Re: Housing Element Performance

Dear Mayor Cacciotti and Councilmembers:

Mr. Cacciotti and I met a few weeks ago at my request. I wished to share with him my assessment of the City's performance on the objectives set forth in its 2014-2021 General Plan Housing Element Update and get his thoughts on the same. I very much appreciate his making time for what I believe amounted to a productive dialogue on a handful of housing issues.

I don't wish to misquote Mr. Cacciotti, so I will say only that I understood him to offer the possibility of the City Council directing staff to take a look at some of my findings and identify Housing Element objectives not achieved, that might still be achieved by assigning City resources and bandwidth.

In February and March of this year, I received two sets of documents responding to two Public Records Requests I had sent to Chief City Clerk Mejia. Many of my requests elicited responsive records, and many did not. The absence of responsive records would suggest that no action has been taken on a given Housing Element objective. It is on some of these objectives that I would like to focus.

Below are some of the requests to which no responsive records were found, and others on which I would like to comment. For the sake of space, I have combined and edited where appropriate. Mr. Mejia's responses are in *italics*; my comments are underlined.

1. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to projects for which a planned development permit was sought because such projects were to include affordable housing units.

No responsive records were found.

2. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to the City's efforts to encourage developers to take advantage of the planned development permit incentive.

No responsive records were found.

3. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to projects for which a density bonus was sought because such projects were to include affordable housing units.

No responsive records were found.

4. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to the City's efforts to encourage developers to take advantage of the density bonus incentive.

No responsive records were found.

5. All records of communications dated in the last seven years, to or from the City, referencing or relating to residential rental prices proposed, estimated or established for the Mission Place Project (MPP), which was a subject of community discussions in 2016, as well as all records referencing or relating to affordable housing units as part of this project.

No responsive records were found.

Although this project has been shelved, rental prices should be part of any planning and discussion of mixed-use projects such as MPP, and the City should be involved, especially when it has affordable housing goals that aren't being met.

6. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to affordable housing units as part of the Mission View project, which was a subject of a community discussion on January 11, 2017.

No responsive records were found.

Although this project has been shelved, the possibility of affordable units should be part of any planning and discussion of mixed-use projects such as MPP, and the City should be involved, especially when it has affordable housing goals that aren't being met.

7. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to the City's efforts to encourage the development of an emergency shelter, transitional or supportive housing,

or Single Room Occupancy (SRO) housing in the vacant office building at 220 Pasadena Avenue; on the vacant site at 119 Pasadena Avenue; or on the vacant site at 5 Pasadena Avenue.

No responsive records were found.

8. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to the City's efforts to receive grants under the Cal Home Program.

No responsive records were found.

9. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to the City's efforts to receive Community Development Block Grants (CDBGs).

See responsive records.

HUD's priorities for the CDBG program are fairly clear. To "ensure decent affordable housing" and "provide services to the most vulnerable in our communities" are the first two mentioned on its Web page. Additionally, the City's own documents state that "The funds are restricted to benefit persons of low and moderate income and other limited programs in compliance with other Federal regulations." Per the responsive records, in recent years the City has spent the vast majority of these funds, about \$100,000 a year, repairing sidewalks along stretches of Adelaine, Meridian, Palm, Fairview and Montrose. These are hardly low-income areas; far from it. These allocations lend the appearance of infrastructure projects geared toward raising property values generally ("Mayberry" factor) and specifically (upgrading relatively affluent areas of single-family homes). I would ask the City to change its approach to these grants, keeping in mind the low- to moderate-income residents they were designed to benefit.

10. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to the City's efforts to receive subsidies under the Federal Home Loan Bank Affordable Housing Program.

No responsive records were found.

11. All records dated between January 1, 2006, and the present referencing or relating to the City's efforts, pursuant to the 2006-2014 Housing Element Update, to retain "a consultant to provide housing authority services and to actively participate in affordable housing committees and task forces to inform the development community of the sites available for development of affordable housing."¹

No responsive records were found.

12. All records dated in the last five years referencing or relating to the City's provision of Notices of Funding Availability (NOFAs) to developers.

No responsive records were found.

13. All records and communications dated between January 1, 2014, and the present containing "information to developers to promote development of 17 units of very low, 10 units of low, and 11 units of moderate income housing units during the 2014-2021 planning period."²

No responsive records were found.

Having put in considerable time and resources, I would appreciate a response as to where we might go from here. I would also like to offer volunteer assistance in working toward the above goals, to the extent possible and appropriate.

Thank you very much for your time and attention, and for your service to the city.

- July 19, 2017 • The City Council adopted Resolution No. 7524, declaring its intention to transition to district-based elections.

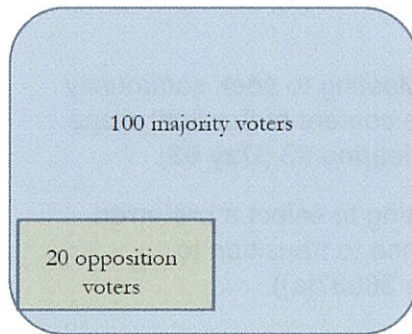

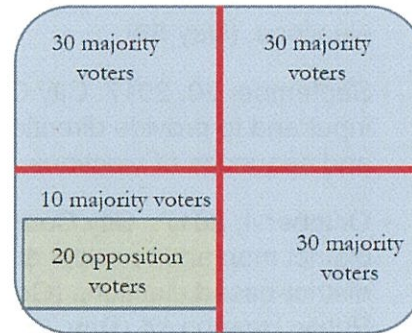
How Are District Elections Designed To Work?

Criteria for District Boundaries

Mandatory Criteria

- Equal Population Based on Census Data.
 - Not voter registration or eligible voting age population.
- Compliance with Federal Voting Rights Act.
- No Racial Gerrymandering

Traditional Criteria

- Topography

If there is a “neighborhood” with a concentration of a protected class group, it cannot be divided in a way that dilutes their voting strength.

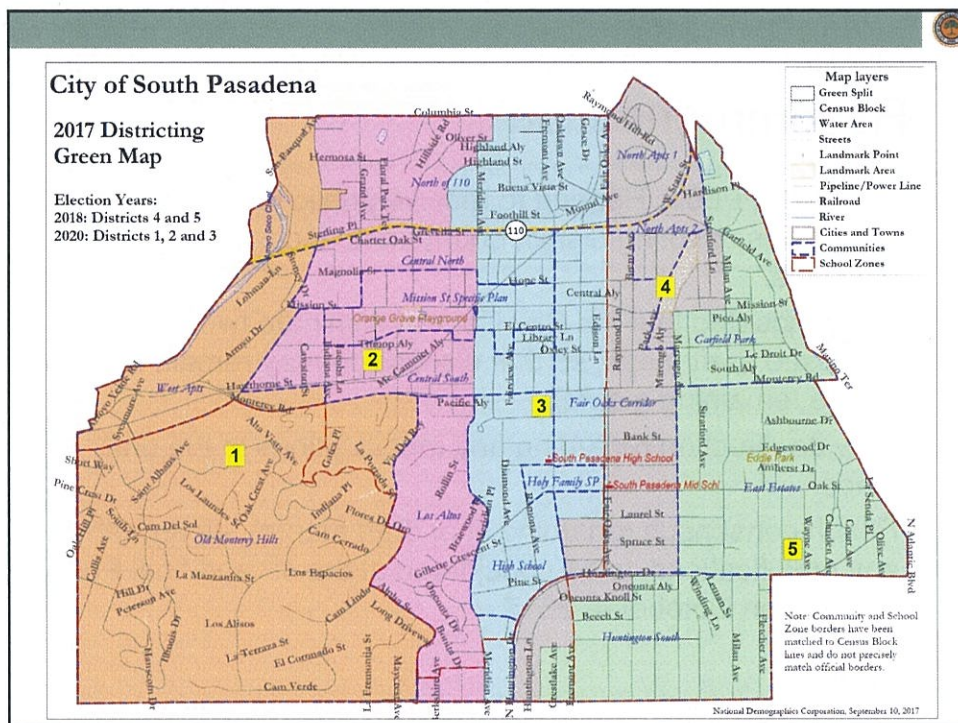
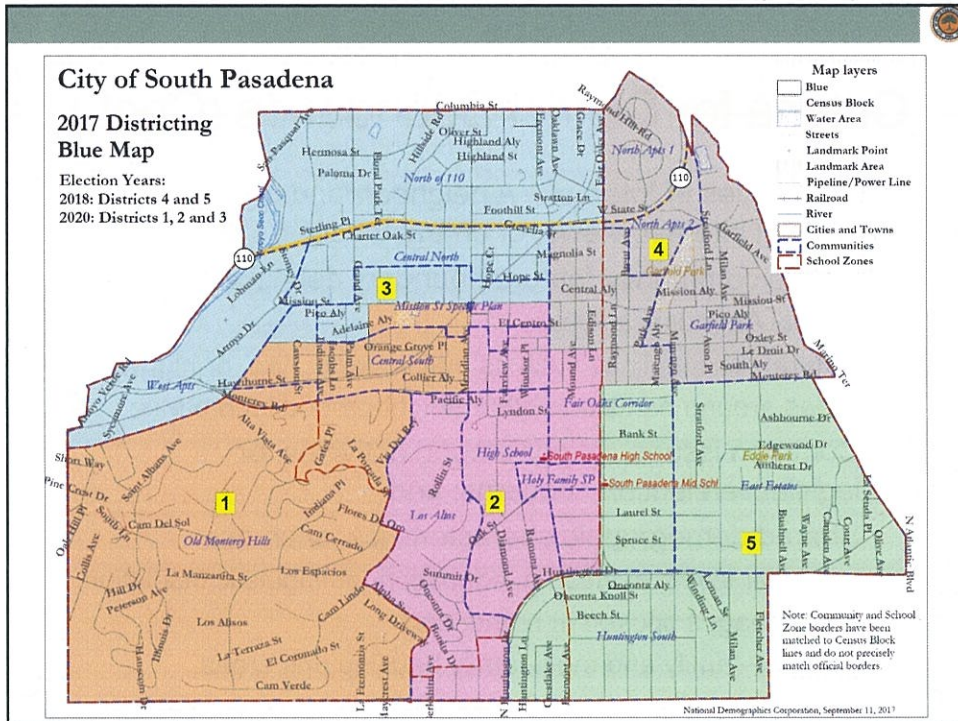
But, Courts say that race cannot be the predominant factor. District boundaries cannot “cherry pick” street by street to place a protected class into the same district.

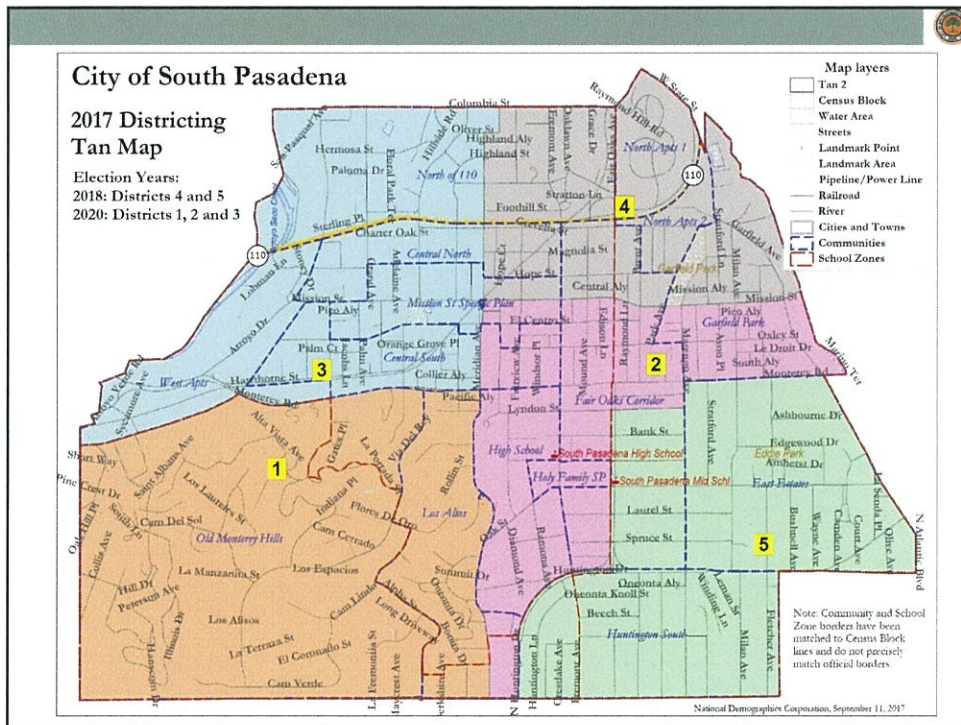
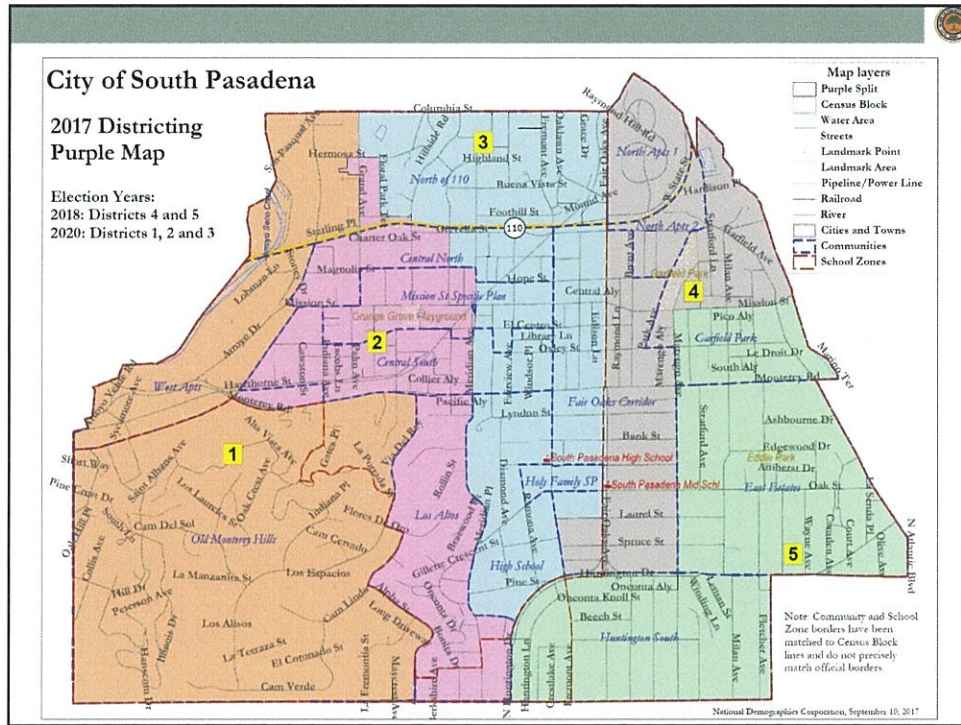
Criteria for District Boundaries (Cont.)

- Communities of Interest – A neighborhood or community of shared interest, views, or characteristics.
- Possible community feature/boundary definitions include:
 - School Attendance Areas;
 - Natural dividing lines such as major roads, hills, or highways;
 - Areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks;
 - Common issues, neighborhood activities, or legislative/election concerns; and
 - Shared demographic characteristics, such as:
 - Similar levels of income, education, or linguistic insolation;
 - Languages spoken at home; and
 - Single-family and multi-family housing unit areas.

Recommendation

- Conduct a Public Hearing to receive public testimony on the draft maps of voting district boundaries and the sequence of elections.
- It is suggested that the City Council eliminate two or more proposed draft maps, so that discussion may remain focused on the remaining map(s).
- Provide direction regarding any modifications to the draft maps.
- Reach consensus regarding final draft map(s), along with any modifications, to be considered at the 4th and final Public Hearing on October 4, 2017.

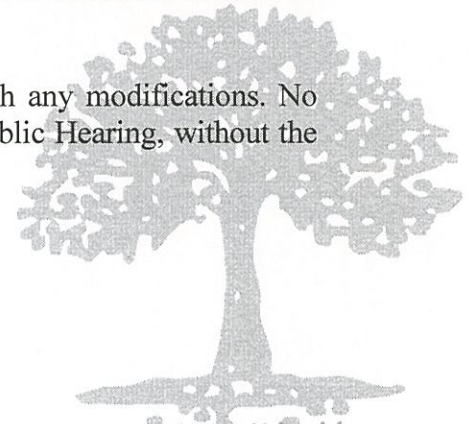
Attached is the summary of public comments from the Community Workshop held on Saturday, September 16, 2017. In addition, residents submitted maps with suggested modification and/or maps were created to reflect the resident's verbal suggestions. Recently received email communications are included for your review. As new emails and maps are received, they will be forwarded to the City Council.

City Council Meeting of September 20, 2017

City staff will make a presentation regarding the districting process, review the proposed draft maps, and respond to City Council inquiries. Following public comment, it is recommended that the City Council by consensus eliminate at least 2 maps from consideration, so that debate can remain focused on the remaining maps.

The City's Demographer will have the capability of adjusting the draft maps "live" to ensure such modifications meet legal requirements. Therefore, utilizing the remaining maps in contention, it is recommended that the City Council provide feedback whether to "test" a resident's proposed modification. If the proposed modification cannot be achieved on the preferred map(s), or if the City Council does not support the modification, the City Council will need to determine whether to eliminate the modification from further consideration.

Ultimately, the City Council must select 1-2 preferred maps, along with any modifications. No additional modification can be accepted following the September 20th Public Hearing, without the scheduling of Special Meeting(s).

A Community Workshop was called to order by Chief City Clerk Mejia on Saturday, September 16, 2017, at 10:15 a.m., in the Amedee O. “Dick” Richards, Jr., Council Chamber, located at 1424 Mission Street, South Pasadena, California.

City Staff

Present: Elaine Aguilar, Interim City Manager, and Anthony J. Mejia, Chief City Clerk.

1. Presentation of Draft Maps of Voting District Boundaries for a City Council District-Based Electoral System

Chief City Clerk Mejia narrated a PowerPoint presentation entitled “Developing Boundaries for a District-Based Electoral System;” facilitated a question and answer session with members of the audience.

Brandy Guenveur, South Pasadena resident, voiced opposition to the draft “Tan” map, noting that she would reside within District 2; opined that District 2 appears to be remnants of other districts; pointed out that the neighborhoods of Garfield Park and south Meridian Avenue do not have shared concerns and should not be grouped together.

Delaine Shanes, South Pasadena resident, expressed opposition to the “Tan” map, suggesting that south Meridian Avenue should not be grouped with the Monterey Hills neighborhoods; advised that Meridian Avenue has unique traffic-related issues versus Monterey Hills has issues such as ensuring Fire Engine access and hillside erosion; opined that the Central South neighborhood should remain intact within a single district.

Bianca Richards, South Pasadena resident, spoke in opposition to the “Blue” and “Tan” maps, opining that they break up the neighborhood around the Library; suggested that the “Green” and “Purple” maps help keep cohesiveness in the Library area.

Sheila Rossi, South Pasadena resident, suggested that the Central South neighborhood should be kept within one district, noting that all of the draft maps split this area between two districts; pointed out that other neighborhoods such as Monterey Hills, East Estates, and Milan are not split between districts; questioned whether continuity of office should be of concern, noting that two incumbents will be in “safe” districts and the other three incumbents will not face head-to-head contest until 2020.

Elisabeth Emirhanian, South Pasadena resident, opposed the grouping of Old Monterey Hills and Los Altos within the same district as drafted in the “Tan” map, noting they are separate neighborhoods; conveyed support for preserving Central South within a single district.

Ron Rosen, South Pasadena resident, voiced support for the “Blue” map, noting that he would reside in District 2; voiced opposition to maps which extend District 2 all the way up to Columbia Avenue; suggested that the remainder of Central South could be added to District 2; voiced opposition to considering continuity of office, opining that the maps should be based on geographic rationalities; stated that some incumbents which would face head-to-head contests may not run for office.

Carol Kramer, South Pasadena resident, pointed out that she opposes the concept of district elections, noting that it leads to a divide and conquer mentality; expressed opposition to the “Purple” map due to Grand Avenue being divided; conveyed support for the “Green” map, noting that Grand Avenue shares issues related the vehicular speed.

David Beadle, South Pasadena resident, suggested that residents should form a group to advocate for legislative amendments to prevent abuse of the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA).

Chief City Clerk Mejia advised that the City Council has directed the City Attorney to draft possible legislative amendments to the CVRA so that the City Council and community can advocate for a common solution; noted that the options will be presented to the City Council and public following completion of this districting process.

Kay Findley, South Pasadena resident, spoke in support of the “Green” map and the concept of each district comprising of city limits from north to south; opined that Old Monterey Hills and Los Altos should be in separate districts as they face different issues.

Susan Sulsky, South Pasadena resident, advised that she supports district representation in hopes that more attention can be focused on dilapidated Caltrans homes and traffic issues in the southerly Meridian area; spoke in opposition to the “Purple” and “Green” maps, opining that the north and south orientation would cause Councilmembers to lack focus; questioned whether there could be at-large representation with committees focused on district issues.

Chief City Clerk Mejia explained that the City must choose between at-large versus district-based representation; noted that the City will retain having at-large Commissions which will help the City Council be mindful of citywide issues.

Dr. Marina Khubesrian, speaking as a private citizen, South Pasadena resident, noted that Councilmember Mahmud and herself were at the League of California Cities Annual Conference and spoke with elected representatives throughout California regarding the impacts of the CVRA; advised that the City Council is working with the City Attorney to develop possible CVRA amendments to ensure that such accusations meet a threshold of evidence; pointed out that it was helpful during the SR-710 discussions to have two legislators represent the Pasadena area, equating that it might be helpful to have two or more Councilmembers represent specific areas of convergence.

Ellen Wood, South Pasadena resident, stated that she initially believed keeping neighborhoods within a single district was appropriate, but now believe certain areas can benefit from having districts converge; noted that she resides in the low hills and could benefit from having two Councilmembers concerned with the Old Monterey Hills and Los Altos.

Sheila Rossi, South Pasadena resident, opined that if some neighborhoods will be split so two Councilmembers can represent the area, the concept should be applied citywide; advised that she is hopeful that more attention will be focused on the Central South area to help address safe routes to school and other pedestrian matters.

John Srebalus, South Pasadena resident, advised that he supports district elections as he believes that it will benefit renters and their tenant issues; noted that little has been done in South Pasadena to address affordable housing; pointed out that several of the maps may have majority renter households.

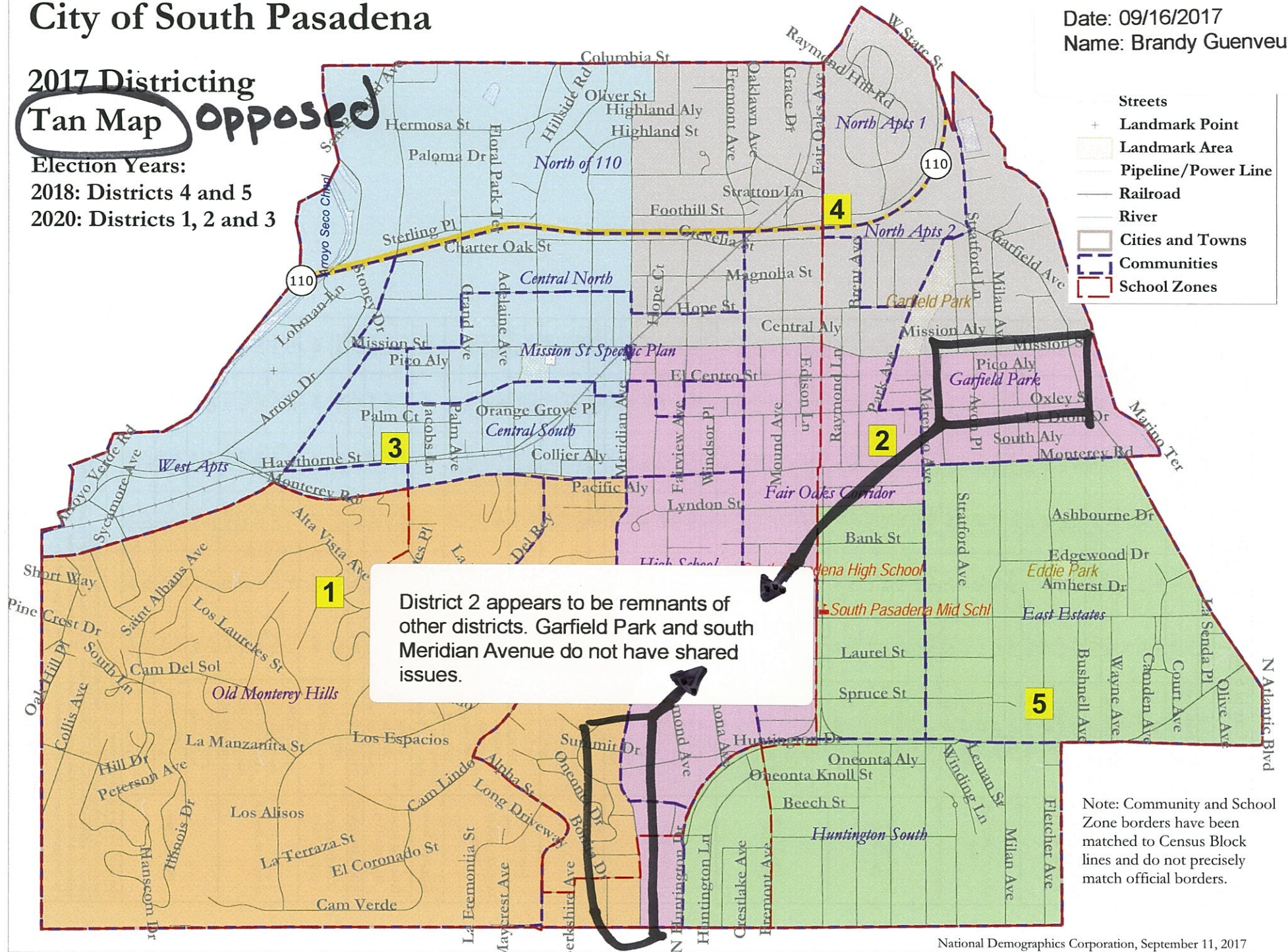
2017 Districting Tan Map **opposed**

2017 Districting Purple Map

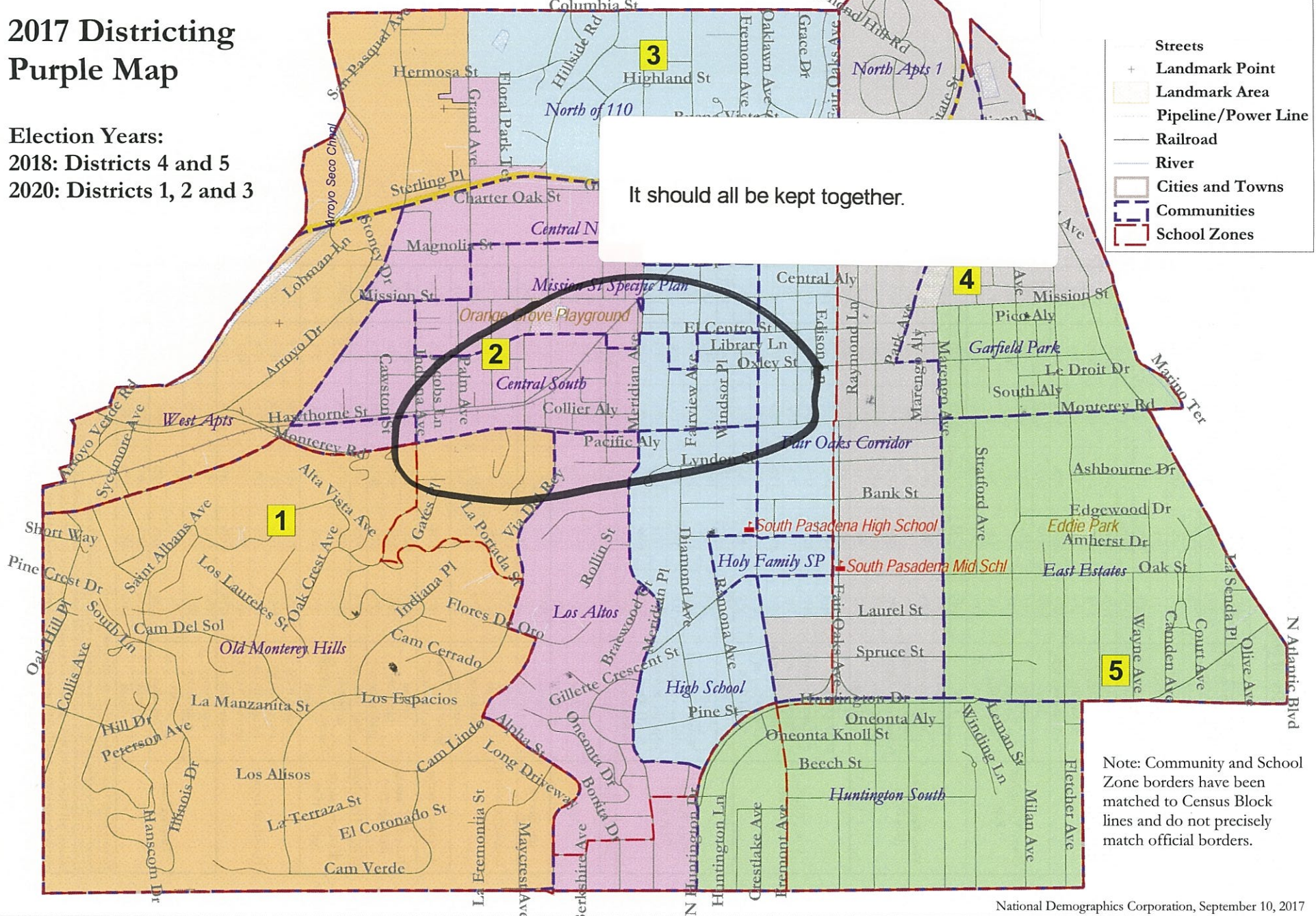

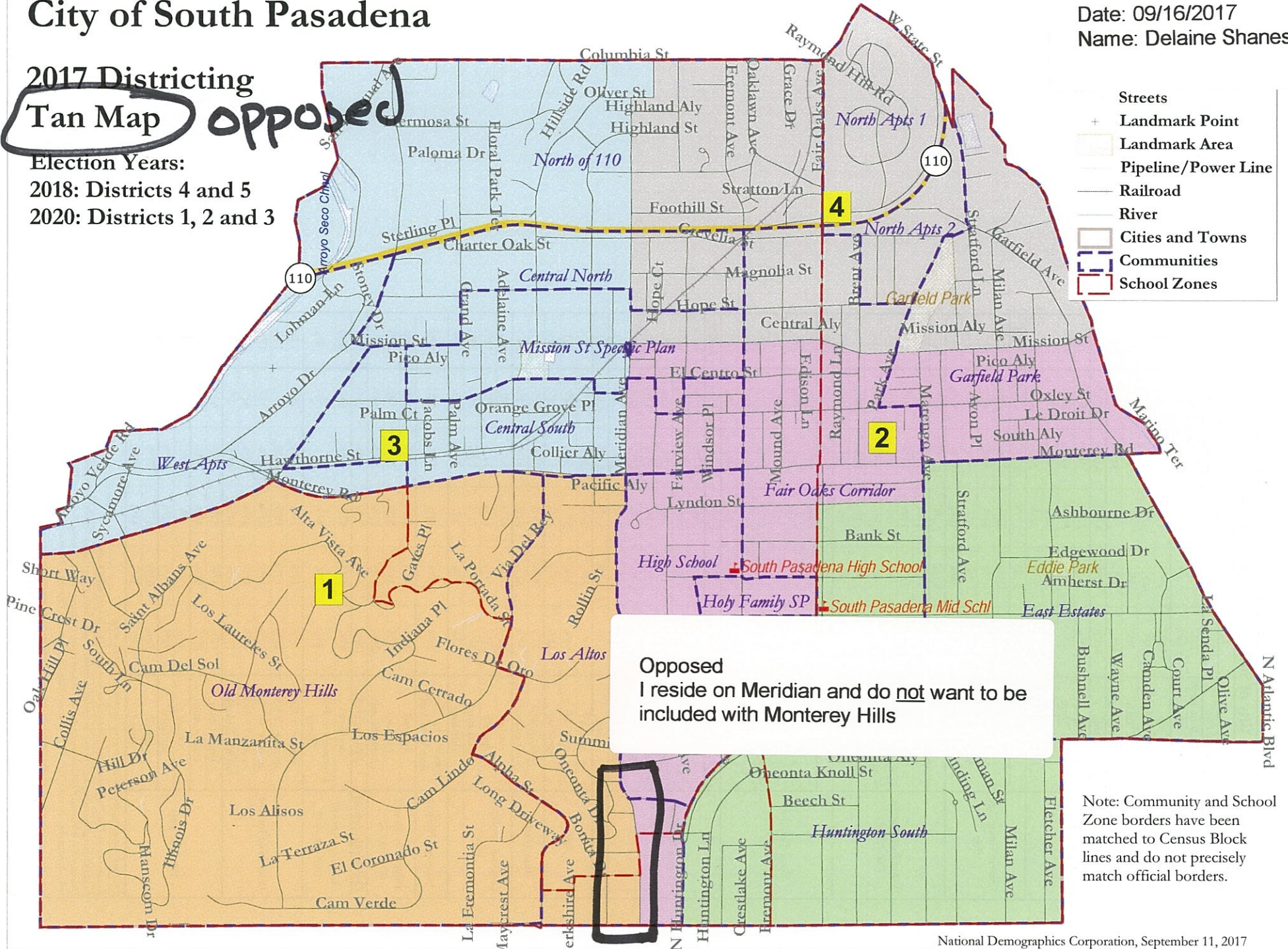

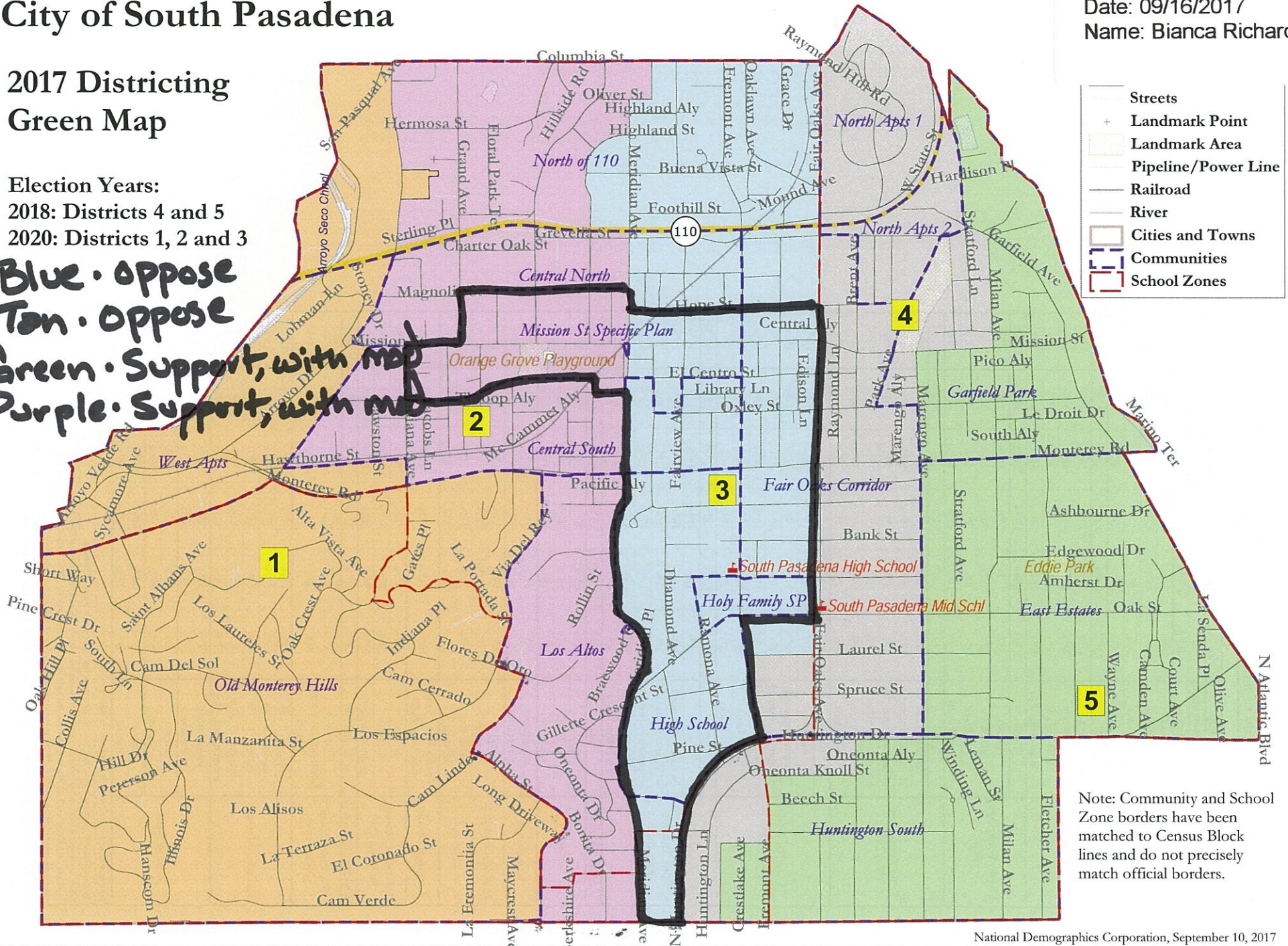

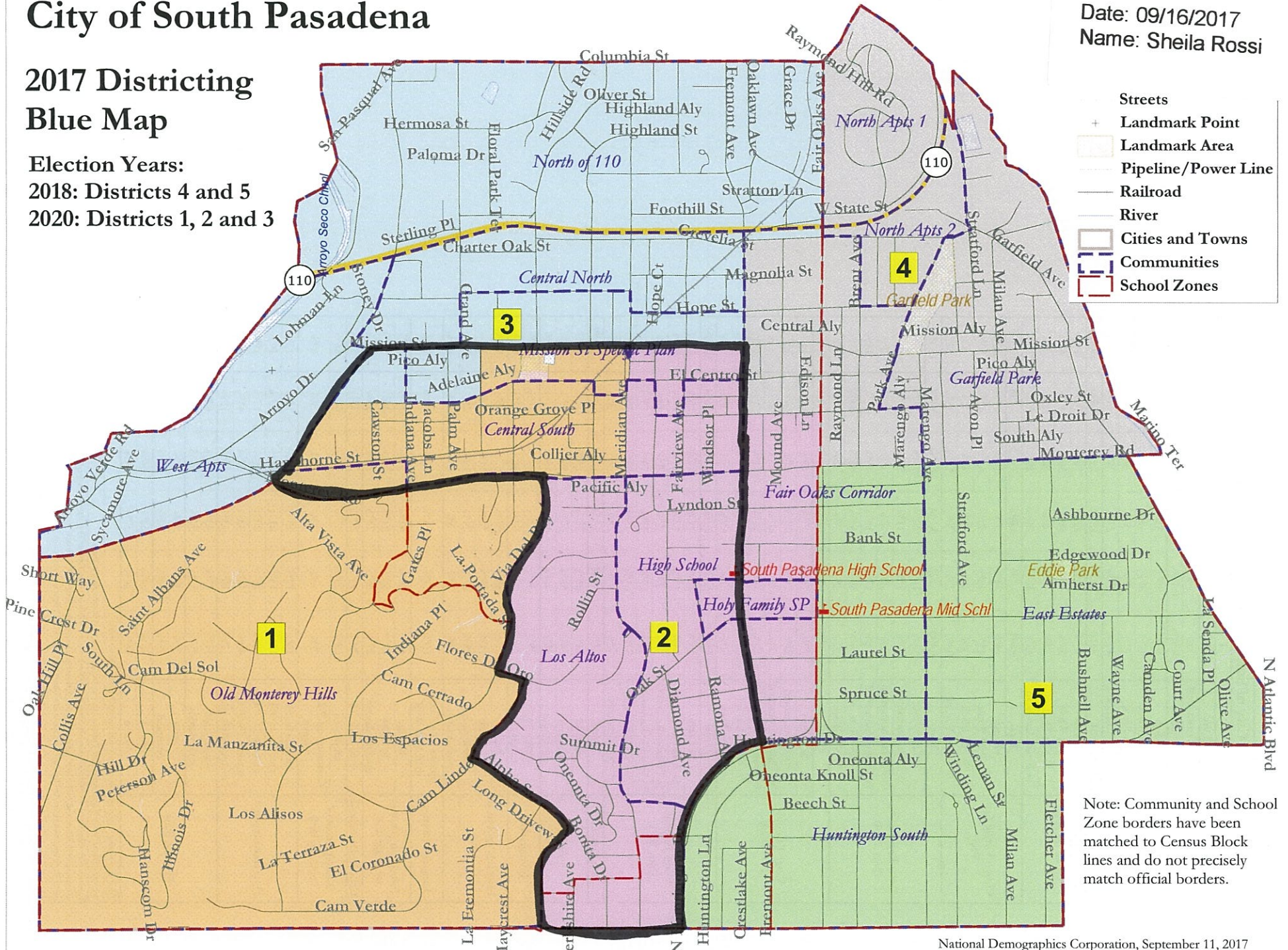

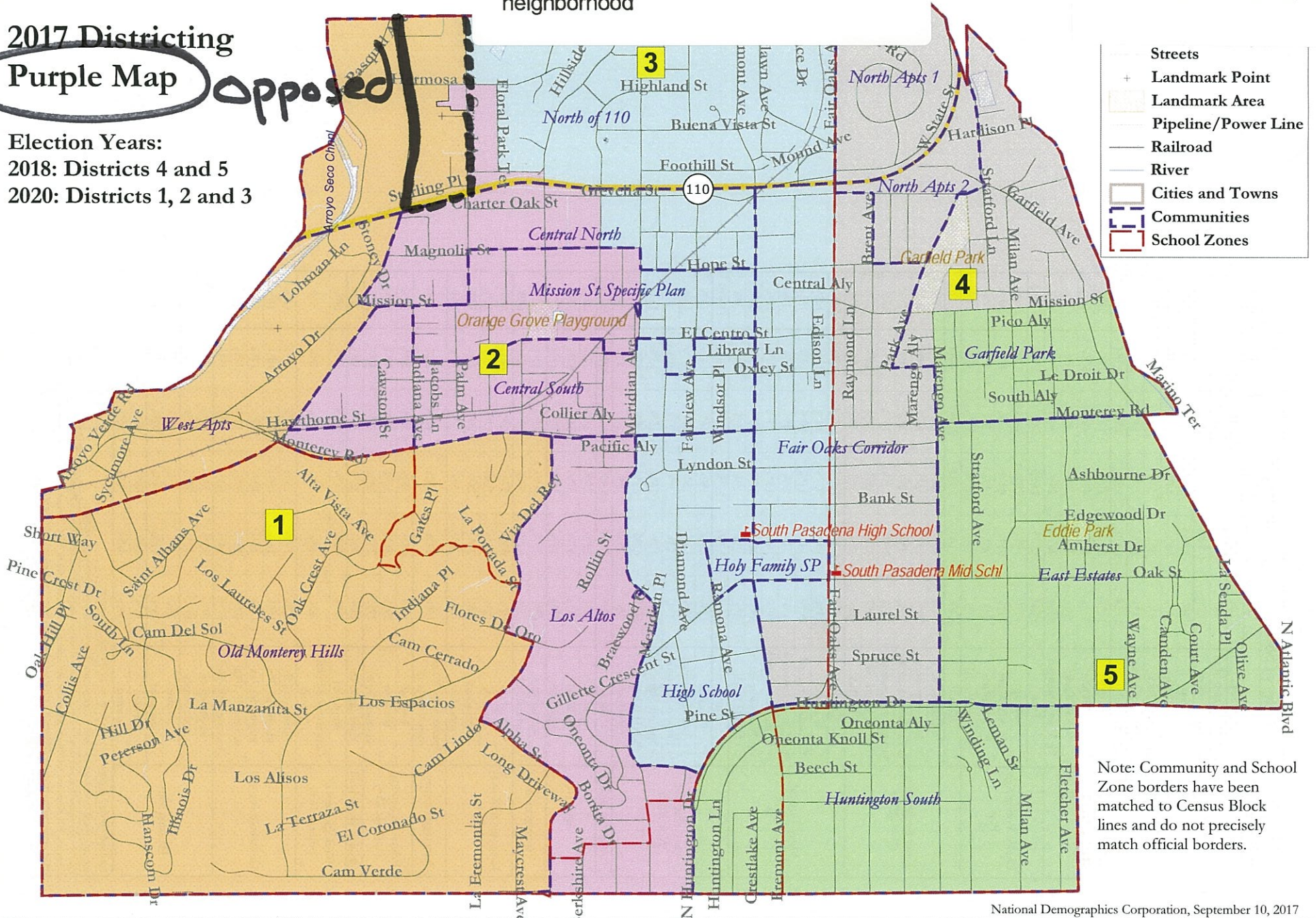

2017 Districting Green Map

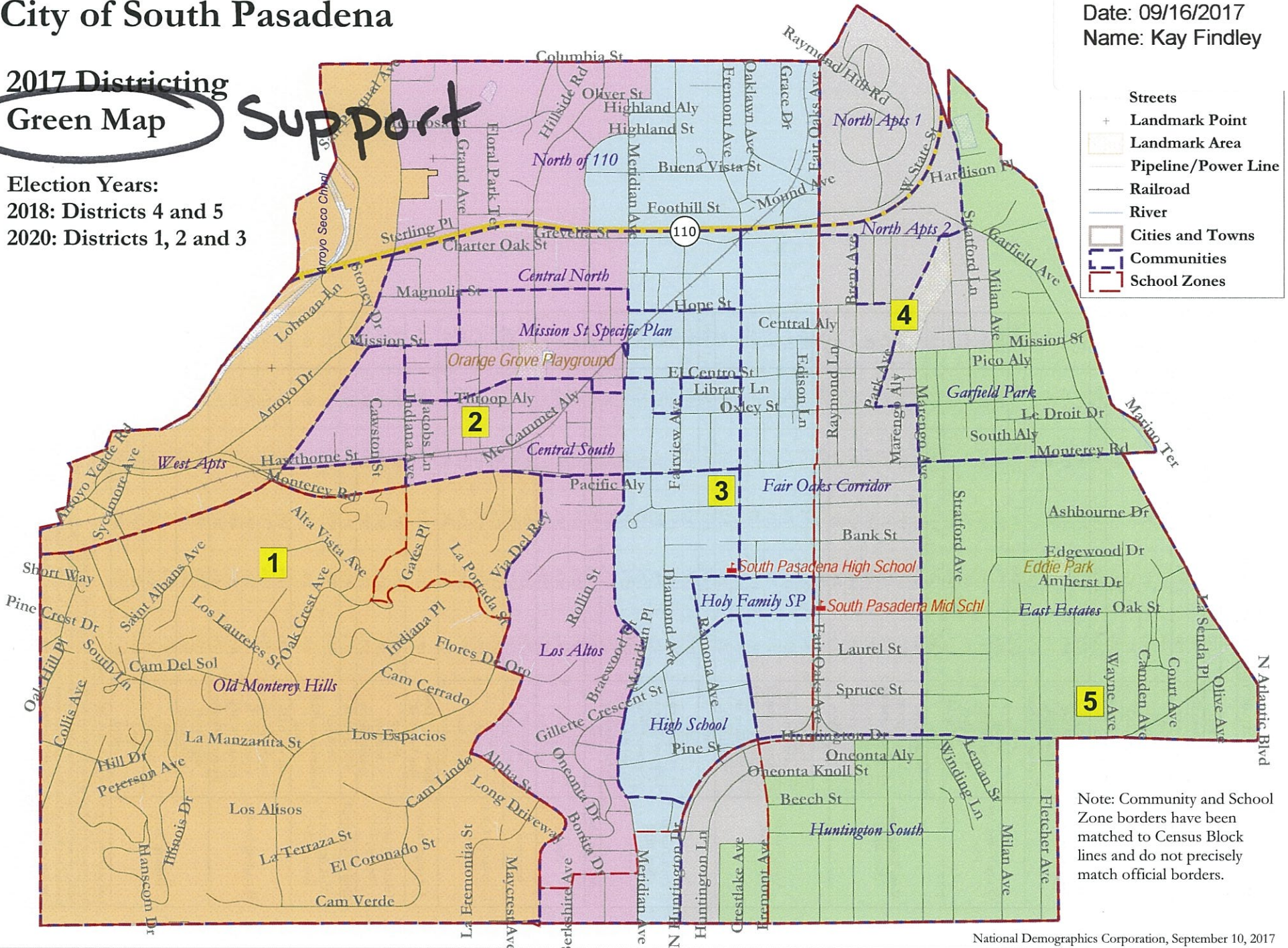

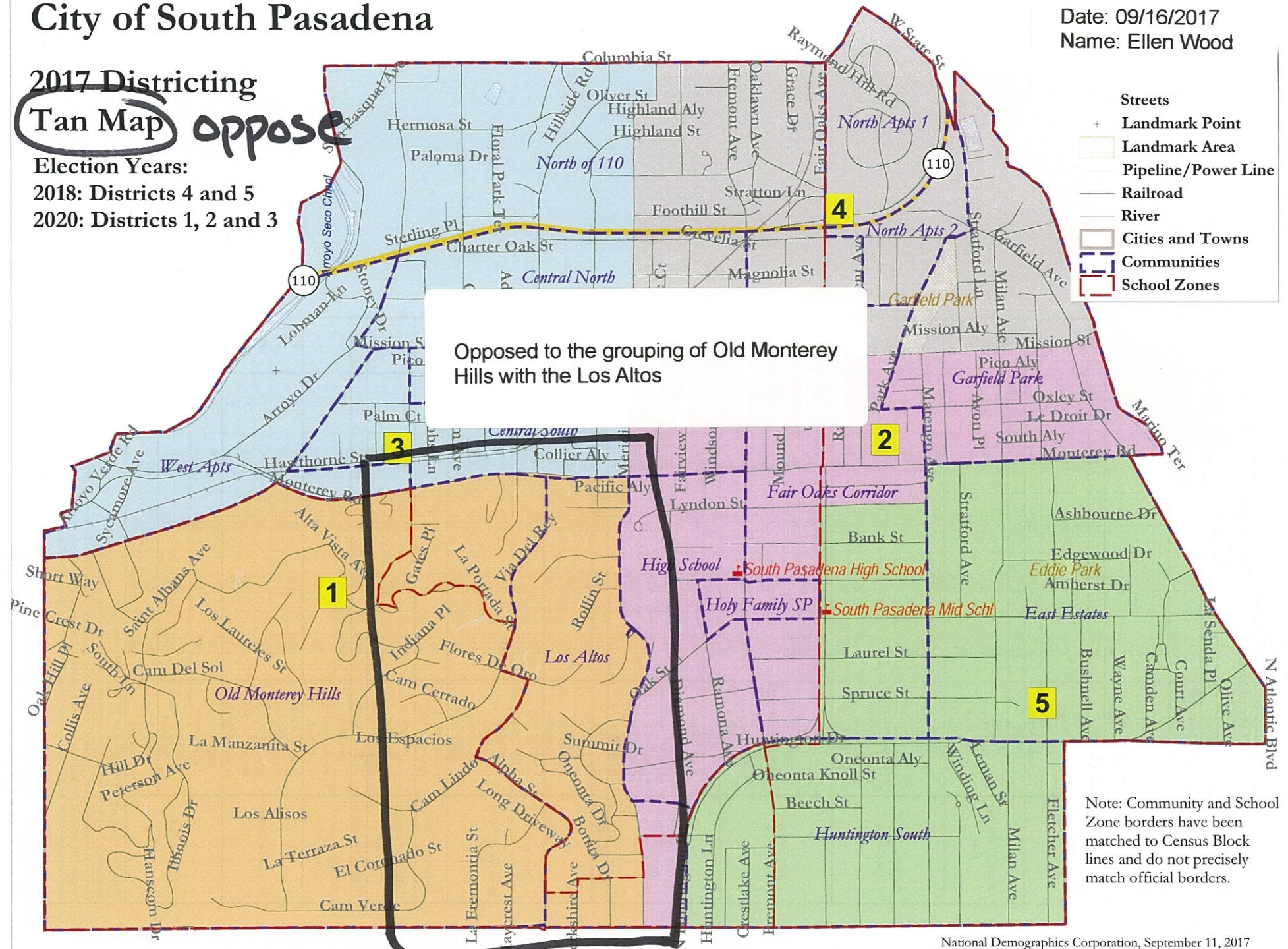

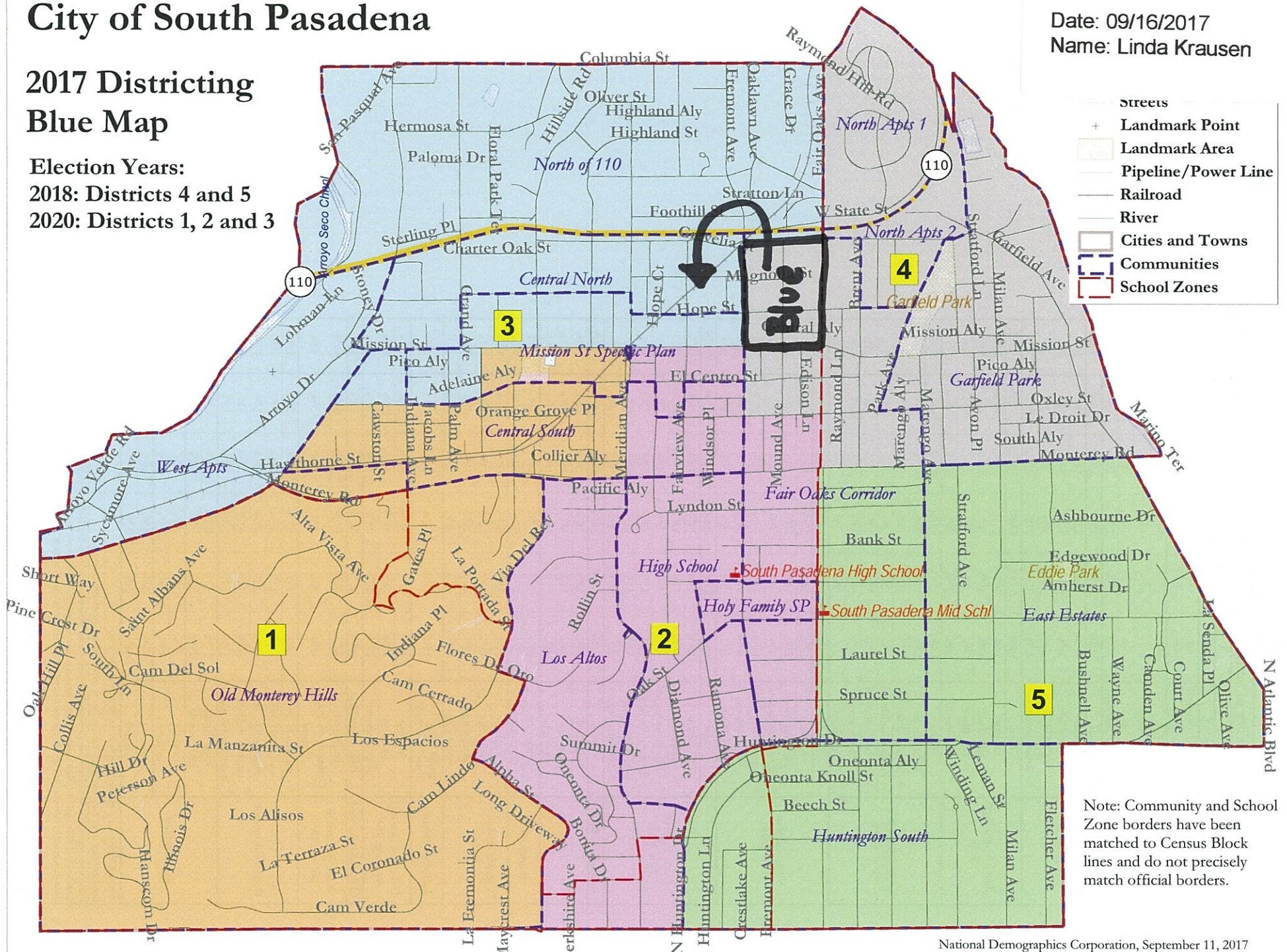

Dear South Pasadena City Council and City Clerk,

We have lived in the Monterey Hills part of South Pasadena for 10 years, and we love living in this City. We were surprised to see that a threatened lawsuit has essentially forced the City to adopt district-based voting instead of at-large voting. We do not believe that there is a good reason to make this change, but we understand that the change is going to happen.

We appreciate that you have prepared multiple possible district maps, and have welcomed public input about the various proposals.

To us, all of the proposed maps are fine, but the "tan" map is the best, for the following three reasons:

- The tan map creates the district (1) with the highest percentage (46%) of Asian-American residents, potentially bolstering their voting power. (The other maps also create this concentration, but not quite to the same degree.)
- The tan map also creates the district (3) with the highest percentage (24%) of Hispanic residents, potentially bolstering their voting power. (Again, the other maps also create this concentration, but not quite to the same degree.)
- The tan map sensibly has a northern border of Monterey Rd. for district 1, the "Old Monterey Hills" area, where we live. We believe that most people living in the Monterey Hills area consider Monterey Rd. to be the northern border of the area.

Thank you for considering this input.

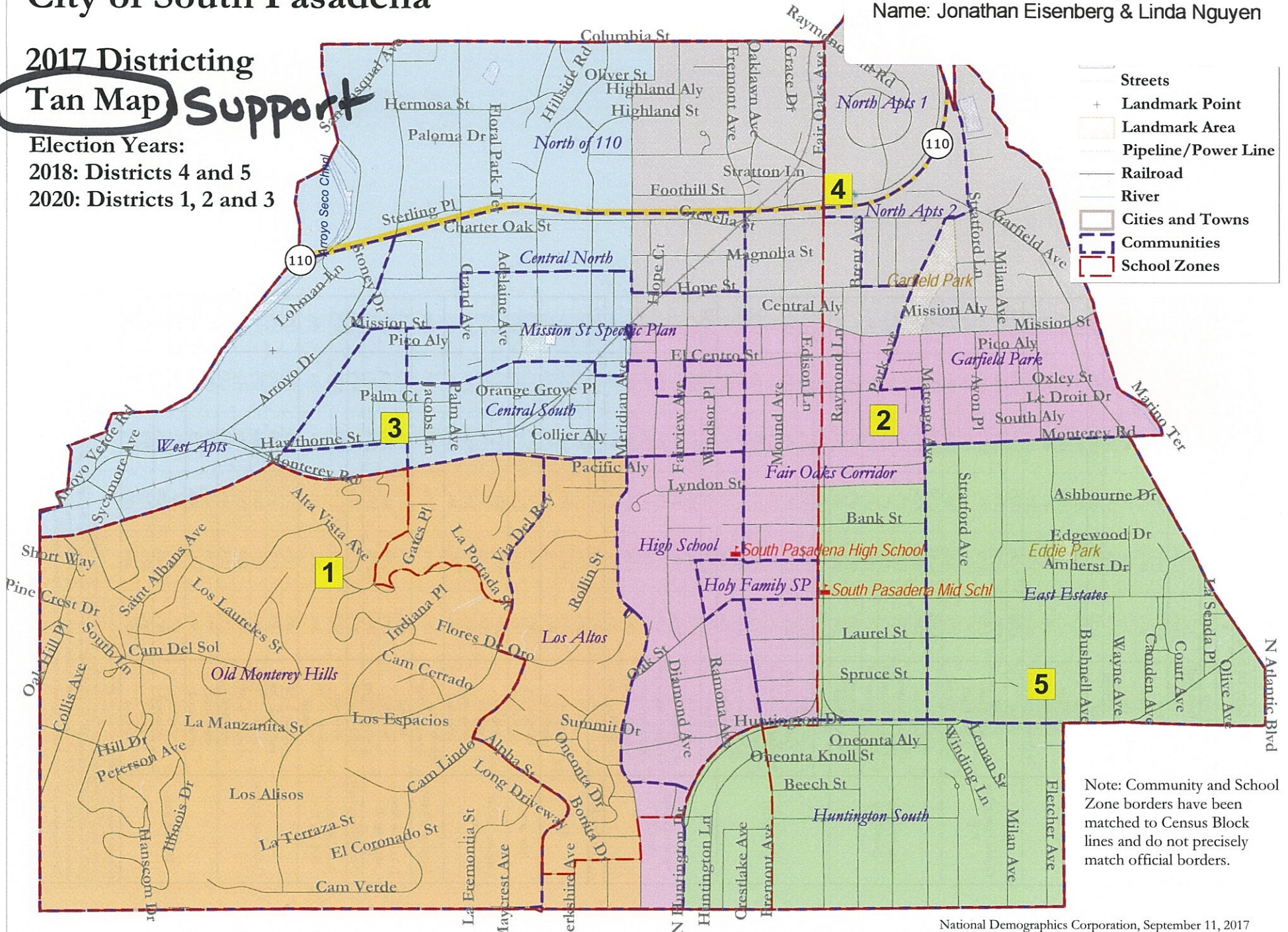

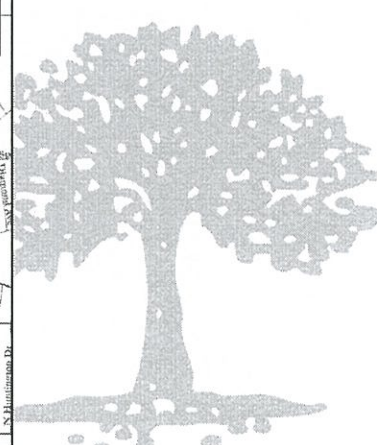
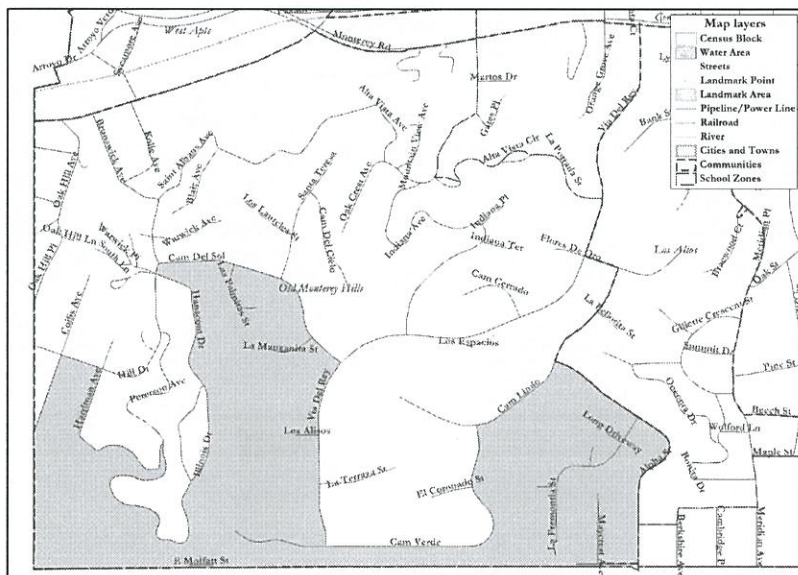

Attached is an email from Mr. Ron Rosen questioning the ‘community’ lines and naming of Los Altos. Dr. Doug Johnson, the City’s Demographer, has offered the following explanation:

“The ‘community’ lines shown on the map follow Census Block lines. The ones shown for Los Altos do not cover the entire Los Altos area because the rest of the area shares census blocks with the rest of the Hills area. The same issue is true, to a smaller geographic extent, with the Specific Plan areas and with the neighborhoods pulled from the Nextdoor maps. In all cases, we have adjusted the lines to follow Census Block borders.

The below image shows the issue in the Hills – the area highlighted in red is one huge Census Block with 886 residents that bridges Los Altos and the Hills. It can be assigned either way, but it has to be kept together to ensure the reliability of our population counts. The Census Block between the highlighted Census Block and Via del Rey is entirely in Los Altos.”

Dear Council, City Manager, City Clerk:

One the maps that were passed out on Saturday, September 16, there's a label "Los Altos" on the west side of Meridian Avenue south of Monterey Road. I'm not sure where that designation comes from, but I've talked to some people, including a realtor. Most people think that "the Altos" is part of Monterey Hills as it comes up Via del Rey. The maps imply that "Los Altos" includes all the streets that come off of the south part of Meridian to the west, including Lyndon, Bank, Rollin, Braewood, Gillette Crescent, Summit, Wolford, and Bonita. I live on Wolford. I don't think anyone who lives on those streets knows them as "the Altos." I think that needs to be cleared up. There is a hill between the area I just described and Via del Rey to the west. The hill divides the two areas: the west side of Meridian and Monterey Hills. Those two areas have nothing in common.

The west side of Meridian has much more in common with the east side of Meridian than anything further to the west. It's one street, in one neighborhood. It should not be a dividing line. This is why I favor the Blue map and strenuously object to all the other maps, which artificially divide this neighborhood that is on both sides of Meridian. People in apartments on the west side of Meridian park often their cars on the east side of Meridian and on other streets to the east, like Pine. My neighborhood looks like District 2 on the Blue map. It does not look like any other maps. People on the west side of Meridian have nothing to do with the people in Monterey Hills, which only looks adjacent to Meridian from an airplane, but is not connected to Meridian at all.

My reasoning is that the boundaries are such that for the main business street of Fair Oaks, the way the map is drawn the street touches 4 districts. The same is true with Mission and Fremont. This would provide for more overall participation in concerns and issues facing these key traffic and business streets.

I also feel that the districts better reflect the neighborhoods as compared to the other map options. I also feel that the way the districts are defined is a good distribution of the schools.

I am not in favor of the city having to change from its "at large" voting structure to a district system, but I understand that there is really no choice.

Looking more closely at the maps, it is apparent that all the maps but the Blue map leaves my side, the west side of Meridian, as an orphan. By cutting Meridian in half, it cuts us off from the street we live next to and the rest of our neighborhood. Somehow, the west side of Meridian is falsely labeled as "Los Altos," which is not a correct label.

In particular, the Tan map is really unfair to my block, because it puts us with Monterey Hills, a part of town we are not directly connected to and have nothing in common with. The Tan map would make it almost impossible for anyone on my side of Meridian to ever be elected to City Council. The people in Monterey Hills would say, "That person doesn't live in our neighborhood," and they would be right.

All the maps other than the Blue map look gerrymandered, and they make the west side of Meridian where I live an orphan appendage to areas that we aren't really part of. Narrow districts that run from Huntington to Columbia make no sense, but that's what all the maps, other than the Blue map, do.

The Blue map is the only map that appears to be a true, rational, district map. All the others look forced.

At the meeting on September 16, we were informed that one of the maps (maybe more) will give a district to each current Council member. The rationale offered for such a map was that "we don't want Kevin Schenkman to decide who is on our Council." That's not a valid rationalization. Schenkman isn't determining who is on the Council. It's not Schenkman's fault that three Councilmembers live in close proximity. I urge you to do the right thing, rise above your own personal interests, and not adopt such a map. Adopting a map designed to protect your own seats may actually not serve you in the end.

I strongly urge you to adopt the Blue map.

ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH CITY CAMPAIGN REGULATIONS

What is the purpose of a Local Campaign Ordinance?

- To promote integrity, honesty, fairness, and transparency in municipal election campaigns.
- To prevent corruption, or the appearance of corruption, which results from the real or perceived influence of large contributions on the conduct or actions of candidates.
- To place realistic and enforceable limits on the amount of money that may be contributed to political campaigns in municipal elections for city offices.

Previous City Council Direction...

- At the City Council Meeting of March 2, 2016:
 - 5-0, the City Council directed staff to utilize the City of Cudahy's Campaign Contribution Regulations as a Model Ordinance.
 - 3-2 (Schneider and Mahmud voting no), to set an individual campaign contributions limit at \$1,000.
 - Mahmud suggested a limit of \$500.
 - Schneider suggested a limit of \$250.

Highlights of the Draft Ordinance

- The individual campaign contribution limit is set at \$1,000.
- Officeholders are prohibited from inducing or coercing contributions from city contractors, bidders, franchisees, and labor negotiators.
- Officeholders are prohibited from accepting contributions for one year after final action on a permit, contract, or other discretionary decisions, including franchise agreements and labor contracts.
- All candidates are prohibited from accepting contributions from City employees, unless such contribution is unsolicited and voluntary.

Alternative Ordinance

- Individual campaign contribution limit of \$1,000.
- City staff is recommending elimination of the additional regulations due to concerns that certain provisions would be difficult to enforce, may cause candidates to unintentionally violate the ordinance, and/or state law already criminalizes the illicit activity.
- If the City Council adopts the alternative ordinance and later finds certain provisions are necessary, it may at any time reconsider and modify the ordinance.

Tonight's Consideration

- Introduce one of the following ordinances:
 - Draft Ordinance:
 - Individual contribution limit of \$1,000.
 - Officeholders prohibited from using coercion.
 - Officeholders prohibited from accepting contributions for one year after rendering a discretionary decision.
 - Candidates prohibited from soliciting contributions from City employees.
 - Alternative Ordinance:
 - Individual contribution limit of \$1,000.
- Or, provide further direction to staff.
