Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Review the Proposed 2022-2023 Proposed Budget and make recommendations for the final Preliminary Budget to be presented on June 1;
- Review potential Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) and make recommendations on which items to fund with SLFRF dollars; and
- 3) Review the current list of Committed Fund Balances and consider any modifications.

Background

The City of South Pasadena adopts a comprehensive Annual Adopted Budget ("Budget") for all funds including the General Fund. In addition to the General Fund, there are Enterprise Funds, Special Funds and Internal Service Funds. Unlike the General Fund, Enterprise funds such as the Water and Sewer Funds can be for-profit, and serve to provide a public service while making sure that they are solvent, where revenues meet or exceed expenses. The City also has Special Funds must be spent on a specific purpose, are usually funded via a federal, state or county source, and are highly regulated by a third-party secured by the grantor. Internal Service funds are implemented within the agency to ensure that all funds are paying/receiving their fair share of revenue and expenses, as is the case with the City's Fund 103 - Insurance Fund, which collects from the appropriate internal entity so each entity can be charged its fair share of insurance costs.

The Budget process begins early in the calendar year and is a lengthy process of department meetings, revenue and expenditure analyses, and projections for the year ahead, coordinated through the Finance Department. Once all departments have submitted their proposal for the upcoming fiscal year, they confer on the final proposal with the City Manager. The proposed budget is presented to the Finance Commission, where their recommendation of the document is requested for the City Council's consideration. A budget study session is held for the City Council and community to provide feedback and input on the proposed budget, and give direction to staff on

furthering the document toward a final draft. Recommendations and any further requested information are included and clarified in a return item to City Council, the Final Preliminary Budget, for which City Manager and Finance Director seek adoption in June 2022.

Discussion/Analysis

For all City funds, which features Total Budget Revenues of \$69,748,864 and Total Budgeted Expenditures of \$69,724,739, we project a net positive balance of \$24,125. The General Fund is budgeting revenues of \$36,129,935 and expenditures/outflows of \$35,929,826, for a projected net positive change of \$200,109. The focus of this report will be on the General Fund, as all other funds are highly regulated by a third-party and revenue within those funds are for a specific purpose whereas, the General Fund is at the sole discretion of the City Council.

- Requesting Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) consideration for three (3) critical apparatus replacement:
 - Air Quality Apparatus (\$600,000)

 - Breathing Apparatus (\$150,000)

Management Services

- Phase II of Class and Comp Study
- City General Election (November)
- Recruitment and employee engagement efforts
- Return of Commissioner Congress program

Community Development

- New Senior Management Analyst focused on housing programs
- New Part-Time Code Enforcement Officer for weekends/evenings
- Convert 3 part-time positions into 1 full-time Permit Counter Technician
- Historical Residential Property Survey (\$65,000)

Public Works

- New Transportation Engineer
- Increase in tree planting budget to accelerate planting
- Requesting Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) consideration for asphalt truck replacement (\$300,000)

- Unfreezing of Deputy Chief position

Staffing Changes from FY 21/22 Budget to Proposed FY 22/23 Budget

In the FY 21/22 Budget Mid-Year, City Council approved five (5) positions: Deputy City Manager, Management Services Director, two Management Analysts in Public Works and an Accountant in Finance. Positions were added in a reorganization of the City Manager's Office and in development of the Management Services Department, as well as a reorganization of the Public Works Department. In the proposed FY 22/23 budget, three (3) new positions are being proposed: Transportation Engineer (Public Works), Permit Counter Technician and Senior Management Analyst for Housing (Community Development). We are also requesting the unfreezing of three (3) positions: Deputy Police Chief, Police Officer and Librarian. These positions reflect a change of 11 new or unfrozen positions across the organization between the two fiscal year budgets, and provide for further capacity for priority areas. Other Considerations

Staff seeks City Council direction on the following items:

"Wish List"

Items that are under consideration to be added to the upcoming budget but that are not in the upcoming budget as-built are placed on the Wish List. These will be discussed at the May 25, 2022 Budget Presentation. The current list is as follows:

- Skating rink for holiday season (\$30,000) Council request
- LED lighting for Golf Course (\$16,000) may be funded through Golf Course fund

Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF)

The City has received \$6,059,235 in unrestricted SLFRF. These funds were initially intended to assist local entities in offsetting the costs and circumstances encountered due to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, in January 2022, a "Final Rule" with regards to these funds was issued, which lifts restrictions on the use of the funds for entities receiving less than \$10 million. The funds must be appropriated by December 2024 and expended by December 2026. The City Council has expressed preliminary interest in funding the following projects/items with SLFRF dollars.

- Reimbursement to General Fund of already-incurred emergency supplies/equipment costs in response to the pandemic (\$1M)
- MOU Negotiations (\$1.5-2M to be determined)
- Fire Apparatus/Ambulance (\$1M)
- Public Works Asphalt Utility Truck (\$300,000)
- Community Services Registration Software (\$50,000)
- Police Electronic Control Devices (ECD's) (\$70,000)
- Employee engagement/retention (to be determined)
- Citywide Technology Enhancements (to be determined)

Total: \$3,920,000-\$4,420,000+

Fiscal Impact

If adopted as-is, the net General Fund fiscal impact of the Proposed Budget is a positive increase to fund balance of \$200,109.

Community Outreach

The proposed budget document has been made available for public review through the posting of the document for the Finance Commission meetings, on the City's website, through the City's social media and e-newsletter communications tools.

Commission Review

The Finance Commission met on May 16, 2022 to receive a presentation on the FY 22/23 Proposed Budget, and provided good feedback to staff deliberate on the

Proposed Budget. The Commission requested additional time to review the document, and as of the posting of this item, is scheduled to meet a second time on May 23, 2022.
