#### Wednesday, May 6, 2020 Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the City Council

#### CALL TO ORDER

A Regular Meeting of the South Pasadena City Council was called to order by Mayor Joe on Wednesday, May, 6 2020, at 7:42 p.m. The meeting was held in a virtual setting, with all Councilmembers attending via Zoom, and the meeting being broadcast via the Council Chamber, located at 1424 Mission Street, South Pasadena, California.

A brief announcement was made by Mayor Joe of the virtual meeting protocols in place in an effort to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Fire Chief Paul Riddle provided a PowerPoint presentation a general report in addition to a report on the Fire Department. Police Chief Joe Ortiz provided a verbal report on the Police Department. City Manager DeWolfe provided a PowerPoint presentation on State and Los Angeles County reopening strategies.

City Council had various questions and comments throughout the presentation including COVID-19 testing access; Los Angeles County COVID-19 resources; concerns regarding senior residents; concerns regarding unhoused residents; library services; and concerns over reopening strategies at the County level, at City Hall, and at the Arroyo Seco Golf Course.

MOTION BY COUNCILMEMBER KHUBESRIAN, SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER CACCIOTTI, CARRIED 5-0, to receive and file the monthly investment reports for September 2019 through March 2020.

Additional Documents provided the attachment for Item No.11 - Monthly Investment Reports.

### 12. <u>Adoption of Resolution No. 7647 Establishing a Code of Ethics and Conduct Policy Applicable to Elected and Appointed Officials</u>

Councilmember Cacciotti asked a language be added to the "Board, Committee and Commission Members" section (end of page 12-13 through the beginning of page 12-14 of the

agenda packet). He asked that language be added to appoint the necessary official, if needed other than the City Manager, to investigate allegations and report the findings.

Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud, Councilmember Khubesrian, Councilmember Cacciotti and City Attorney Highsmith held a discussion on language that should be added.

Councilmember Schneider asked modifications be made on section No. 9 "Gift and Favors" (page 12-9 of the agenda packet). He asked that language be modified to state no gifts or favors can be received.

City Attorney Highsmith provided suggestions on modifications that can be made to the section.

Significant discussion was held between Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud, Councilmember Cacciotti, Councilmember Khubesrian, Councilmember Schneider, and City Attorney Highsmith regarding the modifications suggested.

MOTION BY COUNCILMEMBER SCHNEIDER, SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER CACCIOTTI, CARRIED 5-0, to approve: adopting **Resolution No. 7647** establishing a Code of Ethics and Conduct Policy for all elected and appointed officials, including members of advisory boards, commissions and committees to address responsibility, fairness, respect and integrity.

This item was approved with the following amendments:

- Language to be added to the "Board, Committee and Commission Members" section to reflect that "the Mayor or Council shall ask the City Manager or the appropriate official to investigate the allegations and reports findings".
- Modifications to section No. 9 "Gifts and Favors" of the policy to reflect that "members shall refrain from accepting any gifts, favors or promises of future benefits other than from friends, family members, or employers."
- 13. Adoption of a Resolution No. 7648 Continuing the Proclaiming a Local Emergency Due to the Outbreak of COVID-19, Adopting Regulations for Private and Public Facilities and Gatherings, Establishing Protections for Residential and Commercial Tenants and Property Owners, Requesting Reimbursement of Expenses, and Authorizing the City Manager to Take All Necessary Actions as the Director of Emergency Services

Councilmember Cacciotti shared various resident concerns regarding COVID-19 and asked they be addressed.

City Manager DeWolfe provide responses to the community concerns mentioned by Councilmember Cacciotti.

Council had various questions and comments regarding measures passed at both the County and local levels; repayment periods stated on Los Angeles County eviction moratorium ordinance; extension on mortgage payments; expiration of Los Angeles County eviction moratorium; etc.

City Attorney Highsmith responded to questions accordingly.

Chief City Clerk Ayala announced public comments received and read them aloud.

#### **Public Comment:**

- Jorge Rivera Expressed opposition on the resolution as presented and asked to let the current resolution sunset and allow the Los Angeles County provide tenant protections.
- William Kelly Expressed opposition on the resolution as presented and asked the city adopt the Los Angeles Country tenant protections.
- Delaine Shane and Ron Rosen Expressed opposition on the resolution as presented and asked Council let the current resolution sunset.
- Teresa Eilers Provided comments on the importance of tenant protection and suggested amendments be made to the resolution proposed.
- Jacquie Li Expressed agreeing an eviction moratorium should be extended and asked changes be made to assist tenants.
- Elizabeth A. Bagasao and John Serbalus Expressed opposition for Section 9F of the resolution and asked Council to allow the current resolution to sunset, and allow Los Angeles County to provide tenant protections.
- Ella Hushagen and Helen Tran Expressed concerns for tenant protects (comment was signed by an additional 35 individuals).

Council had various comments and questions regarding the enforcement of the Los Angeles County eviction moratorium; property mortgages and foreclosures; financial assistance to property owners; business loans and repayment; the City enacting its own protections; etc.

City Attorney Highsmith responded to questions accordingly.

Councilmember Cacciotti requested that the City prepare a letter to South Pasadena's federal representatives, Congresswoman Judy Chu and two senators, demanding more assistance in the extension of the time for mortgage holders, landlords, etc. to be protected.

Council had further questions and comments regarding importance of implementing tenant protections to prevent harassment; citywide street parking on Section 10 of the resolution; etc.

#### TWO COUNCIL ACTIONS WERE TAKEN:

MOTION BY COUNCILMEMBER KHUBESRIAN, SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER CACCIOTTI, CARRIED 5-0, to approve:

- 1. Continuing the proclamation of a local emergency due to the outbreak of COVID-19;
- 2. Continuing the application of regulations for private and public facilities and gatherings;
- 4. Requesting reimbursement of expenses; and
- 5. Authorizing the City Manager to take all necessary actions as the Director of Emergency Services.

MOTION BY COUNCILMEMBER KHUBESRIAN, SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER SCHNEIDER, CARRIED 4-1 (MAHMUD), to: NOT approve the following proposed section in the resolution:

3. Continuing and the protections for residential and commercial tenants and property owners

Additional documents modified the resolution with the following changes:

- 1. Adding the technical name of the virus that causes COVID-19, severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2, abbreviated as SARS-CoV-2. SARS-CoV-2 is also known as COVID-19. Also, in the enacting clauses, staff used the name SARS-CoV-2, and placed COVID-19 in parenthesis.
- 2. Rescinding Section 9, Protection of Affected Tenants, in favor of the application of the April 14, 2020 Executive Order of the Los Angeles Board of Supervisors, which expands an existing temporary rent freeze and moratorium on evictions of both commercial and residential tenants in parts of Los Angeles County in response to the COVID-19 health emergency.

### 14. <u>Discretionary Fund Request from Councilmember Khubesrian for \$130 for a Banner Thanking First Responders and City Staff</u>

Chief City Clerk Ayala announced public comments received and read them aloud.

#### **Public Comment:**

• Sam Burgess – Expressed opposition for the item.

Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud suggested not to include new allocation of funds to Councilmember Discretionary Funds in the 2020-2021 Fiscal Year Budget.

Mayor Joe had a question regarding Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud's suggestion.

City Attorney Highsmith responded accordingly.

Councilmember Cacciotti and Councilmember Khubesrian discussed adding "volunteers" to the banner. Councilmember Khubesrian agreed.

MOTION BY MAYOR PRO TEM MAHMUD, SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER KHUBESRIAN, CARRIED 5-0, to approve: a Discretionary Fund request by Councilmember Khubesrian \$130 for a banner thanking South Pasadena First Responders, City Staff, and Volunteers.

## 18. Authorize the City Manager to Execute a Professional Services Agreement with True North Research, Inc., to Design, Conduct, and Analyze a Professional Poll for a Total Not-To-Exceed Amount of \$24,950

#### Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council approve the Discretionary Fund request by Councilmember Richard Schneider for the Ray Bradbury Fused Glass Window (Project) in the Ray Bradbury Conference Room in the South Pasadena Public Library

#### Discussion/Analysis

On October 19, 2019 Council approved the Ray Bradbury Fused Glass Window project, titled "Live Forever" by Tim Carey, which includes the installation of three fused glass window panes that would be placed within the existing window sills in the Ray Bradbury Conference Room in the South Pasadena Public Library. The Public Art Commission also approved the project on June 18, 2019. The windows will feature a portrait of Mr. Bradbury and other iconic imagery related to his life and work.

The approved project will be completed gratis by Mr. Carey and will be fabricated by The Judson Studios. The total cost of fabrication and installation will be approximately \$24,000 which will be funded through private funding. The Library Board of Trustees has designated \$6,000 and will be taking the lead on identifying additional private donations. Any cost overruns will be covered by additional private donations or the Library Board of Trustees. Mayor Pro Tem Mahmud donated \$1,500 for this project on November 20, 2019. Councilmember's Schneider's \$4,000 discretionary fund contribution will help cover the overall costs.

#### **Background**

In September 2004, the City Council approved creation of discretionary spending budgets which allow each Councilmember the opportunity to fund projects or purchases that might not otherwise be funded in the approved budget. Discretionary funds must be used for a public purpose benefiting the City of South Pasadena (City). The Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-20 Budget includes \$20,000 of Discretionary Funds, which amounts to \$4,000 per Councilmember. On August 17, 2011, the City Council approved Resolution No. 7174, which established guidelines for discretionary budget accounts. Resolution No. 7174 states that all funds not expended during

the fiscal year shall be carried over to subsequent fiscal years, up to a maximum carryover amount of \$8,000 per Councilmember account. Said allocated funds need not be encumbered by a purchase order in order to be carried over to the following fiscal year. The following table displays the current Discretionary Fund balances and includes the request being considered in the staff report.

#### **Recommendation Action**

It is recommended that the City Council:

1. Adopt the resolutions to revise the City of South Pasadena's (City) FY 2018-19 and FY 2019-20 Appropriations Limit.

#### **Executive Summary**

Voters Passed Gann Limit in 1979 to Constrain Government Spending. In the wake of Proposition 13 (1978)—the landmark initiative that limited local property taxes—voters passed another measure that limited the spending side of government operations. Proposition 4 (1979) amended the State Constitution to impose spending limits—technically, appropriations limits—on the state and most local governments. The limits are sometimes referred to as "Gann limits" in reference to one of the measure's coauthors, Paul Gann. The fundamental purpose of the limits was to keep inflation- and population-adjusted appropriations under the 1978-79 level. The measure required revenues in excess of the limit to be rebated to taxpayers.

#### **Discussion/Analysis**

The City's independent auditors determined that the Appropriations Limits for FY 2018-19 and FY 2019-20 need to be revised based on updated statistics from the State of California Department of Finance. It appears that the population estimates for those years have changed, thus the revisions for the calculation is necessary to accurately determine the Limits for those years and going forward.

The population estimates were revised as follow: Change in L.A. County Population were revised from 1.0055 to 0.9975 in FY 2018-19 and 1.0051 to 0.9989 in FY 2019-20. The new population estimates provided by the State of California Department of Finance reflects a decrease in population for the City of South Pasadena and the County of Los Angeles. The revision in population changed the Appropriation Limit from \$26,190,464 to \$25,976,918 for FY

2018-19 and \$27,337,511 to \$26,946,769 for FY 2019-20.

The appropriations subject to the limit are \$3,166,080 and \$4,023,298 below the legally mandated limit for FY 2018-19 and FY 2019-20, respectively. At this time, it is recommended the City Council adopt the revised resolutions setting the City's Appropriation Limit for FY 2018-19 and FY 2019-20. The City will continue to closely monitor revenues during this fiscal year to determine if the actual revenues will exceed the Limit for FY 2019-20. Should the revenues from the proceeds of taxes exceed the legal Limit, alternatives for recalculations and/or a return of excess proceeds will need to be considered at that time.

#### **Background**

The "Gann Initiative" (established by 1979's Proposition 4) restricts the amount of tax-generated monies government entities can spend in a given fiscal year. Incorporated into Article XIII B of the State Constitution, the Gann Appropriations Limit specifies that appropriations funded by taxes may be increased annually by the higher of the change in California per capita income or nonresidential assessed valuation due to new construction and the change in South Pasadena population or Los Angeles County population.

#### **Fiscal Impact**

While there is no negative fiscal impact to the City, if revenues exceed the appropriations limit, the impact will be brought forward to council.

#### **Legal Review**

The City Attorney has reviewed this item.

# A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, DETERMINING AND REVISING THE APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2018-19 IN ACCORDANCE WITH ARTICLE XIII B OF THE CALIFORNIA CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 7910

- **WHEREAS,** Article XIII B was added to the Constitution of the State of California at the Special Statewide election held November 6, 1979 (commonly known as Proposition 4); and
- **WHEREAS,** Government Code Section 7910 was added to Chapter 12.05 by Statute at the Regular Session of the California Legislature; and
- **WHEREAS,** Proposition 111, which, among other things, provides new annual adjustment formulas for the Appropriations Limit, was approved by the voters in June, 1990; and
- **WHEREAS,** The League of California Cities and the State of California Department of Finance have published population and per capita income growth indexes, as well as guidelines for the uniform application of Proposition 111; and
- **WHEREAS**, Government Code Section 7910 requires the governing body of each local jurisdiction to adopt, by resolution, its Appropriation Limit; and
- **WHEREAS,** said Appropriations Limit must be adhered to in preparing and adopting the City of South Pasadena's (City) annual Budget.

# NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

- **SECTION 1.** In compliance with Article XIII B of the Constitution of the State of California, and Government Code Section 7910, the City hereby revises the City's Appropriation Limit for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-19 from \$26,190,464 to \$25,976,918.
- **SECTION 2.** In the computation of such limits, the City selected population factors for Los Angeles County, rather than those for South Pasadena, for use in FY 2018-19.

**SECTION 3.** In regard to the cost-of-living factors used in the computation of the Appropriations Limit, the City used the change in California per capita income, rather than the change in assessed valuation due to new nonresidential construction.

**SECTION 4.** Said Appropriation Limit shall be adhered to in the City's FY 2018-19 Budget.

**SECTION 5.** The City Clerk of the City of South Pasadena shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and its approval by the City Council and shall cause the same to be listed in the records of the City.

# A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, DETERMINING AND REVISING THE APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2019-20 IN ACCORDANCE WITH ARTICLE XIII B OF THE CALIFORNIA CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 7910

- **WHEREAS,** Article XIII B was added to the Constitution of the State of California at the Special Statewide election held November 6, 1979 (commonly known as Proposition 4); and
- **WHEREAS,** Government Code Section 7910 was added to Chapter 12.05 by Statute at the Regular Session of the California Legislature; and
- **WHEREAS,** Proposition 111, which, among other things, provides new annual adjustment formulas for the Appropriations Limit, was approved by the voters in June, 1990; and
- **WHEREAS,** The League of California Cities and the State of California Department of Finance have published population and per capita income growth indexes, as well as guidelines for the uniform application of Proposition 111; and
- **WHEREAS**, Government Code Section 7910 requires the governing body of each local jurisdiction to adopt, by resolution, its Appropriation Limit; and
- **WHEREAS,** said Appropriations Limit must be adhered to in preparing and adopting the City of South Pasadena's (City) annual Budget.

# NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

- **SECTION 1.** In compliance with Article XIII B of the Constitution of the State of California, and Government Code Section 7910, the City hereby revise the City's Appropriation Limit for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-20 from \$27,337,511 to \$26,946,769.
- **SECTION 2.** In the computation of such limits, the City selected population factors for Los Angeles County, rather than those for South Pasadena, for use in FY 2019-20.

**SECTION 3.** In regard to the cost-of-living factors used in the computation of the Appropriations Limit, the City used the change in California per capita income, rather than the change in assessed valuation due to new nonresidential construction.

**SECTION 4.** Said Appropriation Limit shall be adhered to the estimates for FY 2019-20 in the City's FY 2020-21 Budget.

**SECTION 5.** The City Clerk of the City of South Pasadena shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and its approval by the City Council and shall cause the same to be listed in the records of the City.

### **Recommendation Action**

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the following resolutions related to the November 3, 2020, General Municipal Election:

- 1. Resolution calling and giving notice of the holding of a General Municipal Election, Tuesday, November 3, 2020 for the election of certain officers;
- 2. Resolution requesting consolidation with the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles; and
- 3. Resolution adopting regulations for candidates' statements submitted to the voters at an election to be held on Tuesday, November 3, 2020.

### **Discussion/Analysis**

Pursuant to state law, the City is required to hold a General Municipal Election in November of even-numbered years. As with previous elections, this election will be consolidated with the state-wide election with the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters. In October 2017, the City transitioned from an at-large to a district-based election system. As a result of this change, the following seats will be up for election in November 2020: District 1 (Mayor Joe), District 2 (Councilmember Khubesrian), and District 3 (Councilmember Schneider).

### **Community Outreach**

Election notices will be published in the *South Pasadena Review* along with the required languages of Korean, Spanish, and Chinese in *The Korea Times*, *La Opinion*, and *World Journal*.

### **Next Steps**

- 1. Once the resolutions have been adopted, staff will forward fully executed copies to the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters.
- 2. Staff will publish appropriate Election Notices as required by law.

### **Background**

The 2020 General Municipal Election will be held on November 3, 2020. Standard resolutions for calling and conducting of an election consolidated with the County are attached.

The nomination period for elective offices will commence on Monday, July 13, 2020 until Thursday, August 6, 2020 (California EC§10220). Should an incumbent not file or qualify by August 6<sup>th</sup>, the deadline will extend to Wednesday, August 12, 2020 (California EC§10225). Prospective candidates are requested to make an appointment with the City Clerk's Office when pulling or filing papers. This will ensure that staff is available for issuing or filing of papers.

### **Legal Review**

The City Attorney has reviewed this item and has contributed to the drafting of the resolution language.

### **Fiscal Impact**

The cost for the Registrar of Voters to conduct the election for the City of South Pasadena has yet to be determined. The County still has not provided elections cost estimates for the November 3, 2020 election as there are a number of undetermined factors. Estimated funds for the cost of the election are included in the proposed Fiscal Year 2020-21 budget under account number 101-1020-1022-8170.

This item is exempt from any California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) analysis.

**WHEREAS**, Section 13307 of the Elections Code of the State of California provides that the governing body of any local agency adopt regulations pertaining to materials prepared by any candidate for a municipal election, including costs of the candidate's statement.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

#### **SECTION 1.** GENERAL PROVISIONS

That pursuant to Section 13307 of the Elections Code of the State of California, each candidate for elective office to be voted for at an Election to be held in the City of South Pasadena on November 3, 2020, may prepare a candidate's statement on an appropriate form provided by the Chief City Clerk. The statement may include the name, age and occupation of the candidate and a brief description of no more than 200 words of the candidate's education and qualifications expressed by the candidate himself or herself. The statement shall not include party affiliation of the candidate, nor membership or activity in partisan political organizations. The statement shall be filed in typewritten form in the Office of the City Clerk at the time the candidate's nomination papers are filed. The statement may be withdrawn, but not changed, during the period for filing nomination papers and until 5:00 p.m. of the next working day after the close of the nomination period.

#### **SECTION 2.** FOREIGN LANGUAGE POLICY

- A. Pursuant to the Federal Voting Rights Act, candidates' statements will be translated into all languages required by the County of Los Angeles (County). The County is required to translate candidates' statements into the following languages: Armenian, Chinese, Cambodian/Khmer, Farsi, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog/Filipino, and Vietnamese. The County will also translate candidates' statements into three supported languages: Hindi, Japanese, Thai, and Russian.
- B. The County will print and mail sample ballots in English to all registered voters. If the candidate submits a candidate's statement for the sample ballot, the County can include

a Spanish translation of the statement—if the candidate requests this and agrees to pay for the printing. Otherwise, Spanish-language sample ballots, which include all candidates' statements, will be sent to those on the County voter file as having requested a sample ballot in Spanish (required for the City of South Pasadena). The County will also make such sample ballots available through its website and its multilingual hotline.

- C. The County will mail separate sample ballots, which include candidates' statements, in Chinese and Korean to those voters who are on the County voter file as having requested a sample ballot in Chinese or Korean (required for the City of South Pasadena). The County will also make such sample ballots available through its website and its multilingual hotline.
- D. The County will make the sample ballot available in the remainder of the languages required by law, i.e., Japanese, Tagalog, Vietnamese, Thai, Hindi, and Khmer, which are not required in South Pasadena, through its website.
- E. The County will make the sample ballots, which include all candidates' statements, available at all polling places in Spanish, Chinese, and Korean. Language assistance in nine required languages is available at the polling places from the County of Los Angeles through the multilingual hotline.

### **SECTION 3.** PAYMENT

#### A. Translations:

1. The candidate shall not be required to pay for the cost of translating the candidate's statement into any <u>required</u> foreign language as specified in Section 2 above pursuant to Federal and\or State law.

### B. Printing:

- 1. The candidate shall be required to pay for the cost of printing the candidate's statement in English in the main voter pamphlet.
- 2. The candidate shall be required to pay for the cost of printing the candidate's statement in Spanish in the main voter pamphlet.
- 3. The candidate shall not be required to pay for the cost of printing the candidate's statement in a required language in the translated sample ballot (not in the main voter pamphlet mailed to all voters).

The Chief City Clerk shall obtain an estimate from the County of the total cost of printing, handling, translating, and mailing the candidates' statements filed pursuant to this section, including costs incurred as a result of complying with the Voting Rights Act of 1965 (as amended), and require each candidate filing a statement to pay in advance to the local agency his or her estimated pro rata share as a condition of having his or her statement included in the voter's pamphlet. In the event the estimated payment is required, the

estimate is just an approximation of the actual cost that varies from one election to another election and may be significantly more or less than the estimate, depending on the actual number of candidates filing statements. Accordingly, the Chief City Clerk is not bound by the estimate and may, on a pro rata basis, bill the candidate for additional actual expense or refund any excess paid depending on the final actual cost. In the event of underpayment, the Chief City Clerk may require the candidate to pay the balance of the cost incurred. In the event of overpayment, the Chief City Clerk shall prorate the excess amount among the candidates and refund the excess amount paid within 30 days of the election.

#### **SECTION 4.** MISCELLANEOUS.

- A. Candidates' statements will be translated by translators qualified by the County.
- B. The County will determine various formatting styles permitted in the candidates' statements, e.g., bold type, capitalization, bullets.
- C. The Chief City Clerk shall comply with all recommendations and standards set forth by the California Secretary of State regarding occupational designations and other matters relating to elections as determined by the County.

### **SECTION 5.** ADDITIONAL MATERIAL

No candidate will be permitted to include additional materials in the sample ballot package.

- **SECTION 6.** That the Chief City Clerk shall provide each candidate or the candidate's representative a copy of this resolution at the time nominating petitions are issued.
- **SECTION 7.** That all previous resolutions establishing City Council policy on payment for candidates' statements shall then be repealed.
- **SECTION 8.** That this resolution shall apply only to the General Municipal Election to be held on November 3, 2020, and shall then be repealed.
- **SECTION 9.** The City Clerk of the City of South Pasadena shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and its approval by the City Council and shall cause the same to be listed in the records of the City.
- **SECTION 10.** The City Clerk of the City of South Pasadena shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and its approval by the City Council and shall cause the same to be listed in the records of the City.

### **Recommendation Action**

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1. Accept the Bike Lockers, Shelters and Hitches at Various Locations Project (Project) as complete;
- 2. Authorize the recordation of the Notice of Completion (NOC) with the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder County Clerk; and
- 3. Authorize release of retention payment to E C Construction Company (Contractor), in the amount of \$10.239.

### **Discussion/Analysis**

The original contract was in the amount of \$204,780. The construction was completed within the budget and in a timely manner. The Project was managed and inspected by the City of South Pasadena engineering staff and Willdan Engineering. The City Council authorized a construction contingency of \$20,478, however no Project contingency was required.

### **Background**

On November 11, 2019, the City Council authorized the award of a contract in the amount of \$204,780 to E C Construction Company for the Project. The Project included the installation of bicycle parking along the business districts, parks, and various hot spots in the City. Shelters and hitches were installed to provide 196 bicycle parking spaces. The locations were selected based on the input received from the Chamber of Commerce and Active SGV, followed by the staff's assessment. The Project promotes environmentally sustainable transportation and allows for secure and convenient storage of bicycles.

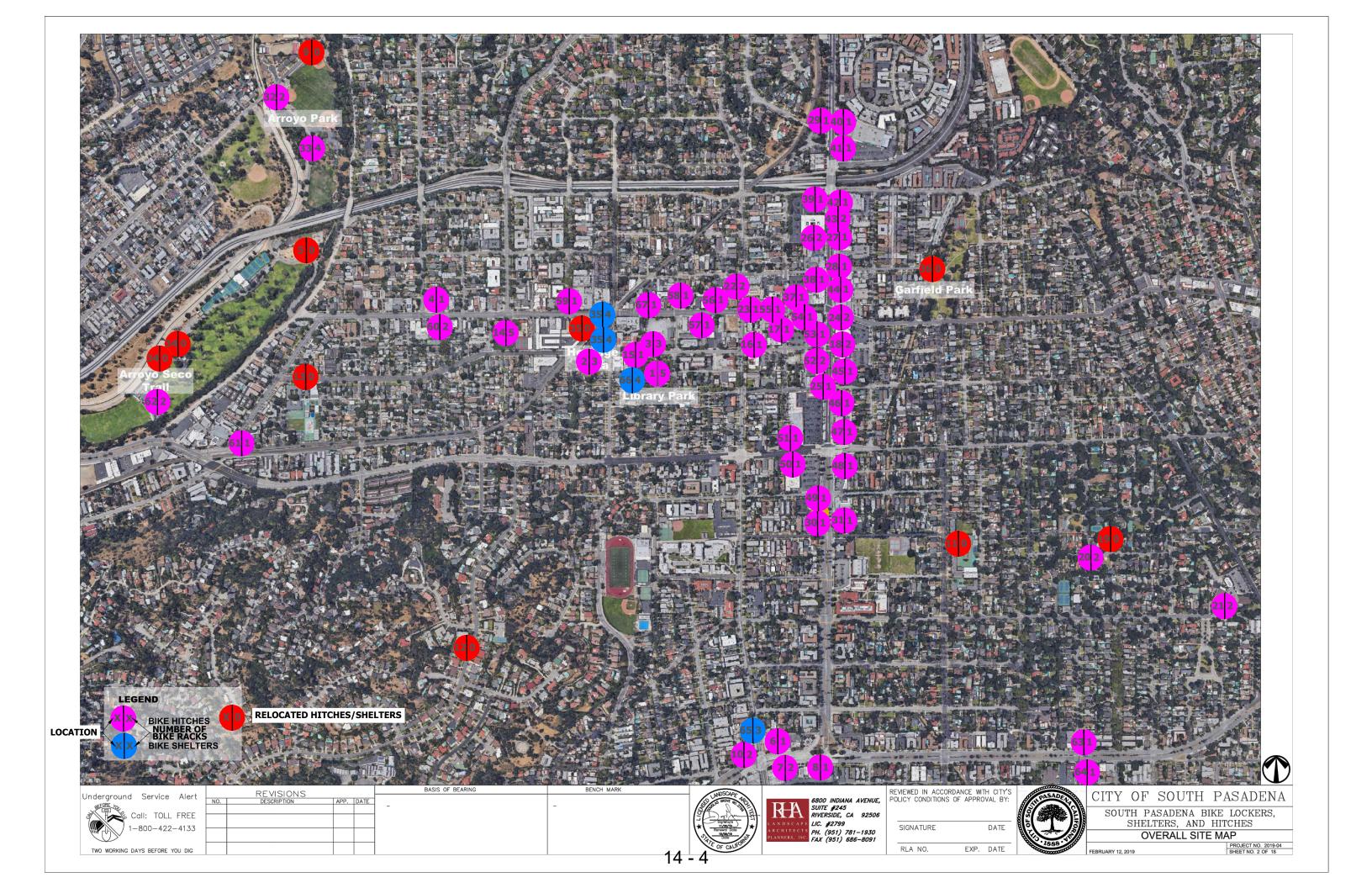

#### Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1. Adopt a resolution to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) identifying the proposed projects to be funded by Senate Bill 1 (SB1): Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA) Program; and
- 2. Authorize the City Manager or designee to sign the application and all related program documents.

### **Commission Review and Recommendation**

This matter was reviewed by the Mobility and Transportation Infrastructure Commission at their June 16, 2020 meeting and the Commission recommended that the City Council approve utilizing the City Council approved 2019-20 FY street improvement project list in the SB1 Resolution.

### **Community Outreach**

This matter was reviewed by the Mobility and Transportation Infrastructure Commission at their June 16, 2020 meeting where public comment was solicited.

### **Discussion/Analysis**

SB1 (Beall, Chapter 5, Statutes of 2017) provides the first significant, stable, and ongoing increase in state transportation funding in more than two decades. SB1 provides additional funding for transportation infrastructure by creating a new transportation funding program RMRA for the CTC to oversee.

Prior to receiving an apportionment of SB1 funds from the State Controller (Controller) in a Fiscal Year (FY), a city must submit to the CTC a resolution identifying the proposed projects to be funded with these funds. All projects proposed to receive funding must be included in a city budget that is adopted by the applicable city council at a regular public meeting. The proposed

resolution must include a project list with a description and the location of each proposed project, a proposed schedule for the project's completion, and the estimated useful life of the improvement. The Controller, upon receipt of the report from the CTC, shall apportion RMRA funds to eligible cities. Below is a list of the 2019-20 FY Street Improvement Projects that has been approved by the City Council and are now included in the SB1 funding resolution:

### **Next Steps**

- 1. The adopted resolution will be submitted to the CTC which is due by July 15, 2020.
- 2. The SB1 funds from the State will be distributed to the City in the Fall 2020.

#### **Background**

On April 28, 2017, Governor Brown signed SB1, a landmark transportation funding package that will generate \$5.2 Billion per year in new revenues from various taxes and fees and is designed to repair and maintain our State highways and local roads. Beginning November 1, 2017, the Controller will deposit various portions of this funding into the RMRA program. A percentage of this RMRA funding will be apportioned by formula to eligible cities and counties pursuant to Streets and Highways Code (SHC) Section 2032(h) for basic road maintenance, rehabilitation, and critical safety projects on the local streets and roadways system. SB1 emphasizes the importance of accountability and transparency in the delivery of California's transportation programs. Therefore, in order to be eligible for RMRA funding, statute requires cities and counties to provide basic annual RMRA project reporting to the CTC.

### **Fiscal Impact**

For the City of South Pasadena (City), historically SB1 has provided approximately \$460,000 in local funds annually. The amount of SB1 funding provided to local agencies is a function of the gas sales in the area. As a result of COVID-19 pandemic, there has been a reduction in gas sales. The Controller has not issued proposed revenue forecasts of the SB1 for the next fiscal year, however it is anticipated to decrease.

A city receiving an apportionment of RMRA funds is required to sustain a Maintenance of Effort (MOE) by spending at least the annual average of its General Fund expenditures during the Fiscal Years 2009-10, 2010-11, and 2011-12 for street, road, and highway purposes. The state established MOE for the City is \$1.4M annually in order to maintain eligibility for the funds. As a result of COVID-19, the City is facing General Fund budget shortfalls which will impact the City's ability to meet the State required MOE and could result in the City forfeiting SB1 funding. The City has requested that the State waive the MOE requirements while agencies recover from the COVID-19 budget shortfalls. So far there has been no final decision regarding the SB1 MOE from the State.

# A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, IDENTIFYING A LIST OF PROJECTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2020-21 FUNDED BY SENATE BILL 1: THE ROAD REPAIR AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT OF 2017

**WHEREAS,** Senate Bill 1 (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 (Chapter 5, Statutes of 2017) was passed by the Legislature and Signed into law by the Governor in April 2017, in order to address the significant multi-modal transportation funding shortfalls statewide; and

**WHEREAS,** SB 1 includes accountability and transparency provisions that will ensure the residents of the City of South Pasadena (City) are aware of the projects proposed for funding in our community and which projects have been completed each fiscal year; and

**WHEREAS**, the City must adopt a list of all projects proposed to receive funding from the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA), created by SB 1 by resolution, which must include a description and the location of each proposed project, a proposed schedule for the project's completion, and the estimated useful life of the improvement; and

**WHEREAS**, the City, will receive an estimated \$460,000 in RMRA funding in Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-21 from SB 1; and

**WHEREAS,** this is the year in which the City is receiving SB 1 funding and will enable the City to continue essential road maintenance and rehabilitation projects, safety improvements, repairing and replacing aging bridges, and increasing access and mobility options for the traveling public that would not have otherwise been possible without SB 1; and

**WHEREAS**, the City has undergone a robust public process to ensure public input into our community's transportation priorities/the project list. The City's Mobility and Transportation Infrastructure Commission (MTIC) reviewed the proposed project list, received public input and provided a recommendation to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City used a Pavement Management System (PMS) to develop the SB 1 project list to ensure revenues are being used on the most high-priority and cost-effective projects that also meet the community's priorities for transportation investment. The PMS generates a comprehensive report of the citywide pavement condition index (PCI) for all streets. The PCI, engineering recommendation, citizen participation and MTIC input are utilized to establish the proposed capital improvement program annually; and

**WHEREAS,** the funding from SB 1 will help the City maintain and rehabilitate streets/roads, bridges, add active transportation infrastructure throughout the City this year and similar projects into the future; and

**WHEREAS,** the 2018 California Statewide Local Streets and Roads Needs Assessment found that the City's streets and roads are at higher risk and this revenue will help the City increase the overall quality of our road system and over the next decade will bring the City's streets and roads into good condition; and

**WHEREAS,** the SB 1 project list and overall investment in our local streets and roads infrastructure with a focus on basic maintenance and safety, investing in complete streets infrastructure, and using cutting-edge technology, materials and practices, will have significant positive co-benefits statewide.

## NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 2.** The following list of newly proposed projects will be funded in-part of solely with FY 2020-21 Road Maintenance Rehabilitation Account revenues:
