rebate for converting their impervious surface can also apply for other City rebates. To qualify for the Impervious Surface Conversion Program, customers must perform the following:

- Remove a minimum of 200 square feet (maximum 1,000 square feet) of impervious surface such as concrete, asphalt, grouted pavers, or surface that water cannot penetrate through
- Till the subsurface so it is no longer compacted
- Replace with a pervious surface such as vegetation, swales, rain gardens, pervious pavement or permeable interlocking concrete pavers

3. Residential And Commercial Water-Use Assessments

The 2018-19 FY included a Residential and Commercial Water Audit Survey Program targeting single-family homes using 60 units of water or more per billing cycle (two months). The program consists of an on-site assessment that identifies indoor and/or outdoor sources of water use and water waste, and education on water conservation measures including rebates and incentives. This program will be promoted to residents, business owners, and multifamilies in FY 2019-20. The proposed budget for residential, commercial, and multifamily water-use assessments in the FY 2019-20 is \$20,000.

4. Water Conservation Promotional Materials And Activities

The proposed budget for promoting water conservation in the FY 2019-20 budget is \$25,000. Examples of items that are used to promote water conservation are buckets, low-flow aerators, tree water aids, water conservation brochures/pamphlets, newsletters, and other print media. Funds can also be used for events, programs, outreach, and community classes related to water conservation education.

Next Steps

If approved, Staff will update all the rebate promotional information including guidelines, forms and applications to include the adopted FY 2019-20 water rebate program information. In addition, the rebate information will be included on the City's website and promoted through the City's social media channels.

Legal Review

The City Attorney has reviewed this item.

Fiscal Impact

The FY 2019-20 Budget includes \$150,000 under Account Number 503-6010-6713-8032 for water conservation rebates and promotion. The revenue for water conservation programs is collected through a water efficiency fee of \$0.14 per unit of water billed to all City water customers. Annually, the City collects approximately \$207,000 in revenue to fund the City's water conservation program, including rebates, projects, and staff oversight of the programs. The table below is a comparison of the proposed FY 2019-20 water conservation funding to the existing FY 2018-19 funding.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council:

1. Accept a bid dated August 13, 2019, from E.C. Construction Co. for the construction of the Monterey Road Street Improvement Project (Project);

2. Authorize the City Manager to enter into a contract with E.C. Construction Co. for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,848,061; and

3. Authorize a construction contingency ten percent in the amount of \$184,806 for total amount of \$2,032,867.

Commission Review and Recommendation

These streets were previously identified and reviewed by the Public Works Commission.

Discussion/Analysis

In compliance with the Public Contract Code, the project was advertised for bids in July 2019. Subsequently, the City received following seven bids:

E.C. Construction Co (contractor) submitted the lowest responsive bid. To verify the quality of work, staff has checked the contractor's references, and found their work performances to be satisfactory. Staff's recommendation is to award the Project to E.C. Construction Co. The construction is expected to be completed in 150 working days.

Background

This Project was approved by City Council as part of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2017-18 budget. The Project includes following:

- Monterey Road (Orange Grove Avenue to 300 feet east Pasadena Avenue): Cold mill
 existing pavement and overlay asphalt concrete. Removal and replacement of sidewalk,
 curb ramps, driveway approaches, curb and gutter, traffic loops, traffic signal pedestrian
 push buttons, thermoplastic striping and pavement markings, utility adjustments and
 installation of new water meters, valves, fire hydrants and its appurtenances.
- Orange Grove Avenue (Monterey Road to El Centro Street): Cold mill existing pavement and overlay asphalt concrete. Removal and replacement of sidewalk, curb ramps, driveway approaches, curb and gutter, traffic loops, traffic signal pedestrian push buttons, thermoplastic striping and pavement markings, utility adjustments and installation of new water meters, valves, fire hydrants and its appurtenances.
- <u>Intersection of Monterey Road and Orange Grove Avenue</u>: Construction of a new traffic signal with safety lights.

In addition, the following improvements are within the close proximity to the project, the costs of these improvements are small enough which this project can easily absorb from the savings realized through competitive bids.

- <u>Via Del Rey (La Portada Street to Monterey Road)</u>: Work consists of replacing existing double yellow centerline with new raised pavement markings and installation of parking stalls on both sides of the roadway.
- <u>Intersection of Monterey Road and Via Del Rey</u>: Work consists of installation of drought tolerance plants and irrigation system at two small medians.

Fiscal Impact

This Project is funded through following funding sources:

- Street Improvements and concrete repairs will be funded from Street Improvement Program in the amount of \$126,369 and Measure R in the amount of \$693,000.
- New traffic signal will be funded from Proposition C (Prop C) Exchange Funds in the amount of \$209,498 and Surface Transportation Program Local (STP-L) in the amount of \$364,000. The reimbursement for Prop C will be submitted to Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority.
- Water improvements will be funded form Water Fund in the amount of \$640,000

Agreement – E.C. Construction Co.

CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT / AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this 18th day of September, 2019 by and between CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, a municipal corporation of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "CITY" and E.C. Construction Co. "CONTRACTOR."

That the CITY and the CONTRACTOR, for the consideration hereinafter named, mutually agree as follows:

- 1. Contract Documents. The complete contract and agreement ("AGREEMENT") consists of the Contract Documents, which includes all of the following documents incorporated herein by this reference: Approved Plans and Specifications (Project No. 2018-04) Notice Inviting Bids, Instructions to Bidders, Information for Bidders, Contractor's Bid Proposal, this Contract/Agreement, Standard Specifications, Special Provisions, Reference Specifications, the documents in the Appendix, if any, and all mutually agreed-upon modifications and amendments thereto. In the event of conflict between these documents, precedence shall be determined under section 2-5.2 of the Standard Specifications.
- **2. Scope of Services.** CONTRACTOR shall perform everything required to be performed, shall provide and furnish all the labor, materials, necessary tools, expendable equipment, and all utility and transportation services required for the following work of improvement: **Monterey Road Street Improvement Project, Phase Three** all in accordance with the Contract Documents and Contractor's Proposal dated <u>August 13, 2019.</u>

CONTRACTOR agrees to perform all the work and furnish all the materials at his own cost and expense necessary to construct and complete in a good and workman-like manner and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer of the CITY, the Work of Improvement in accordance with the plans, specifications, and Contract Documents (the "Specifications") therefore prepared by City's Engineering Department and adopted by the City Council.

3. Compensation. CITY agrees to pay and CONTRACTOR agrees to accept in full payment for this Work of Improvement the stipulated sum of <u>One Million Eight Hundred Fortyeight Thousand Sixty-one and 00/100 Dollars (\$1,848,061.00)</u>

CITY agrees to make monthly payments and final payment in accordance with the method set forth in the Specifications.

- **4. Time for Completion.** CONTRACTOR agrees to commence construction of the Work of Improvement within fifteen (15) days after issuance of a Notice To Proceed, and to continue in a diligent and workman-like manner without interruption, and to complete the construction thereof within one hundred fifty (150) working days from the date the Notice to Proceed is issued.
- **5. Time is of the Essence.** Time is of essence of this Contract, and it is agreed that it would be impracticable or extremely difficult to ascertain the extent of actual loss or damage which the CITY will sustain by reason of any delay in the performance of this Agreement. It is,

therefore, agreed that CONTRACTOR will pay as liquidated damages to the CITY the following sum: Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each day's delay beyond the time herein prescribed for finishing work. If liquidated damages are not paid, as designated by the CITY, the CITY may deduct the amount thereof from any money due or that may become due the CONTRACTOR under this Agreement in addition to any other remedy available to CITY. The CONTRACTOR shall not be assessed liquidated damages for any delay caused by the failure of a public utility to relocate or remove an existing utility required for the performance of this Contract.

- **6. Prevailing Wages Required.** The CONTRACTOR will pay, and will require all subcontractors to pay, all employees on the work of improvement a salary or wage at least equal to the prevailing salary or wage established for such work as set forth in the wage determinations for this work. Travel and subsistence pay shall be paid in accordance with Labor Code Section 1773.8. The CONTRACTOR shall forfeit to the CITY, as penalty, \$200.00 for each calendar day or portion thereof for each worker paid (either by him or any subcontractors under him) less than the prevailing rate described above on the work provided for in this Agreement, all in accordance with Section 1775 of the Labor Code of the State of California.
- **7. 8-Hour Day.** In the performance of this Contract, not more than eight (8) hours shall constitute a day's work, and the CONTRACTOR shall not require more than eight (8) hours in a day from any person employed by him hereunder, except as provided in the Labor Code of the State of California. The CONTRACTOR shall adhere to Article 3, Chapter 1, Part 7 (Sections 1810, et seq.) of the Labor Code of the State of California, and it is agreed that the CONTRACTOR shall forfeit to the CITY as a penalty the sum of \$200.00 for each worker employed in the execution of this Contract by the CONTRACTOR or any subcontractor for each calendar day during which any worker is required or permitted to labor more than eight (8) hours in violation of that article.
- **8. Workers Compensation.** CONTRACTOR, by executing this Agreement hereby certifies:

"I am aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for Worker's Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that Code, and I will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this Contract."

- **9. Bonds.** CONTRACTOR shall, prior to the execution of this Contract, furnish two bonds approved by the CITY, one in the amount of One Hundred Percent (100%) of the Contract price, to guarantee the faithful performance of the work, and one in the amount of One Hundred Percent (100%) of the Contract price to guarantee payment of all claims for labor and materials furnished. This Contract shall not become effective until such bonds are supplied to and approved by the CITY. CONTRACTOR shall, prior to the release of the performance and payment bonds or the retention payment, furnish a warranty performance and payment bond equal to at least ten percent of the final contract price or \$1,000, whichever is greater.
- 10. Arbitration. This AGREEMENT is further subject to the provisions of Article 1.5 (commencing at Section 20104) of Division 2, Part 3 of the Public Contract Code regarding the resolution of public works claims of less than \$375,000. Article 1.5 mandates certain procedures for the filing of claims and supporting documentation by Contractor, for the response to such claims by the Agency, for a mandatory meet and confer conference upon the request of

Contractor, for mandatory nonbinding mediation in the event litigation is commenced, and for mandatory judicial arbitration upon the parties' failure to resolve the dispute through mediation. This AGREEMENT hereby incorporates the provisions of Article 1.5 as though fully set forth herein.

- 11. Prompt Payment. This Agreement is subject to the provisions of Article 1.7 (commencing at Section 20104.50) of Division 2, Part 3 of the Public Contract Code regarding prompt payment of contractors by local governments. Article 1.7 mandates certain procedures for the payment of undisputed and properly submitted payment requests within 30 days after receipt, for the review of payment requests, for notice to Contractor of improper payment requests, and provides for the payment of interest on progress payment requests which are not timely made in accordance with that Article. This AGREEMENT hereby incorporates the provisions of Article 1.7 as though fully set forth herein.
- 12. Securities for Retentions. At the request and expense of CONTRACTOR, securities equivalent to the amount withheld shall be deposited with AGENCY, or with a state or federally chartered bank in this state as the escrow agent, who shall then pay those moneys to CONTRACTOR upon Agency's confirmation of CONTRACTOR'S satisfactory completion of this AGREEMENT. At any time during the term of this AGREEMENT CONTRACTOR may, at its own expense, substitute securities for funds otherwise withheld as retention (or the retained percentage) in accordance with Public Contract Code § 22300.
- 13. Registration with DIR. Pursuant to Labor Code § 1725.5, CONTRACTOR and any subcontractor must be registered with the California Department of Industrial Relations for any bid proposal and prior to performing any work. Further, this project is subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the Department of Industrial Relations.
- **14. Subcontractor Eligibility.** This AGREEMENT is subject to Public Contract Code Section 6109: CONTRACTOR shall be prohibited from performing work on this project with a subcontractor who is ineligible to perform work on the project pursuant to Sections 1777.1 or 1777.7 of the Labor Code.
- **15. Apprentices.** CONTRACTOR shall comply with the provisions of Labor Code Section 1777.5 concerning the employment of apprentices on public works projects, and further agrees that CONTRACTOR is responsible for compliance with Section 1777.5 by all of its subcontractors.
- 16. Records. CONTRACTOR shall maintain any and all ledgers, books of account, invoices, vouchers, canceled checks, and other records or documents evidencing or relating to charges for services or expenditures and disbursements charged to CITY under this Agreement for a minimum of three (3) years, or for any longer period required by law, from the date of final payment to CONTRACTOR under this Agreement. All such documents shall be made available for inspection, audit, and/or copying at any time during regular business hours, upon oral or written request of CITY. In addition, pursuant to Government Code Section 8546.7, all such documents and this Agreement shall be subject to the examination and audit of the State Auditor, at the request of CITY or as part of any audit of CITY, for a period of three (3) years after final payment under the Agreement.

17. Indemnity. To the fullest extent permitted by law, CONTRACTOR shall, at its sole cost and expense, fully defend, indemnify and hold harmless CITY, its authorized representatives and their respective subsidiaries, affiliates, members, directors, officers, employees and agents (collectively, the "Indemnitees") from and against any and all claims, actions, demands, costs, judgments, liens, penalties, liabilities, damages, losses, and expenses, including but not limited to any fees of accountants, attorneys or other professionals (collectively "Liabilities"), arising out of, in connection with, resulting from or related to, any alleged act, omission, fault or negligence of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's Representative, or any of its officers, agents, employees, Subcontractors or Suppliers, or any person or organization directly or indirectly employed by any of them (Collectively, the "Indemnitors"), in connection with or relating to or claimed to be in connection with or relating to the work performed under this AGREEMENT. CONTRACTOR shall not be entitled to any refund of attorneys' fees, defense costs and expenses in the event that it is s adjudicated to have been non-negligent.

CONTRACTOR shall not be required to defend or indemnify CITY for liabilities caused by the sole active negligence or willful misconduct of CITY.


If CONTRACTOR is a joint venture or partnership, each venturer or partner shall be jointly and severally liable for any and all of the duties and obligations of CONTRACTOR that are assumed under or arise out of this AGREEMENT. Each of such venturers or partners waives notice of the breach or non-performance of any undertaking or obligation of CONTRACTOR contained in, resulting from or assumed under this AGREEMENT, and the failure to give any such notice shall not affect or impair such venturer's or partner's joint and several liability hereunder.

18. Attorneys' Fees Following Disputes. In the event of a dispute between the parties under this AGREEMENT, the prevailing party is not entitled to attorneys' fees from the other party. This provision takes precedence over any conflicting provision in any of the documents which are incorporated herein by reference.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council approve a Discretionary Fund request by Mayor Pro Tem Robert Joe for \$300 towards the Senior Center Luncheon on September 20, 2019.

Commission Review and Recommendation

This matter was not reviewed by a Commission.

Discussion/Analysis

The City of South Pasadena Senior Center regularly hosts a luncheon for seniors on a monthly basis. On Friday, September 20th a Luau themed luncheon will be held at the Senior Center between 11:45am and 1:30pm and will include a traditional luau meal followed by Polynesian Dancers. Approximately 110 participants are expected to attend. Mayor Pro Tem Joe would like to use his discretionary funds to cover the \$2.75/meal cost for the attendees.

Background

In September 2004, the City Council approved creation of discretionary spending budgets which allow each Councilmember the opportunity to fund projects or purchases that might not otherwise be funded in the approved budget. The City Council adopted the Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-19 Budget with \$20,000 in the Discretionary Fund, \$4,000 designated for each Councilmember. Discretionary funds must be used for a public purpose benefiting the City of South Pasadena (City).

This expenditure meets the criteria as set forth in the guidelines that established discretionary spending: the expenditure has a public purpose; the expenditure is free of any conflict of interest that may arise from the use of City funds; and the expenditure is not a gift to any individual, corporation, or municipality, but is only used to benefit the general public of the City.

On August 17, 2011, the City Council approved Resolution No. 7174, which established guidelines for discretionary budget accounts. The Resolution states that all funds not expended during the fiscal year shall be carried over to subsequent fiscal years, up to a maximum carryover amount of \$10,000 per Councilmember account. Said allocated funds need not be encumbered

Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council:

1. Read by title only for first reading, waive further reading, and introduce an ordinance amending Chapter 2 ("Administration"), Article II ("Officers and Employees Generally") by adding a new section ("Code of Ethics and Conduct");

2. Adopt a resolution establishing a Code of Ethics and Conduct policy for all elected and appointed officials, including members of advisory boards, commissions and committees, to address responsibility, fairness, respect and integrity.

Commission Review and Recommendation

This matter was not reviewed by a commission.

Discussion/Analysis

Elected and appointed officials are composed of individuals with a wide variety of backgrounds, personalities, values, opinions, and goals. Despite this diversity, all have chosen to serve in public office in order to preserve and protect the present and the future of the community. The Code of Ethics and Conduct promotes an atmosphere of respect and civility where individual members, City staff and the public are free to express their ideas and work to their full potential.

The purpose of a Code of Ethics and Conduct policy is to ensure that all elected and appointed officials, while exercising their office, conduct themselves in a manner that will instill public confidence and trust in the fair operation and integrity of the City.

The overall principles and guidelines contained in this Code also describe the manner in which the City Council, City Treasurer, City Clerk, Commissioners, Committee members and Board members are expected to treat one another, City staff, and all others they come into contact with while representing the City. The Code Conduct defines more clearly the behavior, manners, and courtesies that are suitable for various occasions. The constant and consistent theme through all of the conduct guidelines is "respect."

Ordinance Establishing Code of Ethics and Conduct Policy for Elected and Appointed Officials September 18, 2019
Page 2 of 2

The Code of Ethics and Conduct is intended to be self-enforcing and is an expression of the standards of conduct for members expected by the City. It therefore becomes most effective when members are thoroughly familiar with it and embrace its provisions.

Background

During the June 5, 2019 City Council meeting discussion on the adoption of an ordinance updating the charge and duties of the Public Safety Commission, questions were raised regarding a City policy on ethics.

Assembly Bill 1234 (Salinas) - Compensation and Ethics, requires all elected or appointed officials, City employees, and members of boards, commissions, committees, and task forces to participate in ethics training in general ethics principles and ethics laws relevant to public service every two years.

In addition to state required training, many cities have adopted a Code of Ethics and Conduct for members of the City Council and the City's boards and commissions to ensure public confidence in the integrity of local government and its effective and fair operation.

Next Steps

- 1. The ordinance will be brought back to Council in October for second reading and adoption.
- 2. Upon Council approval, the Code of Ethics and Conduct will be included in the regular orientations for candidates for elected offices including City Council, City Treasurer, City Clerk, and applicants to Board, Committee and Commissions.
- 3. Members entering office shall sign a statement acknowledging they have read and understood the Code of Ethics and Conduct.
- 4. The Code of Ethics and Conduct will be periodically reviewed by the City Council and updated as necessary by Council Resolution.

Legal Review

The City Attorney has reviewed this item.

Fiscal Impact

There is no fiscal impact with the adoption of a Code of Ethics policy.

Ordinance Adding Section 2.7-5 "Code of Ethics and Conduct" to the SPMC

ORDINANCE NO.____

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY THE CITY COUNCIL
OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA,
AMENDING CHAPTER 2 ("ADMINISTRATION"),
ARTICLE II ("OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES
GENERALLY") BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 2.7-5
("CODE OF ETHICS AND CONDUCT") TO THE CITY OF
SOUTH PASADENA MUNICIPAL CODE APPLICABLE TO
ALL ELECTED AND APPOINTED CITY OFFICIALS

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA DO HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. A new Section 2.7-5 ("Code of Ethics and Conduct") is added to Article II ("Officers and Employees Generally") of Chapter 2 ("Administration") of the South Pasadena Municipal Code to read as follows:

"2.7-5 Code of Ethics and Conduct

The proper operation of democratic government requires that public officials and public employees be independent, impartial, responsible, and accountable to the people; that governmental decisions and policy be made in the proper channels of the governmental structure; that public office and public employment not be used for personal gain; and that the citizens and businesses of the City have confidence in the integrity of their government.

In furtherance of these principles, the City Council may establish by resolution a code of ethics and conduct which shall be applicable to all city officials, including the mayor, city councilmembers, commissions and all other public officials, whether appointed or elected."

- **SECTION 2. CEQA.** This ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to 14 Cal. Code Regs. Section 15378(b)(5) as an agency organizational or administrative activity that produces no physical changes to the environment.
- **SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE**. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its passage and adoption pursuant to California Government Code Section 36937.
- **SECTION 4.** This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its final passage and within fifteen (15) days after its passage, the City Clerk of the City of South Pasadena shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and to its approval by the Mayor and City Council and shall cause the same to be published in a newspaper in the manner required by law.

RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING A POLICY FOR THE CODE OF ETHICS AND CONDUCT FOR ELECTED AND APPOINTED OFFICIALS

WHEREAS, the purpose of a Code of Ethics and Conduct Policy is to assure that all elected and appointed officials, while exercising their office, conduct themselves in a manner that will instill public confidence and trust in the fair operation and integrity of the City; and

WHEREAS, consistent with the requirements of AB 1234, the City requires all elected or appointed officials, employees and members of Boards, Commissions and Committees, to participate in ethics training in general ethics principles and laws relevant to public service every two years; and

WHEREAS, in the furtherance of transparency and good governance and to promote an atmosphere of respect and civility where individual officers, City staff and the public are free to express their ideas and work to their full potential, the City Council desire to create a Code of Ethics and Conduct applicable to all elected and appointed City officials.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council adopts the Code of Ethics and Conduct Policy for Elected and Appointed City officials as shown in Exhibit A, attached hereto.

SECTION 2. To the extent there is a conflict with existing policies adopted by the City Council, the Code of Ethics and Conduct Policy adopted by this Resolution controls.

SECTION 3. This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon its adoption.

City of South Pasadena

Code of Ethics and Conduct for Elected and Appointed City Officials

"Always do right. This will gratify some people and astonish the rest."

-Mark Twain

PURPOSE

The City Council adopts this Code of Ethics and Conduct to ensure that all elected and appointed officials, while exercising their office, conduct themselves in a manner that will instill public confidence and trust in the fair operation and integrity of the City government.

CODE of ETHICS

The citizens and businesses of South Pasadena are entitled to have fair, ethical and accountable local government. To this end, the public should have full confidence that their elected and appointed officials:

- Comply with both the letter and spirit of the laws and policies affecting the operations of government;
- Are independent, impartial and fair in their judgment and actions;
- Use their public office for the public good, not for personal gain; and
- Conduct public deliberations and processes openly, unless required by law to be confidential, in an atmosphere of respect and civility.

Therefore, members of the City Council, City Treasurer, and City Clerk and of all Boards, Committees and Commissions shall conduct themselves in accordance with the following ethical standards to assure public confidence in the integrity of local government and its effective and fair operation.

1. Acts in the Public Interest

Members will work for the common good of the people of South Pasadena and not for any private or personal interest, and they will ensure fair and equal treatment of all persons, claims and transactions coming before the South Pasadena City Council, boards and commissions.

2. Comply with the Law

Members shall comply with the laws of the nation, the State of California and the City of South Pasadena in the performance of their public duties. These laws include but are not limited to: The United States and California constitutions, Fair Political Practices laws pertaining to conflicts of interest, election campaigns, financial disclosures, employer responsibilities and open processes of government and adopted City ordinances and policies.

3. Conduct of Members

The professional and personal conduct of members must be above reproach and avoid even the appearance of impropriety. Members shall refrain from abusive conduct, personal charges or verbal attacks upon the character or motives of other members of the council, boards and commissions, the public and staff.

4. Respect for Process

Members shall perform their duties in accordance with the processes and rules of order established by the City council and boards and commissions governing the deliberation of public policy issues, meaningful involvement of the public and implementation of policy decisions of the City Council by staff.

5. Conduct of Public Meetings

Members shall prepare themselves for public issues, listen courteously and attentively to all public discussions before the body and focus on the business at hand. They shall refrain from interrupting other speakers, making personal comments not germane to the business of the body or otherwise interfering with the orderly conduct of meetings.

6. Decisions Based on Merit

Members shall base their decisions on the merits and substance of the matter at hand, rather than on unrelated considerations.

7. Communication

Members shall publicly share substantive information that is relevant to a matter under consideration by the Council or boards and commissions, which they may have received from sources outside of the public decision making process.

8. Conflict of Interest

In order to assure their independence and impartiality on behalf of the common good, members shall not use their official positions to influence government decisions in which they have a material financial interest or where they have an organizational responsibility or personal relationship, which may give the appearance of a conflict of interest.

In accordance with the law, members shall disclose investments, interests in real property, source of income, and gifts, and they shall abstain from participating in deliberations and decision-making where conflicts may exist.

9. Gifts and Favors

Members shall refrain from accepting any gifts, favors or promises of future benefits which might compromise their independence of judgment or action or give the appearance of being compromised.

10. Confidential Information

Members shall respect the confidentiality of information concerning property, personnel or affairs of the City. They shall neither disclose confidential information without proper legal authorization, nor use such information to advance their personal, financial or private interests.

11. Use of Public Resources

Members shall not use public resources unavailable to the public in general, such as City staff time, equipment, supplies or facilities, for private gain or personal purposes.

12. Representation of Public Interests

In keeping with their role as stewards of the public interest, members shall not appear on behalf of the private interests of third parties before the Council or any board, commission or proceeding of the City, nor shall members of boards and commissions appear before their own bodies or before the Council on behalf of the private interests of third parties on matters related to the areas of service of their bodies.

13. Advocacy

Members shall represent the official policies or positions of the City Council, board or commission to the best of their ability when designated as delegates for this purpose. The official City position will be determined by a majority vote of the City Council. When presenting their individual opinions and positions, members shall explicitly state they do not represent their body or the City of South Pasadena, nor will they allow inference that they do.

14. Policy Role of Members

Members shall respect and adhere to the council-manager structure of South Pasadena City government as outlined by the South Pasadena Municipal Code. In this structure, the City Council determines the policies of the City, with the advice, information and analysis provided by the public, boards and commissions and City staff.

Except as provided by the City Municipal Code, members shall not interfere with the administrative functions of the City or the professional duties of City staff, nor shall they impair the ability of staff to implement Council policy decisions.

15. Independence of Boards and Commissions

Because of the value of the independent advice of boards and commissions to the public decision-making process, members of Council shall refrain from using their position to unduly influence the deliberations or outcomes of board and commission proceedings.

16. Positive Work Place Environment

Members shall support the maintenance of a positive and constructive work place for the City employees and for the citizens and businesses dealing with the City. Members shall recognize their special role in dealings with City employees to in no way create the perception of inappropriate direction to staff.

CONDUCT

The Conduct section of the City's Code of Ethics and Conduct is designed to describe the manner in which Councilmembers and board and commission members should treat one another, City staff, constituents, and others they come into contact with in representing the City of South Pasadena.

The constant and consistent theme through all of the conduct guidelines is "respect." Councilmembers experience huge workloads and tremendous stress in making decisions that could impact thousands of lives. Despite these pressures, elected and appointed officials are called upon to exhibit appropriate behavior at all times. Demonstrating respect for each individual through words and actions is the touchstone that can help guide Councilmembers and board and commission members to do the right thing in even the most difficult situations.

1. Elected and Appointed Officials' Conduct with One Another in Public Meetings

Elected and appointed officials are composed of individuals with a wide variety of backgrounds, personalities, values, opinions, and goals. Despite this diversity, all have chosen to serve in public office in order to preserve and protect the present and the future of the community. In all cases, this common goal should be acknowledged even though individuals may "agree to disagree" on contentious issues.

(a) Use formal titles

Elected and appointed officials should refer to one another formally during public meetings, such as Mayor, Mayor Pro Tem, Chair, Commissioner or Councilmember followed by the individual's last name.

(b) Practice civility and decorum in discussions and debate

Difficult questions, tough challenges to a particular point of view, and criticism of ideas and information are legitimate elements of a free democracy in action. This does not allow, however, public officials to make belligerent, personal, impertinent, slanderous, threatening, abusive, or disparaging comments. No shouting or physical actions that could be construed as threatening will be tolerated.

(c) Honor the role of the chair in maintaining order

It is the responsibility of the chair to keep the comments of members on track during public meetings. Members should honor efforts by the chair to focus discussion on current agenda items. If there is disagreement about the agenda or the chair's actions, those objections should be voiced politely and with reason, following procedures outlined in parliamentary procedure.

(d) Avoid personal comments that could offend other members

If a member is personally offended by the remarks of another member, the offended member should make notes of the actual words used and call for a "point of personal privilege" that challenges the other member to justify or apologize for the language used. The chair will maintain control of this discussion.

(e) Demonstrate effective problem-solving approaches

Members have a public stage to show how individuals with disparate points of view can find common ground and seek a compromise that benefits the community as a whole.

2. Elected and Appointed Officials' Conduct with the Public in Public Meetings

Making the public feel welcome is an important part of the democratic process. No signs of partiality, prejudice or disrespect should be evident on the part of individual members toward an individual participating in a public forum. Every effort should be made to be fair and impartial in listening to public testimony.

(a) Be welcoming to speakers and treat them with care and gentleness.

While questions of clarification may be asked, the official's primary role during public testimony is to listen.

(b) Be fair and equitable in allocating public hearing time to individual speakers.

The chair will determine and announce limits on speakers at the start of the public hearing process.

(c) Practice active listening

It is disconcerting to speakers to have members not look at them when they are speaking. It is fine to look down at documents or to make notes, but reading for a long period of time or gazing around the room gives the appearance of disinterest. Members shall try to be conscious of facial expressions, and avoid those that could be interpreted as "smirking," disbelief, anger or boredom.

(d) Maintain an open mind

Members of the public deserve an opportunity to influence the thinking of elected and appointed officials.

(e) Ask for clarification, but avoid debate and argument with the public

Only the chair – not individual members – can interrupt a speaker during a presentation. However, a member can ask the chair for a point of order if the speaker is off the topic or exhibiting behavior or language the member finds disturbing.

3. Elected and Appointed Officials' Conduct with City Staff

Governance of a City relies on the cooperative efforts of elected officials, who set policy, appointed officials who advise the elected, and City staff who implement and administer the Council's policies. Therefore, every effort should be made to be cooperative and show mutual respect for the contributions made by each individual for the good of the community.

(a) Treat all staff as professionals

Clear, honest communication that respects the abilities, experience, and dignity of each individual is expected. Poor behavior towards staff is not acceptable.

(b) Do not disrupt City staff from their jobs

Elected and appointed officials should not disrupt City staff while they are in meetings, on the phone, or engrossed in performing their job functions in order to have their individual needs met. Do not attend City staff meetings unless requested by staff — even if the elected or appointed official does not say anything, his or her presence implies support, shows partiality, may intimidate staff, and hampers staff's ability to do their job objectively.

(c) Never publicly criticize an individual employee

Elected and appointed officials should never express concerns about the performance of a City employee in public, to the employee directly, or to the employee's manager. Comments about

staff performance should only be made to the City Manager through private correspondence or conversation. Appointed officials should make their comments regarding staff to the City Manager or the Mayor.

(d) Do not get involved in administrative functions

Elected and appointed officials acting in their individual capacity must not attempt to influence City staff on the making of appointments, awarding of contracts, selecting of consultants, processing of development applications, or granting of City licenses and permits. The City Manager has the sole authority to direct staff, and is responsible for appropriate allocation of staff resources. The City Manager may request input from an elected official who possesses relevant professional experience, special knowledge or training which would be useful in development of requests for proposals or the selection process.

(e) Do not solicit political support from staff

Elected and appointed officials should not solicit any type of political support, or support for non-profits or affiliate organizations (financial contributions, display of posters or lawn signs, name on support list, etc.) from City staff. City staff may, as private citizens with constitutional rights, support political candidates but all such activities must be done away from the workplace.

(f) No Attorney-Client Relationship

Members shall not seek to establish an attorney-client relationship with the City Attorney, including his or her staff and attorneys contracted to work on behalf of the City. The City Attorney represents the City and not individual members. Members who consult with the City Attorney cannot enjoy or establish an attorney-client relationship with the attorney.

4. Council Conduct with Boards. Committees and Commissions

The City has established several Boards, Committees and Commissions as a means of gathering more community input. Citizens who serve on Boards, Committees and Commissions become more involved in government and serve as advisors to the City Council. They are a valuable resource to the City's leadership and should be treated with appreciation and respect.

(a) If attending a Board, Committee or Commission meeting, be careful to only express personal opinions

Councilmembers may attend any Board, Committee or Commission meeting, which are always open to any member of the public. However, they should be sensitive to the way their participation – especially if it is on behalf of an individual, business or developer – could be viewed as unfairly affecting the process. Any public comments by a Councilmember at a Board, Committee or Commission meeting should be clearly made as individual opinion and not a representation of the feelings of the entire CityCouncil.

(b) Limit contact with Board, Committee and Commission members to questions of clarification

It is inappropriate for a Councilmember to contact a Board, Committee or Commission member to lobby on behalf of an individual, business, or developer, and vice versa. It is acceptable for Councilmembers to contact Board, Committee or Commission members in order to clarify a position taken by the Board, Committee or Commission.

(c) Respect that Boards, Committees and Commissions serve the community, not individual Councilmembers

The City Council appoints individuals to serve on Boards, Committees and Commissions, and it is the responsibility of Boards, Committees and Commissions to follow policy established by the Council. But Board, Committee and Commission members do not report to individual Councilmembers, nor should Councilmembers feel they have the power or right to threaten Board, Committee and Commission members with removal if they disagree about an issue. Appointment and re-appointment to a Board, Committee or Commission should be based on such criteria as expertise, ability to work with staff and the public, and commitment to fulfilling official duties. A Board, Committee or Commission appointment should not be used as a political "reward."

(d) Be respectful of diverse opinions

A primary role of Boards, Committees and Commissions is to represent many points of view in the community and to provide the Council with advice based on a full spectrum of concerns and perspectives. Councilmembers may have a closer working relationship with some individuals serving on Boards, Committees and Commissions, but must be fair and respectful of all citizens serving on Boards, Committees and Commissions.

(e) Keep political support away from public forums

Board, Committee and Commission members may offer political support to a Councilmember, but not in a public forum while conducting official duties. Conversely, Councilmembers may support Board, Committee and Commission members who are running for office, but not in an official forum in their capacity as a Councilmember.

SANCTIONS

(a) Acknowledgement of Code of Ethics and Conduct

Councilmembers who do not sign an acknowledgement that they have read and understand the Code of Ethics and Conduct shall be ineligible for intergovernmental assignments or Council subcommittees. Board, Committee and Commission members who do not sign an acknowledgement that they have read and understand the Code of Ethics and Conduct are not eligible to hold office.

(b) Ethics Training for Local Officials

Councilmembers, City Treasurer, City Clerk, Board, Committee and Commission Members who are out of compliance with State or City mandated requirements for ethics training shall not represent the City on intergovernmental assignments or Council subcommittees, and may be subject to sanctions.

(c) Behavior and Conduct

The South Pasadena Code of Ethics and Conduct expresses standards of ethical conduct expected for members of the South Pasadena City Council, Boards, Committees and Commissions. Members themselves have the primary responsibility to assure that ethical standards are understood and met, and that the public can continue to have full confidence in the integrity of government. The chairs of Boards, Committees and Commissions and the Mayor and Council have the additional responsibility to intervene when actions of members that appear to be in violation of the Code of Ethics and Conduct are brought to their attention.

Councilmembers:

Councilmembers who intentionally and repeatedly do not follow proper conduct may be reprimanded or formally censured by the Council, lose seniority or committee assignments (both within the City of South Pasadena and with intergovernmental agencies) or other privileges

afforded by the Council. Serious infractions of the Code of Ethics or Code of Conduct could lead to other sanctions as deemed appropriate by the Council.

Individual Councilmembers should point out to the offending Councilmember perceived infractions of the Code of Ethics and Conduct. If the offenses continue, then the matter should be referred to the Mayor in private. If the Mayor is the individual whose actions are being questioned, then the matter should be referred to the Mayor Pro Tem. It is the responsibility of the Mayor (or Mayor Pro Tem) to initiate action if a Councilmember's behavior may warrant sanction. If no action is taken by the Mayor (or Mayor Pro Tem), then the alleged violation(s) can be brought up with the full Council.

Board, Committee and Commission Members:

Counseling, verbal reprimands and written warnings may be administered by the Mayor to Board, Committee and Commission members failing to comply with City policy. These lower levels of sanctions shall be kept private to the degree allowed by law. Copies of all written reprimands administered by the Mayor shall be distributed in memo format to the chair of the respective Board, Committee or Commission, the City Clerk, the City Attorney, the City Manager, and the City Council.

The City Council may impose sanctions on Board, Committee and Commission members whose conduct does not comply with the City's policies, up to and including removal from office. Any form of discipline imposed by Council shall be determined by a majority vote of at least a quorum of the Council at a noticed public meeting and such action shall be preceded by a Report to Council with supporting documentation.

When deemed warranted, the Mayor or majority of Council may call for an investigation of Board, Committee or Commission member conduct. Also, should the City Manager or City Attorney believe an investigation is warranted, they shall confer with the Mayor or Council. The Mayor or Council shall ask the City Manager to investigate the allegation and report the findings.

These sanctions are alternatives to any other remedy that might otherwise be available to remedy conduct that violates this code or state or federal law. In order to protect and preserve good government, any individual including the City Manager and the City Attorney after complying with Rule 3-600(B) of the State Bar Rules of Professional Conduct, who knows or reasonably believes a member acts or intends or refuses to act in a manner that is or may be a violation of law reasonably imputable to the organization, or in a manner which is likely to result in substantial injury to the organization, may report the violation to the appropriate governmental authorities.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Code of Ethics and Conduct is intended to be self-enforcing, and is an expression of standards of conduct for members expected by the City. It therefore becomes most effective when members are thoroughly familiar with it and embrace its provisions.

For this reason, ethical standards shall be included in the regular orientations for candidates for City Council, applicants to boards and commissions, and newly elected and appointed officials. Members entering office shall sign a statement acknowledging they have read and understand the Code of Ethics and Conduct. In addition, the Code of Ethics shall be reviewed annually by the City Council, boards and commissions, and the City Council shall consider recommendations from boards and commissions and update as necessary.

COMPLIANCE AND ENFORCEMENT

The chairs of boards and commissions and the Mayor have the additional responsibility to intervene when actions of members that appear to be in violation of the Code of Ethics and Conduct are brought to their attention. The City Council may impose sanctions on members whose conduct does not comply with the City's ethical standards, such as reprimand, formal censure, loss of seniority or committee assignment, or budget restriction. Under the City's Municipal Code, the City Council may also remove members of boards and commissions from office. A violation of this Code of Ethics and Conduct shall not be considered as a basis for challenging the validity of a council, board or commission decision.
